

Both have opposition, and so far as we know those who seek the offices are entirely worthy. But seldom has Texas been served better than it is being served at present by an efficient administration of the two offices of comptroller and of treasurer, and no reason occurs to us why there should be any change.

Mr. Sheppard particularly deserves the commendation of the people of Texas. His position is not an easy one. In addition to the multitudinous duties imposed upon him under the constitution, each succeeding legislature has entrusted to his care supervision of additional functions of the state government, until his office rivals that of the Board of Control in activities. In taking on new duties, Mr. Sheppard has not neglected the routine office tasks. To the contrary, he has introduced new methods of accounting and a new accuracy that has saved the taxpavers of Texas millions of dollars during his tenure in office. Such a record entitles Mr. Sheppard to serious consideration, and certainly no one has offered for this office who should be given consideration over him.

Mr. Lockhart's office, just as important, probably is not so difficult to fill, for any able executive who can follow the direction of the law should be able to discharge the duties satisfactorily. Mr. Lockhart, however, has gone a bit farther than this: he has conducted an office that is a model of efficiency, and one in which courtesy is the watchword. Apropros of Railroad Week, being observed by the Western Railroads this week, is the statement in a recent address of R. V. Fletcher, general counsel of the Association of American Railroads, who Less Regulation declared that Federal regulation of rail transportation has gone Needed too far.

I have long been of the opinion that the future of the railroads would be brighter and their success more assured if there was applied to their situation less regulation and more practical common sense - and by this I mean that the railroads should be free, consistent with the maintenance of reasonable and non-discriminatory rates, to adapt their practices and methods to the needs and demands of modern business," he said.

"I am altogether optimistic as to the future, particularly if the American people can come to understand that the railroads are entitled to fair treatment at the hands of legislative and administrative bodies, and provided they are left free to work out their problems, in the light of their useful experience and in accordance with the dictates of justice and fair dealing."

Mr. Fletcher made it clear that he has no criticism of the men entrusted with railroad regulation - he believes it is the principle, not the administration, of the various laws involved that has often proved bad. The railroads have been regulated to the hilt in every phase of operation, while their competitors have been entirely or largely free from any regulation whatsoever.

In some instances, railroad regulation has become "constriction" - managements have been turned into mere puppets, with public officials pulling the strings.

Further legislative manipulation will kill, not cure, the patient. The lines deserve more of a chance to manage their own show free from the blighting hand of the bureaucrat.




