There have been quite a number of insane cases, but to date, none of them have had to stay in the county jail but a few days, and in most cases have been placed in the asylum without being taken to jail at all. There have been a surprising number of people committed to the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium for treatment, and this, too is a part of the County Judge's duties. By virtue of his office, the County Judge is presiding officer of the Commissioner's court and this in itself is attended with multiplied duties and responsibilities, all of which I have performed with the best of my ability. 



The only remedy for the present would be keeping them clean.

With very little extra expenditure, Bronwood streets and alleys could be cleaned up and then kept clean. With this accomplished, half the battle would be over, for clean streets naturally cause a feeling of pride on the part of property owners who would thus be encouraged to improve their own premises. On the other hand, untidy streets are a discouragement to extra effort on the part of even ambitious citizens, and unless this essential work is done no amount of work on the part of committees can produce very satisfying results.

tural agent. By the use of high quality bulls, Bowen has improved his herd so that many of the young cows produce from 15 to 20 per cent more milk than their mothers and average higher in butterfat. An abundance of roughage is produced on the farm, and in addition a pit sile is filled for winter use.

While Bowen is a tenant farmer, he has greatly improved the pastures and meadows on the farm and cuts and puts up several thousand bales of hay each season.

FAIRFIELD .- "I am feeding 150 goats, 20 head of cattle and 30 hogs on the silage that I put in my trench silo last fall, and they are doing far better on it than on any other roughage I have ever fed," says Jim Sessions of Freestone ounty, according to J. W. Richards, Jr., county agricultural agent. Sessions dug the silo last fall and stored a 12 acre crop of hegari in it. He states that the total cost of this feed did not exceed \$1 per ton. This included the cost of growing the feed, building the silo, and storing the feed.

MOUNT VERNON-Nine dollars worth of Korean lespedeza sowed broadcast over a 10 acre Bermuda grass meadow in 1935 increased the profits in hay by \$45 on the farm of W. J. Morris, Franklin county farmer, according to W. N. Williamson county agricultural agent. The ground was prepared by cutting in one direction with a disc. After sowing lespedeza the disc was run the other way.

An excellent stand was obtained and the meadow yielded 300 bales of hay. Morris prices this mixed hay at 15 cents per bale more than ordinary Bermuda hay. He is preparing to plant 15 acres this year.





news dispatches carried accounts Thinning The of the death of James M. Beck, noted attorney and former solicitor general of the United States.

Likewise a former Congressman, Mr. Beck, Pennsylvania Republican, had been outspoken in his opposition to New Deal practices and during the past few months had devoted much time to bitter speeches denouncing the President.

His death brings to five the number of outstanding opponents of Roosevelt, both Democrats and Republicans, who have been removed by death during the past two years, Possibly there are more, but five come to mind at the moment.

First of these was Senator Cutting of New Mexico, whose aid was valuable to Roosevelt during the campaign, and whose opposition to his Chief had made him a serious contender for Republican nomination this year. Senator Cutting was killed in an airplane crash just as he was reaching the zenith of his spectacular political career. Many think he was headed for the Presidency.


The assassination of Huey Long removed an outspoken New Deal foe whose activity gave the Democratic ledaers much concern. His colleague in the United States Senate, the blind Senator Thomas D. Schall, was killed in an automobile accident in Washington, with an announced anti-Roosevelt speech undelivered. Heart failure took former Governor Ritchie of Maryland, New Deal opponent, before his time.

Of course, in no instance was political activity responsible in any way for the death of these distinguished Americans. But the anti-Roosevelt cause has certainly been dealt a heavy blow through a reduction in the number of its most important leaders through death.
