This new law contains several drastic provisions for the protecchemical analysis of gasoline, and forbids the use of the word "gasoline" on any motor fuel falling below that standard. All such fuels must be labeled "Inferior Motor J. M. Sibley will preside at the Fuel" on all pumps which contain

Another provision is that every truck or carrier of motor fuel must be plainly labeled with the name of the distributor or maker, and every place where such fuel is stored must be marked in the same way. The new law also forbids sale of second-hand or used motor oil except when it is plainly labeled, "Reconditioned Motor Oil."

The law gives every Texas peace officer the right to inspect any vehicle hauling motor fuel, or any place where motor fuel is said, at

The Texas Good Roads Association, which backed the bill in order to recover some \$2,000,000 of highway funds, as well as \$1,000,000 for schools and an equal sum for the refunding of county bonds, issued a statement Saturday to the effect that the new measure will work with the Metcalfe-Harmon law "like the two jaws of a steel trap."

City Summer Water Rates To Become Effective Soon

In order to encourage better yards and gardens, the City Commission will authorize the summer water rates to begin with April

Under this rate, the first 3,000 gallons will cost \$1.50; the next B. T. S. Training School 2,000 gallons 30 cents a thousand. All over that amount will be charred for at the rate of 20 thousand gallons.

It is likely that a premium will be offered for the most beautiful yard of the season, however this idea is yet to be worked out.

New School Bill.

Senate Bill No. 387 has for its object the changing of school management as affecting the rural schools of the state.

If this bill becomes a law, the administration of the rural schools would become vested in a county board of seven members elected by popular vote of the county, they to serve six years. The county superintendent would be elected by this board.

This county board would exercise the functions now required of the common school trustees. School taxes and bond issues would not be affected.

Those sponsoring the bill claim that "Essentially the measure is one for county unit administration and is intended to co-ordinate and reduce the cost of supervision and administration of the public schools."

This editor sees no merit in the bill. In the first place let it be remembered that there is more local self government vested in your rural schools than any other one thing left you. If this bill becomes a law, the political ring of your
