

as a statewide project under sponsorship of the Texas Tax Board and is financed by WPA funds. R. Lee Clark is the district supervisor and Tom Kellum is the supervisor for Brown County for this work.

Both Mr. Clark and Mr. Kellum are well pleased with the cooperation given them by land owners and county officials in this survey. Practically every land owner on whom the field workers have called has been glad to give them the correct information.

The purpose of this survey is to discover land and other possessions now escaping taxation, the elimination of duplicate tax assessments, and classification of lands as to productivity in order to establish a basis for fair evaluation for tax purposes.

> Construction of an airport for Brownwood, to be built under a WPA project sponsored by the city, will be started as soon as labor is available, according to Carl Blasig. assistant director of WPA district 14. A 200-acre tract was secured by the city this week in a transaction by which some city property and a cash payment was traded in exchange for the airport site, the tract formerly used for the county poor farm. The project was one of four or five such projects in Texas approved by the government.

The airport site is situated four miles north of the city a short distance off of highway 23 between Brownwood and Rising Star. Construction of the airport will give Brownwood its first standard, government approved airport. evitable within the next few Pass years, but that there is no cause to expect immediate war, now that the crisis has passed. The reasons are many. Germany, in spite of hurried preparations, in spite of statements by Hitler, in spite of the military attitude of its people, is not yet prepared for war. With 650,000 men under arms, and a reserve strength of some 1,400,000 more, Germany is not able to cope with France's standing army of 600,000 and England's 400,000. with a combined reserve strength of more than 1,500,000 men. Consider, too, that Italy, who might be brought into any international European problem, has the largest European standing army, 1,200,000 men under arms, and a reserve strength of nearly six million. France, too, has 2,500 airplanes, the largest European flying unit. France does not want war; England certainly does not want any war at the present time, and Germany is unprepared for a major conflict. Italy seemingly has her hands full with Ethopia. The time is not ripe for any conflict, and only some grave frontier incident along the Rhine could bring about a war at the present time. Germany has made a daring maneuver again, and once again seems to be getting away with it. The excuse for the militarization of the Rhine, in defiance of the treaty of Locarno. was the signing of the Franco-Soviet pact a few months ago. Meanwhile, although the World War is now nearly twenty years behind us, the lessons learned by America

*** in that conflict are still fresh in the memory of the people of this country. This is the best safeguard against our being drawn into any European war, no matter what the pretext might be. American people well remember the suffering and the cost of a major war, and will be loath to approve any move that might draw this country into any foreign entanglement. And, despite the criticism that has come following the huge military appropriations that will build up this country's military and naval strength. that action will do more to assure peace for the people of the United States than any other one thing.





High quality seed purchased from a reliable seed house will make those hours spent in weeding seem time well spent when your meals are enhanced by fresh peas, tender beans, and firm. sweet tomatoes, fresh from the vine.

Cheap seeds may be so old that there is no life left in them, or they may be of a badly-mixed variety unfit for planting. Since it helps to know the names of varieties which other gardeners have found satisfactory, some of them are listed here.

Hybrid sweet corn varieties like the Top Cross Bantam or Golden Cross Bantam are resistant to a common disease called "wilt". The ears are 7 to 8 inches long and have golden yellow kernels.
