Constitutional Amendments Affecting General Welfare

Two more important constitutional amandments, as affecting the general welfare, perhaps could not now be subsmitted to the people of Texas than the two amendments to be voted upon on July 16th, 1929, to-wit:

1. To increase the number 'of judges on the Supreme Court of Texas from three to nine, and provide for a continuous session of the court: and,

2. To increase the Governor's salary from \$4,000.00 per annum to \$10,000.00 per annum


The Supreme Court Amendment Our present constitution was adopted Feb. 1876. It provided that the Supreme Court should consist of a Chief Justice and two associate Justices, and should have appellate jurisdiction in all cases of which the district courts had original or appellate jurisdiction. It was soon recognized that the

appellate jurisdiction thus conferred upon the Supreme Court constituted a burden beyond the ability of three judges to discharge. Accordingly in 1891, an amendment to the constitution was adopted creating Courts of Civil Appeals and materially limiting the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, yet allowing the Supreme Court to retain jurisdiction of matters essential to the general welfare.

This amendment provided that "The Legislature shall, as soon as practicable, after the adoption of the amendment, divide the State into not less than two, nor more than three Supreme Judicial districts, and thereafter into such additional districts as the increase of population and business may re-

districts." population in the United States. Today she ranks 5th. The population of Texas has increased from 2,235,527 in 1890 to 4,663,288 in 1920 and 5,487,00 in 1929. The business of the courts has increased with the poulation, and to the normal increase has been added the extraordinary increase of litigation growing out of the oil and gas development in the State.

This arrangement is most unsatisfactory to the bench and bar of the State. The opinions of the Supreme Court, based on the investigations of others, however eminently qualified the others may be, are not accepted to be as outhoritative as the opinions would be if the judges of the Supreme Court had made their own investigations.

Furthermore, under the present Constitution, the Supreme Court is in session only nine months out of the year. From July 1st to Oct. 1st, the court is closed and the wheels of justice, so far as the court ol last resort is concerned, temporarily cease to turn.

The fight of recourse to the court for redress of grievances is one of our boasted liberties, and the right of appeal is one of the cherished privileges of the Anglo-Saxon people. Any system, therefore, that denies that privilege or which, by lack of machinery, retards the right of appeal until it ceased to be effective is obnoxious to the traditions of our race and the fundamentals of our system of government.

The increase of the Supreme Court from three judges to nine judges is absolutely essential to the proper administration of justice in Texas at this time. In no other way, at this time, could the patriotic citizen more effectively promote the general welfare than by voting for this constitutional amendment on July 16th.

The adoption of this amendment will make the court of last resort available to our citizenship at all times without the inevitable delay that obtains under the present sys-
