

Family allowances are now payeach), E (1 gal.), R and TT (5 gals. able to the dependents of all seveach), all issued for 3 months en grades of enlisted men. They

Provision is made for an initial family allowance payment for the active service in a pay status. The full amount of this initial payment is borne by the government.

The new bill provides for three classes of dependents, A, B, and B-1, instead of two classes as formerly. The new Class B-1, consists of parents, brothers, sisters dependent upon the enlisted man for chief support. Class B dependents consist of parents, brothers and sisters who are dependent on the enlisted man for a substantial portion of their support. Grandchildren are no longer included. Class A dependents remain the same, a wife or child.





H. M. Breedlove announced that he has information from WFA and OPA concerning a simplified procedure under which farmers and other producers may determine whether or not they are eligible to slaughter without a license or permit and to consume meat without giving up ration

OPA has changed its meat rationing regulation, Mr. Breedlove said, to simplify requirements covering point-free home consumption of meat by livestock producers. WFA has authorized an individual to slaughter for home consumption without a license or permit if he is entitled under OPA regulations to consume meat point-free.

Under the OPA revision, according to Mr, Breedlove, a person may consume meat without giving up ration points only if he raised the livestock from birth, or for a period of 60 days immediately before slaughter, or the weight has increased 35 percent between the time he acquired the livestock and the time of slaughter.

In addition, to be considered eligible to slaughter and consume meat point-free, a person must have resided more than six months of each year on a farm which he operates, or must have visited the farm for the purpose of giving personal attention and supervision to the raising of livestock on his premises for at least a third of the time during the period on which he bases his claim to the right to consume the meat point-free.

"It is also the only way to avoid the possibility of a Christmas emergency in the transportation and postal services. If the public will cooperate by mailing their Christmas parcels during November, we can handle a small volume of light, last-minute mailings, such as cards, up to December 10 -but we can do that and avoid an emergency only if November is really 'Christmas Mailing Month."

Postal officials pointed out that the volume of mail now is far above any previous records, that railway cars by the hundreds have been diverted to war service and that the air lines have only about half as many planes as they once operated.

More than two hundred thousand extra temporary employee normally are employed to help with the holiday postal rush. This year, the extra employees will be largely women and high school boys and girls who are unable to work the long hours usually required and whose work will be relatively slow.

To deliver the Christmas mails on time, therefore, it is necessary that mailings be spread out over a longer period so that available transportation equipment and postal personnel can be used during more weeks. It will be utterly impossible to make the deliveries by Christmas if mailers wait until the last three weeks before the holiday, as in normal years.

There is another reason for shopping and mailing earlier than ever before. Retail stores are short-handed. Purchasers can avoid shopping in crowded stores, long waits for service, and other inconveniences of late shopping if they buy now. They will also doubtless have a better choice of merchandise than will be avail-

Postmaster General Walker observed that his warning is not an attempt to tell the public what to do; it is only an advance notifi-cation of what will happen if they mail late. He feels that the public is entitled to the facts, and that when they know them, they will decide to MAIL IN NOVEMBER.

DANES BLOW UP GERMANS

When the Danish Admiral Vedel had given his order that the fleet was to be either scuttled or sailed to Sweden, a detachment of German marines succeeded in getting on board the Danish naval ship "Ingolf". The German commander demanded 10 hostages as guarantee that the ship would not be blown up nor scuttled. The captain of the "Ingolf" said, "I can't prevent you from taking the hostages but I must call your attention to the fact that the seacocks are already open." The Germans put their ten hostages in a row on the deck, when suddenly a signal sounded, the whole Danish crew, hostages and all, jumped overboard, and deafening explosions shook the ship. One of the surest ways poultry producers can make the best use of available feed supplies is to cull all non-layers and low producers from their flocks, says J. R. Gillham, agriculture teacher.

"With feed supplies short, rigid culling of the flock is more important than ever before," he said. "By removing the low producing and unprofitable birds, the owner this way can get more eggs from his feed supply."

To get rid of poor layers, first remove all birds that are sick or otherwise unsound. A cripple or weak hen will not pay, and eventually will come down with disease. It is important, therefore, to remove birds that are sick or lame, decidedly undersized or underweight, or that have deformities or weaknesses of their backs,

In culling, cautioned Gillham, consideration should be given to whether the birds have had a fair chance to lay. Low production may be caused by improper feeding, crowded and unsanitary conditions, lice, mites, or intestinal

Ability to cull is easily acquired, but is best learned through actual handling of birds under experienced guidance. Poultry owners who cannot cull satisfactorily should call upon some neighbor or other experienced person to help them get the needed skill.

Farmers Urged To Improve Soil **Fertility**

Because soil defense is a vital part of national defense, B. F. Vance, Texas State AAA administrative officer, is urging every farmer in Texas to take full advantage of the AAA farm program to build soil fertility and increase farm production.

"Congress has provided financial assistance to farmers in the form of conservative payments for carrying out production practices on their farms," Vance said. "Improvement of soil fertility has always been an important part of any sound farming program. Now with the Nation needing every pound of good food that can be produced, enrichment of the soil is more important than ever.

"Probably the biggest and most important single task facing the farmers of Texas is the protection of their more fertile soils against the inroads of erosion, and the restoration of soil fertility on depleted areas. Farmers who cultivate poor soil cannot hope to make a large contribution to the war food production program," Vance said.

Fortunately, farmers can improve soil fertility and increase farm production by carrying out approved production practices such as terracing, growing and turning under green manure and cover crops of winter and summer legumes, applying phosphate, seeding and fertilizing old pastures, and establishing new improved pastures.

Conservation payments are made to farmers for carrying out these and other practices. Every farmer who builds terraces, grows legumes, improves pastures, applies phosphate, and otherwise improves the productivity of his soil is helping to win the war and is improving his own situation at the same time, Vance said.

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
