## An Institution at Risk--And An Opportunity

## Everywhere the editor went this past week, the first question folks asked was, "What's happening

 Yet the questions are valid. The College is one of the most important elements in the community'sIn the survey that WTU, the City and the Chamber of Commerce recently conducted, Clarendon llege received 46 mentions as the most vital institution in the community, and 45 others mentioned "the Junior college" in response to the same question. That is a total of 91 responses, compared to 56 or Lake Greenbelt, the second most common answer.
In recent monus, he Colege has become a topic of concern in discussions at the Chamber of amerce, the Merchants' Association, the Senior Citizen Center, and who knows where else. community oo that have begun to surface. The school's recent history is one of problems. As reported in a news story on November 24, the College is undergoing an accreditation study by the Southern Association of Schools and Universities. The study cited 52 weaknesses that must be corrected. Some--such as putting student financial records in a safe-will be easy to meet. Others, such sequirements for a greaty expanded library, will be more dificult to meet and may require new construction and/or other major expenditure. The committee commented on the fact that this deficiency had been noted in the previous (1984) study, but had not been corrected.

The committee may put the college on probation. It could also simply "fail to reaffirm", ie. ald be very difficult to keep the doors open long ough to make the necessary corrections 10 get re-accredited.

Board President Bright Newhouse recently attended a family reunion in Amherst, Texas. He carned from relatives there that the college has a reputation as a party school, and he is trying to rebuild natives and who are finishing Clarendon College stated emphatically over the Christmas holidays that, if they were parents, they would not want their daughter to attend CJC. An observer in a near-by town put it this way, "Clarendon College is the place to go to get drunk or get laid, but to get an education

The image problem has contributed to an enrollment problem. The community needs for the school to grow. Yet on-campus numbers are down. Despite repeated requests from the faculty, there is no organized plan for widespread recruitment of academically qualified students. Many students who do come do not stay. Recently the college suffered the loss of 90 students between September and May.
In the past few years, many citizens have complained about programs and courses are cut. The rocess could be compared to killing a tree by pruning off a limb or two every few days. The Fine Arts program is almost gone, due to cuts in Art and Drama. Auto mechanics was eliminated, and nothing replaced it. Cosmetology was cut; there was no replacement.
Such problems are not unique to Clarendon College. They are not insurmountable. But denying that they exist will not make them go away. They must be admitted and addressed.
The community and the College have a wonderful opportunity at this time. Now is the time to select a new leader. He needs to be a man of proven ability, one who has shown that the can pick up the pieces and use them to build a growing, thriving institution. He needs to be a man of vision, who can dream of what the school could become the roll up his sleeves and convert that dream to reality. He must be a man of integrity that people can trust. Above all he must be a leader, a man that the community
will rally behind, because he cannot do it alone. It will take all of us working together.

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at $\$ 50,000$ and you receive a $\$ 5,000$ homestead exemption.

Who qualifies for an exemption? Anyone who owned a home on January ist (and used
it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to
a $\$ 5,000$ homestead exemption to lower their school a $\$ 5,000$ homestead exemption to lower their school
taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a taxes this year....and it doesn't matter if your home is a
house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available? If you're disabled-or if you're 65 years old or olderyou are entitled to an additional $\$ 10,000$ school tax
exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the
over- 65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.

Do I have to apply each year? No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home
in 1994 you won't need to reapply for 1995 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home-or if you've moved to a new home-you'll need to file for an exemption for 1995 . And if you turned 65 or became disabled during
additional exemptions.
