



Cowboy Artist Of Clarendon Is Recognized

High Tribute Paid to Man Whose Work Will Be Shown There Monday

In the February issue of "The Abalde," alumni and ex-student publication of the University of Texas, J. Evetts Haley has written mast interesting article on Har-Bugbee, of Clarendon, the cowboy painter of Texas ranch life.

The following excerpts are taken from Mr. Haley's article:

"Texas is at last producing artists who set down with crayon, pen, and paint the life of her ranges of grass. They are making visual and lasting the memories of the Goodnight and the Chisholm travels, of the buffalo ranges, of the High Plains, of the Indian made up the remainder of the evdays from the brush through the gross timbers-

"Out on the edge of the Staked Plains, where there are no art museums, but where there still are cowboys and cattle, and unspoiled grass, is an artist who portrays the pioneer life of the Southern Llanos better than any man. In his sketches is all the action of ambroken horses, of wild buffalo, and of outlaw cattle, but no more. In his canvases the grama grasses ripple before the wind, the evanescent shadows of the breaks come and go, and the canyons of the Palo Duro blaze in their abonginal wildness. Along the breaks of the Plains, Harold Bugbee paints with fidelity and charm the life of the Southwest that he knows. Amarillo News.
