Where outside water drains onto land that is deep and absorptive, terraces are constructed on the level with alternate ends closed. Each terrace delivers the water to the one below in somewhat the same manner that syrup flows through he old time syrup vat. These are consequently known as "syrup pan" terraces, This system gives the land benefit of outside water as well as that which actually falls on the field.

On land too shallow or compact to absorb the water that falls on it, level terraces with one end open are used. The open end is for the purpose of emptying excess water into well-sodded pasture land or otherwise protected areas where there is no danger of erosion. In no case is excess water from terraces being emptied into public roads.

The cooperating land owner or operator carries out his part of the erosion control and water conservation program by closing the ter-race ends, making fills where terraces cross ditches, plowing around terraces to prevent the ground from becoming hard or baked, harrowing terraces to give them the correct slope, and also does all other team work necessary for completing the system.

Honoring **O. Henry**

Travis, Austin editor, thinks the honor might well go to O. Henry. So he states in the Texas. Weekly which suggests more at-

tention might be paid to the author who spent most of his adult life as a resident of this State.

Mr. Travis suggests that a statewide O. Henry memorial movement is certainly in order at this time, and thanks to the work already done in Austin, his former home, it could accomplish worthwhile results without tremendous expenditures. Austin is the logical place for any memorial that might be constructed for the noted author, but Mr. Travis is right in his suggestion that such a movement, especially during this Centennial year, should be state-wide.

In these days of commercialism, it is refreshing to note the steps taken by the City of Austin and a number of its patriotic citizens, to keep alive the memory of O. Henry in the capital city. Mr. Travis points out that there is today in Austin an O. Henry museum, unique in more ways than one. The museum is a former home of the short story master, and its equipment consists largely of furniture known to have been used by him. It has been donated by a former owner, removed by the City of Austin to a city site where it has been restored so far as practical, and where it can be maintained permanently. It now forms, Mr. Travis states, one of the principal show places of Austin and probably will prove a great attraction to Centennial visitors. Austin no doubt has done well by its former distin-

guished citizen. And while O. Henry does not belong to the Centennial group of heroes, the Centennial itself offers an opportunity to do tribute to this great short story writer. Whether a form of tribute should be decided upon, or whether the suggestion made by Dr. Samuel E. Gideon of the University of Texas, that an O. Henry scholarship in journalism at the University be established, or whether both suggestions be followed; certainly Texas should take steps this year to do honor to O. Henry and capitalize upon the glamour that attaches to this unusual life. As Mr. Travis aptly says:

"Visitors (to Texas) may ask who this or that general was, or why such a statesman is considered great by Texans, but few, if any, will ask 'What did O. Henry do?'
