MAKING SYRUP FROM WATERMELONS

Farmers of Choctaw county,

Oklahoma, are utilizing their surplus watermelons to make syrup. They have found that a delicious syrup, with a flavor somewhat similiar to sorghum syrup can be made from the juice of ripe watermelons. As no sugar is required in making the syrup and 1 gallon of syrup can be made from 10 gallons of the juice, many farmers are making it. Some of them are also making jelly and preserves from

In making watermelon syrup, the juice from ripe melons is strained and put in a boiler, pan or other open vessel over a hot fire. As it boils, it is kept skimmed. It is boiled until it begins to "rope" when dropped from a spoon or ladle. When cool, the syrup is about the same consistency as thick sorghum

In making jelly and preserves from cantaloupes, the fruit is peelel and cooked until all the juice can be strained off. Lemon juice or before it will make jelly. Preserves may be made from the fleshy part of the melons after the juice is strained off by adding sugar and
