ZULU TALKS IN **OXFORD TONGUE**

Protege of Roosevelt Reveals His Rise From Life in Jungles.

Charleston, S. C .- A story right out of an adventure magazine, jumping from the jungles of Africa to Harvard university, from the Romeo Christopher, son of a Zulu chleftain and head guide for Theodore Roosevelt in his 1911 African

The man had been arrested on a minor charge by request of the Salvation Army. He speaks like an educated Englishman—and yet he had not worn a pair of shoes nor eaten a piece of cooked food until

Straight from the African Jungle he came, and in Cape Town Theodore Roosevelt picked him for his guide. Even now the Roosevelt family remains the guiding star in his life. Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, daughter of the late President, will send him to Harvard university in the spring to study, he says, so that he can go back and teach the white

man's religion to his people.
