PRICE SUPPORT FOR SWEET POTATOES

To encourage farmers to cure and store as much as possible of this year's expected crop of 81 million bushels of sweet potatoes, farmers will be assured a minimum of \$1.50 per bushel for U.S. No. 1 or better grade cured sweet potatoes properly packed in bushel crates, baskets or hampers and offered during January, and \$1.65 per bushel beginning February 1, 1944. Prices of U. S. sweet potatoes containing not less than 75 percent No. 1 quality will be 15 cents per bushel less than the above prices. her retailer's selling price exceeds the top legal price for that commodity, she should call it to his attention. Most grocers and dealers are honest and patriotic. They are operating short-handed and are burdened by extra work due to wartime conditions. When mistakes are called to their attention, they usually try to correct them. **Report Violations**

However, if a retailer will not correct an obvious mistake, or if the housewife knows that he constantly and willfully violates price regulations, she should refuse to buy from him and should write to the price Panel of her local War Price and Rationing Board. In her letter she should include as many facts as possible about the violation, giving a description of the item and the illegal price asked for it by the retailer. She should sign her name and address, which will not be made public without her permission.



Recruiting for the Women's Army Corps has taken a decided swing upward, according to Lieut. Jessie Gardner, officer in charge of WAC recruiting for the West Texas Recruiting and Induction District.

"Age requirements for enlistment in the Women's Army Corps have been changed to include women from 20 to 50 years of age, inclusive. Many twenty-year old women are now enlisting," Lieut. Gardner said. Applicants must present birth

certificate (or affidavit in lieu thereof) and pass the Army physical examination. There are no educational requirements for the WAC other than passing the mental alertness test. Twenty-year old women must have the consent of their parents.

"Now that the Women's Army Corps is a definite part of the Army of the United States, its members are accorded free mailing privileges and are eligible for Gov. Life Insurance. Ranks in the new Corps are equal to those in the Army," the Lieutenant concluded.

Women desiring full information concerning enlistment are invited to talk with recruiting officers at the nearest U. S. Army Recruiting Station or contact the U. S. Army Recruiting Office at 1114 Tenth Street in Lubbock.

DROPS BOMBS GATHERS CORN
