

The necessity for having someone in each Gubernatorial campaign to carry the Ferguson banner accounts, more than anything else, for the presence of Roy Sanderford, of Belton, as a candidate for The Sanderford Governor this year.

This fact was evident to those Candidacy who heard the Bell county senator in his Brownwood appearance last week when he

opened, so far as Brown county is concerned, political speaking in the 1936 campaign.

Mr. Sanderford's candidacy is based, his speech here evidenced, largely upon two issues: his three cents per dollar general sales tax, and an attack upon the Old Age Assistance law. Not that Mr. Sanderford is against the Old Age Assistance. He is too astute a candidate for that. He feels that it is inadequate, and lays its present inadequacy to the present Governor.

The general sales tax proposition is one which Governor Ferguson has advocated for a number of years, and one, which, if the reception it received in Brownwood is a fair indication, leaves the audience a bit cool. Possibly a sales tax will be necessary before we are on the right road, but certainly Texas is not ready for the experiment

Mr. Sanderford finds himself in an awkward position in criticizing the Old Age Assistance law, since he is a member of the Legislature, whose creature it is. The situation calls for a lengthy explanation on the part of the candidate, whose position is that while he was chairman of the free conference committee that wrote the bill, it really was the influence of Governor Allred that wrote bad features into the bill. The good features obviously were the creation of the candidate himself. In the matter of good accomplishments of the Legislature (of which the member can find few) the Governor had no important part.

It all works back to the matter of responsibility for legislation. If it is good, credit goes to the Legislature; if bad, blame is laid at the door of the Governor. And yet, Mr. Sanderford is loudest in proclaiming the ineffectuality of the Governor's legislative program.

Mr. Sanderford's candidacy has little to recommend it. He has none of the fire of his political leader, Mr. Ferguson, and the Ferguson platform falls a bit flat from his lips. Which causes us to believe that if Ferguson were unable to win with an effective campaigner and able votegetter like C. C. McDonald two years ago, there is little possibility of his candidate this year being a serious contender at the July primaries.

The world is a bit amazed this week with the speed with which the Italian army has subdued Ethiopia, and made of it an Italian province. That Italian victory, barring possible intervention by other Mussolini, The powerful nations, was inevitable was generally recognized, but

Conqueror even Mussolini did not expect the end to come so quickly. The victory places Italy in an entirely different light

before the world. Not that the victory was a popular one, for few civilized nations did not sympathize with the Ethiopian cause: but without question, the signal victory over the weak African nation has for the moment increased the prestige of Italian arms.

Will the victory be a hollow one? That is a question being pondered by European economists this week, and there are many who feel that Italy has lost through victory. African colonies are not such profitable investments for many of the European powers who have acquired more fertile lands than the Ethiopian hills afford. The cost of maintaining the Italian position in Africa will be burdensome; on which the music was based, was the cost of the war to date almost had bankrupt Mussolini's was once director of the theatre government, has cost to such an extent that victory was almost imperative. In no recent war, it is pointed out, has nearby, in 1885. the victor naion been economically stronger after the victory than before. Possibly Italy will lose in economic importance through its conquest of territory. Most observers believe Italy has gained little, if anything.

As for Ethiopia, possibly that country will be better off under the direction of Italy than it was under the reign of Haile Selassie. Mussolini promises the introduction of modern comforts, including the building of highways, establishing of schools, the introduction of improved health and sanitary conditions, and abolition of slavery. Very likely, once the humiliation of defeat is gone, the individual Ethiopian will be a happier person than he has been in the past. Exploitation of the country by Italy, which is to come, may not cause great worry to the individuals, used to exploitation by their own chieftains through countless generations. It is not too much to expect that the ignorant Ethiopian who trudges along through the streets of Addis Ababa, or wanders through the mountain wastes of an infertile country will be the real winner-the only one.
