IV. THE WINDOWS OF THE HOUSE—THE EYES.

Text: I. Cor. 2:9.

PSEUDO ECONOMY
AND SCHOOLS

During this present dilemma of reducing governmental expenses, there is a tendency on the part of some pseudo economist to get the cart before the horse. The first thing that they think of is to reduce the school budget to the danger zone and thereby deprive the defenseless children of their just rights and privileges. People do this because they refuse to remove

These would-be economist do not stop to evaluate a child's chances for success and good citizenship if it is educated. They do not realize that only 2.15% of the state's income is spent for education. Why then try to adjust the economic ill of the state by jumping on the defenseless children?

In 1926, E. W. Lard made a study of over 7,000 people, from this study he learned that each year that a person is in High school is worth \$6000 and that each year that one is in college is worth \$18,000. He also learned from this study that 50% of those left school with an elementary education was depending upon others for support after they were 60 years of age.

Folks we are making a grave mistake if we fail to support our schools adequately.

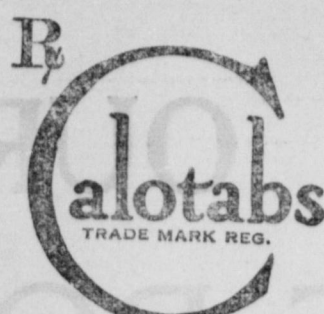
Charley Murphey Improves Town Home

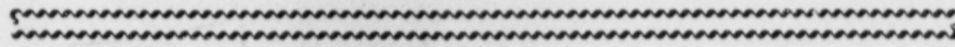
