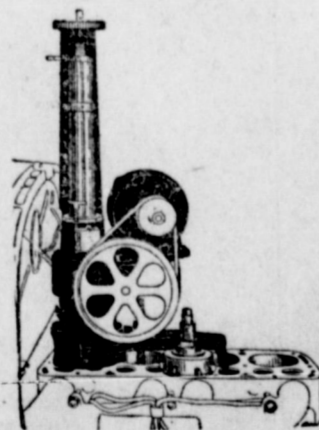

**OUR WEEKLY CHURCH CHAT**

**"Preaching"**

What is preaching? Preaching is spoken communication of divine truth with a view of persuasion. Accepting this as a sufficient definition, we notice that it covers the three points with which we are chiefly concerned in a sermon, namely: Its matter, its manner, and its purpose. As to the purpose of this communication, it is divine truth spoken, "with a view to persuasion." This tell us why we preach. "It was God's good pleasure thru the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe" (I. Cor. 1: 21). There can be no improvement upon the divinely appointed means of saving the world, nor any adequate substitute for the gospel in essays upon morality, lectures on current topics, etc. The preachers main theme should be the gospel, which is, "The power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth" (Rom. 1:16). He is a messenger of joyful tidings. It should be remembered, that while the terrors of God's law must have their place in preaching, that people are more easily won by the presentation of God's mercies than His judgment. Let a preacher only administer thundering anathemas, and he will soon find that the most of his hearers are conspicuous for their absence. People will not come to be lashed like slaves, but appreciate being treated as intelligent, reasonable men and women. True preaching is of the Word. The world is hungering for the gospel and Biblical truth. True preachers should "persuade men" to be "reconciled to God". We do not need a new gospel, but we need the old gospel anew. "It is the whole duty of the whole church to preach the whole gospel to the whole world." (C. H. Scoville).

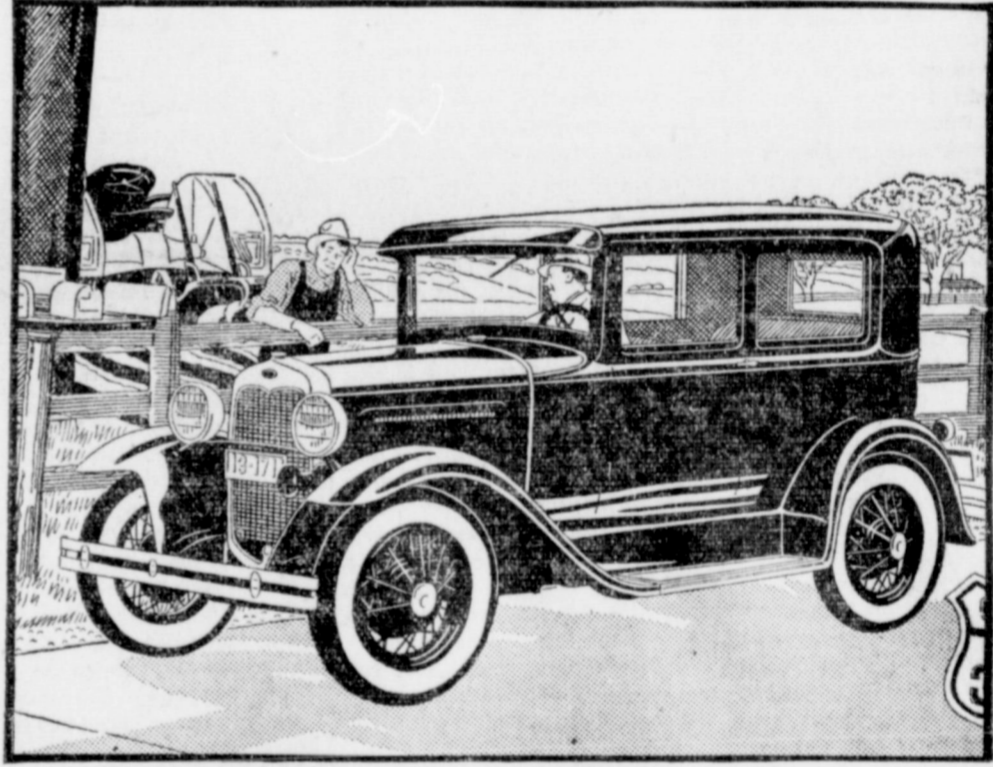

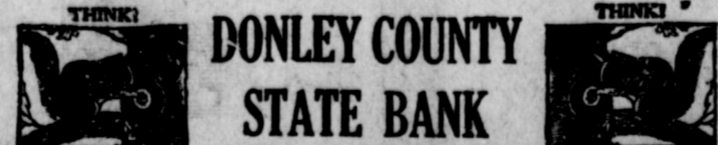

**THE STERLING CAMPAIGN**

It is estimated that something near a quarter of a million dollars will be spent in Ross Sterling's campaign for Governor. This may be overestimated, but there is being spent a huge sum. There is no question about that. The maximum amount that is permitted by law to be spent in the first campaign, for the first primary is \$8,000, and the law says that should any candidate exceed that amount in expenditures he shall be disqualified from holding office should he be nominated and elected.

The headquarters of Ross Sterling have sent out to the newspapers of the state, that is one in each county, an advertisement. The amount spent for these advertisements will exceed one-half of the amount he is permitted by law to spend, more than \$4,000.

From the Sterling headquarters there has been sent editorials for these newspapers, and many of them have placed the editorials in first place in the editorial column of their paper, making it appear as though it was written by the editor. With a \$15 check he has bought the newspaper "body and soul" so to speak.

Those men and women of Texas who are advocating higher education, and constantly complain because the low standing of Texas in the list of the states when the educational test has been applied, should cease their complaints if they are not supporting a man for the office of Governor who is qualified to assist and in fact take the lead in the advancement of this cause. Sterling is not an educated man and while he is to be commended for the position he now occupies, we see no excuse for a man of his qualifications asking for this high office. If he understands road building that does not qualify him for the position as governor. When Jim Ferguson was elected Governor many of the educators of the State supported and worked for his election. Because of his election no doubt the advancement was given a setback from which we have never recovered. The same conditions prevail at this time. Ross Sterling is not against any progressive movement for the advancement of the educational interest. That is not what Texas needs. We need a man who is able to work out plans, and who is capable of being in sympathy with a forward movement of this kind.

Sterling is now at the head of the State Highway Commission and what he has done on this commission is nothing remarkable. He with two other men have built some highways, the people of Texas have paid in the money and they have spent it. Yes, Ross Sterling is a money spender. He has studied highways and more than likely is well posted along that line, but Texas does not need a man for governor who knows all about building roads, plenty of men are able to do that and cannot qualify for the "first round" in the race for Governor.

The Sterling campaign is pretty well organized. The Moody administration was ready to "carry-on" for Sterling. All the appointed officers will likely retain their position should Sterling be elected. Then of course the politicians are for him. Sterling may not be a politician, but he has the politicians working for him. No doubt about that.

Right at this particular time Texas is facing a serious problem. Men who are going to receive a big vote are not qualified to fill the office of Governor. Politicians are at work and they have so manipulated their schemes that they have enlisted some of the most influential men of the different communities. "The politicians are at work." And they have succeeded fairly well thus far. Yes, Texas is in danger. If the voters should elect a man who will have to depend on other fellows to manipulate the affairs of state without him being

able to "blaze the way." Then the politicians will get hold of the affairs. Then we are in danger again. When we place at the head of this great state a man who is "money mad", we are likely to be plunged into bankruptcy so to speak, or the people will have to be taxed to where they can no longer live in happiness and comfort. The people of Texas had better take warning.

When the voters go to the polls to select their nominee on July the 26th, they had better have something in mind other than some influence which has been brought about, and thrown around them. They should vote for the qualifications. Vote for men who know the needs of Texas, and in whom they have confidence. Not confidence in their honesty altogether, but in their ability.

The voters should not be caught by the remark and saying: "Texas needs a good business man for Governor." This has been repeated so many years that it has worn threadbare. What Texas needs and always needs is a man at the head of affairs who is a statesman, and if he is a statesman he is capable of administering the affairs in a business manner. This may be more easily done than a business man endeavoring to be a statesman, an untrained man.

At this time Texas is in the midst of a campaign that is very uncertain, and the people are yet undecided for whom they will vote—a large per cent of them. This condition has been brought about because there are so many candidates in the field for the office of Governor. This writer would suggest that the voters study the candidates and compare their qualifications. Beware of politicians. When this has been done, then make up your mind to support the best man, keeping in mind the best interest of Texas, and stick to your guns. If Sterling is the man after you have studied the candidates, then vote for him.

What we started out to say was that the campaign now being carried on by Ross Sterling is not in keeping with the best interest of Texas and her people. Buying the office of Governor is no way to get it. Neither does money qualify a man to be Governor.

Honesty, capability and integrity are some of the essentials which qualify a man to be able to fill the office of Governor of this great

State. We doubt Ross Sterling having the ability. And surely his campaign is justly being criticized.—Abilene Times.

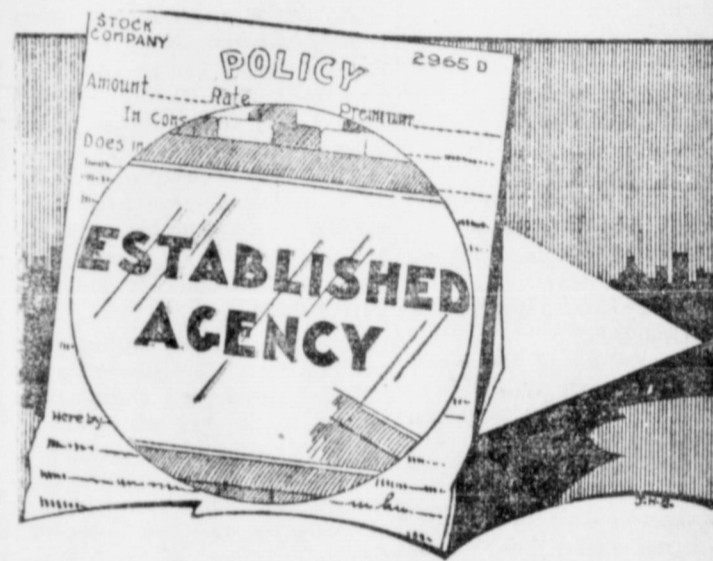

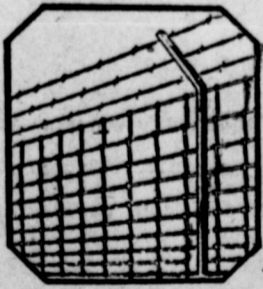

# CAPITAL WEEKLY PRESS

Vann M. Kennedy

Important to Texas is the news that Waco has been selected as the site for the new Veteran's Bureau \$1,200,000 hospital. The institution is to take care of mental cases. Construction will begin within a few months.

The gubernatorial race has taken on the appearance of a battle royal. In those interesting endurance contests of the ring, it is almost invariable that the mass of sluggers turn on the one of their number who seems most vulnerable and proceed to eliminate him; and thus until the remaining two have an even break for the money.

The political battlers have "chosen" Sterling. As one of his opponents describes it, the proposal for a state-wide highway bond issue is "a mill-stone around Sterling's neck." There is no doubt of it, in the minds of the Capital political observers, that a majority of the electorate are opposed to Sterling's bond issue plan.

As an indication of where this bending idea will lead, Roy I. Tennant, member of the State Board of Control, comes forward with a proposal that the State vote at least \$50,000,000 for the eleemosynary institutions. Our thousands of unfortunates need proper support and maintenance much worse than our highways, says Tennant.

Mr. Tennant does not believe in bond issues, but says:

"As long as the public mind is now studying a proposed \$350,000,000 highway bond issue, brought to its attention by the various gubernatorial candidates, it is a good time to remind them of our most serious need. We need at least \$50,000,000 to meet the requirements, and these State institutions cannot depend upon a \$350,000,000 to \$450,000,000 annual income as does the Highway Department.

"We have nearly 80,000 persons in Texas suffering from tuberculosis and can care for only a handful of the thousands who apply for our assistance. From time to time we are compelled to keep 400 to 600 insane persons in county jails because we do not have hospitals for them. There are 500 feeble-minded seeking admittance to the State hospital for that purpose, but we have no way of taking care of these unfortunates."

"There are 250 Confederate widows on the waiting list for the State home, and there are literally hundreds of children waiting to be taken into the State home at Waco, and just as many hundreds should be taken care of at our orphanage at Corsicana, but we have

no room for them. We have no institution or hospital in which we can take care of crippled or deformed orphans."

If the constitutional inhibitions which prohibit the Legislature from pledging the credit of the State are abolished to borrow money for highway building, other bond issues will be urged for purposes just as worthy or even more so, as in the case of our numerous unfortunates.

The State Highway Engineer, Gibb Gilchrist, is looking forward to the time when the main highways of the State will have four traffic lanes. He plans to put in 40 foot super-highways where traffic is as much as 4,000 vehicles per day. The first of these highways will probably be constructed in Dallas and Tarrant counties.

Land Commissioner J. H. Walker leased 84 tracts of University of Texas oil and gas lands in Ward, Andrews, and Winkler Counties here last week. The State received the sum of \$1,134,180 for the leases.

J. M. Del Curto, State Entomologist, has announced that hearings will be held by the State Department of Agriculture on August 14 at Henderson and at Lubbock on August 21 to consider the applications of 76 counties to enter the pest free sweet potato zone. Under the zone plan, only sweet potatoes and slips from certified areas would be allowed to enter the protected sections. There are now 37 counties in the pest free zone. Of the applicants, there are ten counties in East Texas and 66 in the Panhandle according to Del Curto.

Austin has been selected as the Texas control point for the Chicago World Exposition to be held in 1932. The Texas headquarters office will be opened in the Capital city about September 1.

The State Board of Barber Examiners has announced that all barbers must have secured certificates of registration, under provisions of the new licensing law, before August 18.
