B-2 & C-2 GASOLINE RATIONS INVALID AFTER JUNE 1

On June 1 all B-2 and C-2 gasoline rations will become invalid for consumer use, the District Ofnounced today.

Persons holding B-2 and C-2 rations which will not expire until after June 1 must present the coupons to their Ration Boards before June 1 in exchange for valid coupons of equal value.

District officials announce that gasoline dealers have until June 10 to turn their ration evidence over to distributors. Distributors must give their ration evidence to ration banks by June 20.

The general rain that started falling here last Friday broke the drouth that had 'held up early planting in this section and was estimated to be the life saver of our future crops and also assisted wheat growers in this section.

The slow rain Friday was followed by intermittent showers over the week end and then again late Tuesday afternoon, the always expected but not hoped for happened. The west side of the county received one of the old type of washers that amounted up to as much as seven inches in some sections. Approximately two hundred feet of railroad track near the west county line was undermined. Carrol creek near the Country Club went out of its banks and stock tanks in that section received several feet of water to overflowing. The Groom section received a devastating hail that wiped out one of the best wheat crop prospects in years. The Jericho vicinity received around 2½ inches rainfall but no hail damage was reported.

Latest reports this morning from the Goldston community state that they received a repetition of the Tuesday night flood totaling more than 5 inches again last night and that Carrol creek went on another rampage and the Country Club lake which has not gone over the spill-way in the last three years was still running over this morning.

The rainfall in each occasion has covered practically every foot of the county and including the heavy downpour late Wednesday evening, the report at the official showed the Clarendon vicinity to have received approximately three and one-half inches during the past week. This measure could possibly vary quite a bit as the station is five miles southwest of Clarendon and some figure the







Sugar consumers may apply for their 1944 home canning allotment in two periods, the Office of Price Administration reports. In each period, users may obtain up to 10 pounds of sugar per person in addition to five pounds available with sugar stamp 40 in War Ration Book 4. Persons not applying in the first period, but who need sugar in the second period, may obtain up to their full 20-poundsper-person allowance if the application justifies that total.

War Production Needs Used Fats

improved due to increased proaccording to a statement approved by the War Food Administration the War Production Board and the Office of Price Administration and issued over the signature of Lee Marshall, Director of Distribution, War Food Administration, in Washington, yesterday.

"Conservation of used kitchen fats is stressed by Mr. Marshall in his statement," Roy W. Peet, Chairman of the American Fat Salvage Committee, Inc. points out, "and he urges American women to turn in household fats promptly after they have served their purpose as food."

In his statement addressed to American Women, Mr. Marshall

"Making sure there are enough fats for both your kitchen and the war production machine is one of the responsibilities of the War Food Administration.

"After a year in which both cooking and industrial fats were in short supply, the outlook for food fats has improved. This is because farmers have greatly increased their production of oil crops and livestock.

"But abundant supplies of industrial fats continue to be needed to meet the increased demands of war production geared for invasion-as well as for civilian requirements.

"With more used fats available for industrial use, we will have to divert less of our fresh food fats to war production.

"We do not want to take good food fats and use them for nonfood industrial purposes if it can be avoided. The conservation of used fats by every homemaker in her own kitchen can help in this

women to save all their used cooking fats and turn them in to their butchers. These fats are vital in the making of such materials as synthetic rubber, parachutes, de-icing fluids for planes, explosives, life-saving medicines, industrial, military and civilian soaps and hundreds of other war necessities.

"Increased production has helped give you point-free fats for your kitchen. By saving more used fats you help keep our food fats point-free-and our war machine rolling on to Victory."

To this statement of War Food Administration Mr. Peet adds; "For every pound of used fat, your butcher will give 4c and two red points. And remember, these points are doubly valuable now. So let's save all the used fats we possibly can - and then some more! It's a real contribution to victory that every home can
