Two Services Being Held Bad Roads And Bad Weather Thousands Cheer Favorite Son Speaking at Many Towns in Panhandle Section

> Doubling back to correct any alse impressions left by his opponents in the race for the governership, Senator Small flew back to Memphis where he spoke Friday at 2 p. m. to an estimated crowd of 4,000 followers gathered f r o m nearby territory.

> Bands of Wellington, McLean, Shamrock, Memphis and Clarendor welcomed him as he arrived a Pampa Friday evening for his last appearance before the voters next Saturday. An enthusiastic gather ing estimated at over 6,000 cheered the speaker as he tore to shreds statements made by other candidates against him.

In all of Senator Small's remarks it was noted that he was clearly on the defensive explaining false reports put out against his candidacy by his opponents. He did not stoop to any mud-slinging tactics and satisfied his crowd if there had been any doubt in the minds of his hearers.

He began speaking at Pampa at 8:30 and his crowd would not let him stop until after 10 o'clock. He reminded his audience that a short time ago they had stated "he did not have a chance," but were now shelling the Panhandle-his home section—lest he be elected.

General Crops Continue With Growth; Early Corn Alone Needing Rain

The continued hot weather has worked no hardship on crop conditions in general, early corn alone ber One has been an employee of of all crops showing effects of dry weather. The corn acreage is very limited and the loss of the entire crop would cut very little figure.

Cotton continues to show a hardy growth by putting on stalk and lengthening of tap root. Row crops are showing up nicely with a large acreage planted. Sudan. maize and hegaria represent the principal varieties of feed.

Truck crops have begun to move. Several truck loads of roasting ears have gone to the Plains country the past week. Blackeye peas are in good demand but scarce. A few other varieties of truck have been moving.

Melons and canteloupes will soon be ready. These constitute the best paying truck crops of Donley county. After the home market is supplied, the farmer can sell his crop at the patch to men from the Plains who haul it with trucks.

Very few farmers are forced to hunt a market for their produce. Buyers are eager to come to the The prices will compare favorably with those of last year, though some growers expect the price to go up due to drouth curtailment

An Editorial

It is not within the province of the editor of the Leader to tell you how to vote. That is your business and a matter which you should decide for yourself after studying of the fitness of each individual candidate.

At the same time, the editor feels that he would be derelict in his duty to the many good friends of the Leader did he not at this time gove out certain information which he believes to be of vital importance to the good citizens of Donley county.

Of the cleven men running in the governor's race, seven of whom are prominently in the lead, two appear to espouse a cause that appears to be very detrimental to the best interests of the common people of Texas.

The one big & sject is "taxation" with which some counties are already burdened. Taxes are plenty high enough in Donley county considering what we get in return. Of all the candidates, only two actively advocate saddling upon the laboring class a higher tax. These two men are Love and Sterling.

As said above, your vote is your own property, but possibly there are some things in connection with the tax problem that has escaped your notice. In behalf of the laboring class who will pay the tax, we offer the following information for your benefit.

The \$350,000,000 bond issue proposed by Love and Sterling will benefit most only three classes: The cement manufacturers, the road machinery manufacturers and the leisure class. The population of Texas according to the 1930 census is 5,810,683. The interest on the bonds at four percent-it will not be less and will probably be more-amounts to \$1,400,000. Add this to the bond issue and divide the total by the population of the state and you can clearly see that of every man, woman and child in the state will owe approximately \$70.00.

The citizens of this county have been slow to saddle upon themselves a bonded indebtedness. Will they do it now? When they tell you that this debt will be paid out of the gasoline tax, they are simply misleading you for the reason that no bond purchaser will accept any specific form of tax as security. The whole state of Texas will be mortgaged to pay the bill and you and yours will have to work that much harder and save that much more to pay the bill while the leisure class enjoys the highway that your labor built.

Tom Love has appealed to your prejudice to put him over. He claims that every man who voted against Al Smith in the last presidential election should vote for him. He may be entitled to this consideration but when he seeks to saddle upon the backs of the toiling mass of Texans a debt that is ruinous, he is not entitled to any consideration.

Ross S. Sterling of Houston, reputed multi-millionaire who owns a mansion on the water front costing a half million dollars equipped with 22 bathtubs while eight expensive autos are at the beck and call of him and his family, has a right to ask

At the same time, could you expect a man of this calibre to be in sympathy with the laboring class? Do you think as governor he would favor legislation in favor of the masses against the millionaire class? As chairman of the State Highway Department, has he shown your home folks any consideration by way of giving them jobs on the highway work in your county?

While it is true that NO governor can saddle upon the state a bond issue of the nature advocated by Sterling or Love without amending the Constitution in which all of the people will have a vote, it does mean that we will have a political turmoil at Austin in which the governor will be on one side with a few supporters and the majority possibly of the legislature on the

If this be the case, taxpayers will again be called upon to pay for extra sessions of the Legislature as they have during the Moody administration, while the governor is attempting to put over a pet theory that will benefit him and his special

Texas needs a rest from political fights. We have too many laws already. We need to cut taxes wherever possible. We need highways but they should be built by a gasoline tax as they have been built in other states forcing those who use the roads most to pay the most.

Counties most heavily burdened with road bonds are crying for help and will likely vote favoring the man who advocates the state-wide bond issue. . These counties built their roads, have used their roads without consulting us. It is their 'mess' and there is no reason why the entire state should become burdened as they are at present. Think it over.

Explaining Matters

In performing my duties as a night time officer under Sheriff and I have little time left to meet didacy for the office of governor.

It should be remembered, that while the terrors of God's law must have their place in preaching, that people are more easily won by the presentation of God's mercies than His judgment. 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

VOTERS BECOMING OF AGE

Any man or woman who may have attained the age of twenty one years, since the first day of January 1929, may without having paid a poll tax vote, at any election which may be held before the first day of February 1931.

For example, suppose that John Doe reached his twenty first birth day the second day of January 1929, he does not owe a poll tax for the year 1929 but of course he has a vote; John Doe will owe a poll tax for the year 1930, but that tax is not due and payable until the 31st day of January 1931, and yet he may vote, at any and all elections during that time; that is to say John Doe is a qualified voter without having paid a poll tax during the whole two years and one month at any election from Thursday night, candidates led in January 2nd 1929, until January





Highway 52 from Hedley to Wellington for a single day offered the lowest count in the Panhandle with only 132 cars passing over the highway in a single day.

The count on Highway 5 be tween Clarendon and Memphis showed a total of 963 cars for the day. Tourists detour around this bad stretch of road over 66 and the highway by way of Turkey and this is not considered a fair estimate, or what it will be when the Donley county highway is paved.

Traffic over Highway 88 registered a total of 293. The county was made before the present bad road condition from Clarendon to the river. This piece of road is almost impassible now and will remain so until a rain due to the roadbed being torn up and of such character that it will not settle.
