ONE CASE AFFIRMED for Lehman Job? **OTHER REVERSED BY HIGHER STATE COURT**

The Court of Civil Appeals at Austin affirmed one sentence and reversed one case appealed from the 35th judicial court this week, according to information received Wednesday by District Attorney A. O. Newman, The case of R. L. Armstrong, sentenced to two years in itentiary upon conviction on a charge of receivig stolen goods, was reversed and remanded. The district attorney said that he would file motion for a new trial as soon as possible. The Austin court affirmed the case of Louie Reis, tried in Cole-

man county for murder and sentenced to 21 years in the penitentiary. Reis and Stanley Wood, tried in Brown county, were charged with the murder of Fred Brown. Talpa rancher, on May 4, 1935.

Bonus Money

complishment of this goal is a tribute to the persistent effort on the part of that great service organization, the American Legion.

Accepting payments of the bonds will be a pleasant task for veterans. But it also imposes upon those receiving this g ratuity certain obligations.

In presenting the cause of the veterans to Congress, and in building up a popular public demand for immediz te payment, leaders of Veterans' organizations presented the obvious fact that ex-service men were in great need of the money at this time, and the implication was that this money would be put to good use by the veterans receiving it.

Well, it may be, and again it may not. That depends largely upon the individual veteran. Every conceivable scheme is being used by almost every manufacturer or retailer of any article of any kind to part the veteran and his cash. Many, of course, will succumb to smooth salesmanship with the result that the money soon will be gone and no purpose useful to the veteran will have been accomphisbed.

Most veterans, it is to be hoped, will accept the wise counsel that now is being given them by national leaders of the American Legion: to be thrifty; to spend sparingdy, to cash bonds only when and as needed, and to buy only necessities or use the money to retire pressing debts. That is sound advice, and advice which should be followed by every veteran.

After all, the veterans who receive this money are not children any more. Eighteen years have passed since the World War was in progress, and eighteen years added to the age of even the youngest veteran makes of him a mature man. As such he should be capable of maintaining his equilibrium in face of the receipt of even a comparatively large sum of money and at a time when such sums are comparatively scarce. The greatest danger is that the payment is considered "easy money.

If veterans will follow the advice of those leaders, who were most instrumental in securing for them this bonus payment, it will be a good thing. If not, it would be better had it not been made.

Even in Brownwood, where oil has had an important part in the prosperity of this section of the State, there has been a more or less general feeling that oil is just a spectacular side-line to the regular routine of business. And yet as Colonel Thompson pointed out, nearly 40 per cent of the revenue of the State is derived from oil or gas: the petroleum "crop" each year is of greater value than all of the agricultural crops in Texas combined. This figure becomes significant when it is remembered that Texas is the leading agricultural state of the Nation.

Of the 252 counties of Texas, 210, or all but 42, derive some part of their revenue from oil, either in the form of production or development activity brought about by the tope for paying production. No other State even begins to equal this record; no other country in the world has production that has such an important bearing upon the industry as less than a half dozen counties in East Texas. When it is considered from the standpoint of the revenue derived to Texas; when it is considered from the number of individuals it employs, then its importance is more easily recognized and appreciated, and the need for stringent proration is easily understood. Proration of the smaller wells in the West Texas pools seems to work a hardship upon them; and yet were it not for proration there would be no West Texas oil, for the flush production in East Texas would eliminate wells here and elsewhere and preclude further development for many years. Oil has come to be the most important item in the growth of Texas and the prosperity of its citizens. And every indication points to its continued leadership for many years to come.







against such criminals are coming down by twenty per cent in thirty-five states. It is an unusual situation in a country where we

have come to regard all crime as on the increase.

The general improvement throughout the country is attributed to two factors: First, a rule, promulgated two years ago, requiring banks to keep 85 per cent of their insured money under delayed time locks, and, second, the increased activities of the various law enforcement agencies, particularly those of the Department of Justice, which have made bank robbery an increasingly undesirable business.

These factors no doubt have been the cause for the nation-wide reduction in bank robberies, but the cause in Texas is well known. Several years ago when the Texas Bankers Association offered a cash reward for dead bank robbers, and paid the award in many instances, there was general criticism of the scheme. But it was apparent in a few months that bank robberies were becoming less frequent; until now it is very unsual for a Texas bank to be robbed.

Making crime unattractive is the best way to prevent crime, whether it be bank robbery or kidnaping.
