So let each one bring as large an offering as possible that we may take care of all these worthy interests. Then on the 12th of March we want to rededicate our lives to God. So as pastor, I am asking that each member of the

church and all who are not attending services elsewhere come and take part in this service. We all want this to be a better world. The only way to have a better world is to have better people. None of us want another war. God grant that we may never have another war. But we will unless we live better than we have. So the call is a challenging one. Not to be a goody, goody, but real men and women who will do right whether it is easy or not. May God bless everybody. May each of us work and pray and live to make this a better world.
