





OIL MILL AND CREAMERY WORKER HERE THIS WEEK

H. D. Cuykendall, field repre sentative and educational worker for the cotton oil mills of this Wednesday noon, bringing in the rain. He arrived during the first fifteen minutes of rainfall. He had to spend two or three days here before he could get out.

Mr. Cuykendall comes here to line up the local gins to handle seed for meal and hulls next year. This will make it possible for the farmer to go to his nearest gin, where he does his ginning, and trade his cottonseed right there for meal and hulls to feed his dairy and beef cattle, as

as his hogs and chickens.

This enables the farmer to have the trade. He does not have to and hulls. He gets a receipt for his weight in cottonseed at the gin and credit on the books for goes to the gin, at any time, and takes out what feed he needs. He does not have to take it out all at once. The gin stores it for hin without cost.

There is another advantage in that the farmer gets the advantage of any raise in price in that the price of meal and hulls that

the price of meal and hulls that prevails the day he swaps his seed. If meal and hulls go up, he still pays the same old price that was in effect when he traded his seed for the feed.
