In every presidential election year, the country is flooded with straw votes of varoius kinds, trying to predict the strength of the two major party candidates. This year is no · exception; in fact the number of

Straw Votes

of the publishers.

straw votes being conducted throughout the country has reached proportions undreamed

of a few years ago. Almost every newspaper or magazine is either conducting or reporting results of presidential straw votes.

Political leaders scan these straw votes ieverishly, and possibly they give a fair basis for campaign work. But it is a poor campaign manager who cannot read the figures, no matter how discouraging they may be to the rank and file of the voters, so that they will show up to advantage for his particular candidate.

Straw votes to show public thought on public questions has become a big business, and at least one agency makes weekly reports on current questions to subscribing newspapers, with monthly reports on the trend of sentiment in the president's race. Probably of all the straw votes, this is the least reliable, for it is done by the "sampling" method. Only about 200,000 ballots are sent out to the entire nation, and the results obtained from these taken as an indication of the sentiment of the entire population. Every politician who has been through a campaign knows how unreliable "sampling" can be. The method does not take into consideration the organization work, does not give any reliable indication of the trend of thought even in a small locality, let alone the nation. Another weakness of the current "sampling" vote, is that fact that no definite figures are given to indicate what proportion of the voters are being quoted.

Thus Texas may be listed as 87 per cent for Roosevelt. and 13 per cent for Landon, without anyone knowing whether 100 or 1,000 persons were called upon to express that opinion, while the solemn statement that New York is 51 per cent for Landon and 49 per cent for Roosevelt may mean anything or nothing, depending upon whether the jority of the votes are from Democratic New York City or Republican rural New York.

Most reliable of the nation-wide polls is that of the Literary Digest - one of the few polls, by the way, that sent ballots to far away from headquarters as Brown county. The value of this poll lies largely in the fact that it is so large that it can hardly fail to get a true picture of the political situation at the time the poll is taken. With several million ballots sent out, and most of them returned, the result is fairly certain to predict the result fairly well. The main weakness of this poll lies in the fact that, taken in September, it would fail to record any great shift of voters from tied loosly around the tree and their one candidate to another in the weeks preceding the elec- waists. 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

He was besieged with letters, telegrams, resolutions and advice from well meaning people, but the Oklahoma argument also was sound, and on doubt Ohio likewise had problems of prison discipline to consider. The Ohio governor was placed in a difficult position.

But a Governor's powers often are discretionary, and after a hearing Governor Davey refused to grant the extradition request. No doubt it was the best solution to a difficult problem. Governor Davey feels that he has done the right thing in tempering justice with mercy; Oklahoma officials probably will be willing to surrender their rights to the prisoner now that they have made the claims demanded by their code, and certainly Mr. Chilton and his family should be well pleased with the turne of events.


There is little we can do about the car in this caseits speeds will continue to increase, and the automotive engineers have done wonders in improving the "safety factor," brakes, lights, steering mechanisms and body construction approach perfection.


As Fortune points out, there is something we can do about the highway. Half the highways in the United States, the magazine estimates, are obsolete. It points out that engineers have devised the model highway of the future-a road with over or under passes at intersections, with a wide dividing island down the center to prevent head-on crashes, and with separate lanes for slow and fast traffic. Such highways will be built, but their cost is gigantic, technical problems are involved, and it will be many years before the mileage of such super highways will amount to much in relation to the total mileage of all roads.

In the meantime, all we have to work on is the twentymile-driver with his eighty-mile-car. More stringent safety regulations, better highway patrols, strict licensing laws and educational programs to encourage safer driving - these seem the only answer to the problem of how to reduce appreciably the terrific toll of the highways.
