

Sharp says Lone Star Card directly saving taxpayers

AUSTIN — In a year-end analysis of Texas' welfare reform efforts, State Comptroller John Sharp said that 770,000 people have left the food stamp rolls over the past three years — with 13 percent of the decline directly due to the site's new Lone Star card.

The innovative electronic benefits delivery system is saving taxpayers an average of \$85.5 million a year.

Sharp staid an additional 31 percent of the drop in food stamp rolls over the past three years is attributable to the state's other comprehensive welfare reform efforts, many of which were first recommended in his 1995 A Partnership For Independence report.

We said from the beginning that the Lone Star card would help clean up the food stamp rolls and remove anyone who had no business receiving taxpayer funded benefits," Sharp said.

"Now that the card has been in place long enough for us to measure the results, it's clear that our original hopes were more than justified; the Lone Star card has cut the food stamp rolls by more than 100,000 people," Sharp said.

"Few innovations in state government anywhere have worked as well as the Lone Star card," Sharp said.

coupons with the Lone Star card's electronic delivery system back in 1991. In 1995, lawmakers also approved the majority of his A Partnership For Independence proposals.

Sharp's year-end analysis covers the period from January 1995, when the Lone Star Card was being piloted in the Houston area, to October 1997 - nearly three full years - and is based on data reported by the Texas Department of Human Services, which runs the federal food stamp program in the state.

The new electronic card was implemented across the state in phases throughout 1995. Since then, the overall number of Texas food stamp recipients has fallen from 2.62 million to 1.85 million, a decrease of 770,000, according to DHS.

"The state of Texas showed vision in creating the Lone Star system, which has a 99.9 percent availability rate while processing 93 million transactions a year," DHS Commissioner Eric M. Bost said.

Greg Coler, President of Transactive Corporation, the Austin-based operator of the new electronic system, said the Texas system has come to serve as model nationwide for efficiency and effectiveness in delivering public benefits.

'The success of the Lone Star card has proven State lawmakers first approved Sharp's to the rest of the nation that this system plays a central role in welfare reform," Coler said.

"While taxpayer savings are welcome, the real purpose of the card was to return food stamps to their original goal, feeding hungry children," Sharp said

The Comptroller's analysis concluded that Texas' robust economy accounts for slightly more than half of the total decline in food stamp cases in the state since January 1995.


The analysis also showed that sweeping welfare reforms enacted by state lawmakers have helped the state tighten its eligibility requirements, encourage job placement, and produce accurate and up-to-date records of food stamp recipients.

"The Lone Star card has had the same positive effect in Texas as finger imaging and other welfare reform programs have had in other states, flagging people who aren't eligible for benefits and removing them from the rolls," Sharp said.

The Lone Star card has also changed the way needy Texans shop for their groceries, according to Joe Williams, executive director of the Texas on Hwy. 70 North. Gulf Coast Grocers Association in Houston.

"With the Lone Star card, our food stamp customers now have the luxury of buying fresh food for their families when they need it," Williams said. "No longer do recipients purchase 75 percent of their food during the first week of the month for fear that their coupons will be lost or stolen."
