CLARENDON WINS OVER 15 TOWNS IN TRACK MEET

Annual Track Meet Saturday Has Entries From Many Panhandle Schools

Scoring 44 points, the Clarendor High School track and field team won first place in the Clarendon College Invitation meet over teams from 15 cities.

The Pampa Harvesters finished in second place with 38 points.

Amarillo's Golden Sandies, with five of their mates in Lubbock. were third with 23 counters.

The other teams scored as follows: Memphis 19, Quitaque 15 Childress 12. Dumas 10. Shamrock Kelton 5, Groom 5, Lefors 3, Silverton 3, White Deer 2, and Hedley 0.

Hubert Reavis of Clarendon was high scorer with 15 points, winning first places in the high and low hurdles and the 220-yard dash His teammate, Lloyd Martin, was second with 13 tallies, winning second in the discus, first in one of the high hurdle heats, and first in the high jump with a leap of five feet, 11 inches.

In the hurdles and 220-yard dash events, the races were run in heats, with full credit going to placers, eliminating preliminary events.

The meet was held in a high wind and sandstorm.

Amarillo's second relay team won the feature event of the day, the mile relay. The victory came through the fine work of Jacobs, who started the final round five yards behind his Childress opponent. He overtook the Bobcat anchor man and ran him neck and neck to the finish line, putting up a great finish to remain in front.
