

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

EDUCATION Rural Aid

Rural schools of Texas face disaster. An injunction granted in a Raxar County district court Saturday restrains educational and financial officers of the State from paying out any of the \$5,000,000 appropriated for the biennium for rural aid purposes.

Judge R. B. Miller, a distinguishad jurist of the old school, granted the injunction on the ground that the rural aid law was unconstitutional of being discrimnitory.

Some 3,600 rural schools will be forced to close. Operacions of the Department of Education are suspended. Approximately 15,000 high school students must drop out of lin left immediately for Plainview. school. Many rural school districts Mr. Payne received another messent their scholastics to high undergone an operation for appenschools in other districts. The tuition of these students is paid from the State rural aid funds. The amount allowed for the biennium is \$400,000.

The rural aid funds are furnished to schools meeting certain requirements and qualifications. The State guarantees these schools a six and one half months term. Local and per capita apportionment funds are used to continue the length of terms after the aid White. funds are expended. It is feared that large numbers of short term of their terms before relief can be

Rep. Vernon Lemens of Glen Rose declared: "Our rural school system is now in a worse predicament than the Chicago public schools. The situation is extremely critical. Our rural schools are far more important than any other branch of our educational system. It is imperative that the Governor and the Legislature take immediate steps to remedy the defects of the rural aid law."

State officials are hoping that higher courts will reverse the deeree of Judge Miner. A decision from an appellate court is expect-

Meanwhile, legislators have taken immediate interest in the situation and prison legislation has become of secondary consideration. Governor Moody has indicated that subject of the Legislature.

There are those who express the opinion that the Legislature cannot remedy the defects of the rural aid law, the decision of Judge Miner being too far-reaching in its conclusions

However, the House Education Committee met Monday afternoon to discuss methods of legislative remedy. D. F. Whitehurst, assistant attorney general, advised the committee not to introduce any legislation until an appeal can be completed.

One of the legislative remedies suggested is to have a bill passed greating the Rural School Division of the Department of Education. An appropriation to the Department of Education would operate the Division. This division would Take the place of the Rural Aid Division; now suspended from operation by the injunction, operating expenses having been paid from rural aid funds.

A separate appropriation of \$400,000 to pay high school tuition ! of rural scholastics has been suggested as another legislative remedy. If necessary, per capita supplementary funds could be appropriated. This plan would require no qualifications of rural schools for receiving State aid, but would make the grant subject to the approval of the Department of Education, having the same effect a0s the present rural aid law, according to Rep. Ray Holder, Chairman of the Education Committee and Lancasterd newspaper publisher.

"We may not be lawyers, but we are going to find some way to get around that injunction", declared Holder. He appointed a sub-committee to draft emergency relief

S. M. N. Marrs, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, said that 250 rural schools would close next week if relief is not forthcoming immediately. He said that he will make a strong appeal to teachers of all schools affected by the injunction to hold open their schools until March. Marrs be-Heves that local interests will contribute enough to pay salaries




