Terry county of which Brownfield is the capitol, is settled up largely by Parker county folks. Parker is pretty much like Jack and Palo Pinto which it joins, though Parker is more progressive. Parkerites pattern after the Hill-Billies of Switzerland except when the Swiss are yodeling the merits of cheese, Parkerites are yodeling the praises of their watermelons. Parkerites long used to the sandrock-capped hills from which to do their yodeling broadcast, find no such yodeling foundations in Terry where the mountains are minus and the hills are sand dunes.

FOLLOWING HIS THUNDER.

Upton Sinclair is a candidate for the governorship of California on the democratic ticket. He used to be a socialist until the democrats stole his thunder, or at least most of it. Wisely he has taken up the idea that "if you can't whip them, join them."

It was back in 1906 that Sinclair's writings were rocking the nation. His "Jungle" book depicting the wrongs against humanity in Chicago's packinghouse district shocked the nation and brought reforms in the packing house management.

His main plank in a new platform with which he expects to line up the demos, is that no man should have over \$50,000. If he gets that much, lift the excess off him if he adds more thereto. If he dies with more than this limit, his heirs should not feel cheated in death. The government takes all above the fifty thousand limit, then it is up to the children and the lawyers to divide the remainder.

DEPRESSION AND THE DRAGON.

Now that many have gone back to work in the larger cities, and even in some of the larger towns of Texas, loan sharks instantly beset the workers with a view of making loans. There was no demand for loans until the workers got a job. Now that it is safe to make a loan, the borrower may begin "webbing up" in a mesh of high interest rates that will enslave them for all time.

The loan shark is the dragon that keeps them awake nights and haunts their moments by day. Texas has no interest rate applying to these small loans made under "arrangements" with a loan shark. It may be 20 percent a month which means 240 percent a year. That is said to be the customary fee charged at present. In some instances, 5,000 percent has been charged on loans before they are repaid, according to information of the Houston Trades & Labor Assembly.

Twenty-three states permit a yearly interest rate of 42 percent on small loans. California took the lead recently in passing a law placing the interest charge limit at 12 percent.

The Beneficial Loan Corporation operating in twenty-three states pays its president \$150,000 a year. The vice president, who is a son of the president, gets half that sum. The corporation shows to have made handsome profits all through the depression.

Union labor is making the fight on loan sharks in Texas at this time. It means much to the laborers because their earnings do not go to buying necessities of life. Instead, these earnings go to feeding the dragon.

It is high time that some action should be taken by Texas' lawmakers that the handicapped citizenry may not become victims of a vicious system longer.

POLITICS BLOCKING HIGHWAY WORK.

Right at a time when unemployment relief and highway construction was ready to start in the Panhandle, enters the professional politician and those who expect to become such at the first opportunity, and the whole plan of unemployment relief is blocked. At least temporarily.

Soon after the Legislature met last Thursday, there was an agreement entered into between the Relief Commission, Federal Bureau of Public Roads and the Highway Department. This agreement would have permitted highway construction to begin at once.

Now comes along the questionable play of fan-fare politics. Because Larence Westbrook, chairman of the Relief Commission, was not willing that all relief funds be spent on highways knowing that thousands of deserving could not find employment at such work, he is being severely condemned by these selfish politicians. They even go so far as to ask that the Relief Commission set up by the last Legislature be abolished and a new one established. Or, failing in that, establishing some kind of a system by which the professional politicians can gain control of the federal and state bond funds to be used at their dictation regardless of the thousands of the state whose relief is imperative and for

whom the bond relief was voted.

Chairman Westbrook has taken the only honorable course. He has asked that no action be taken until his department renders a report showing how these funds have been handled in the past. The next question is, will the pie counter politicians and paid lobbyists permit Westbrook or any other man to give us a square deal without their dictation?

The Relief Commission does not object to highway work or the spending of a reasonable amount of funds thereon. Every thinking citizen knows that a portion of the funds could be used to good advantage on highways, but why not let the three duly accredited organizations named above go ahead with their work as they had agreed?

There is only one reason—rotten politics!

100 IN ONE GRAVE

(Louisville Courier-Journal)

Marked only by a weather-beaten marble slab, there is in Kentucky a large grave in which lie more than a hundred unknown soldiers. The dead belonged to a Confederate command that engaged in the Battle of Fishing Creek, in Pulaski County, that was fought on January 19, 1862.

The common grave in which those who fell were buried is located about a mile from the National Cemetery at Nancy, where many soldiers of the War Between the States are buried. The soldier cemetery at Nancy is well kept, but the site of the burial plot of

the unknown Confederates has been neglected.

The crumbling stone tablet contains the following carved inscription: "Beneath this mound rest in sleep that knows no waking more than 100 Confederate soldiers from Tennessee, Mississippi and Alabama, who were killed in the

Battle of Fishing Creek, January 19, 1862. We know not who they were but the whole world knows what they were. These died far from their homes, but they filled heroes' graves and glory keeps ceaseless watch about their tomb."

A movement has been started in Pulaski County to get patriotic societies and civic organizations interested in the proper care of the mound of the unknown soldiers, and to make of it a shrine that would be readily accessible and might attract those who motor that way.

Outside the locality, little appears to be known in a general way about the burial place of the unknown Confederate soldiers who fell in action. Many tourists are attracted to a soldier cemetery, and the Pulaski County mound that covers more than a hundred wearers of the Gray, would seem to offer a spot of gripping interest and patriotic appeal.

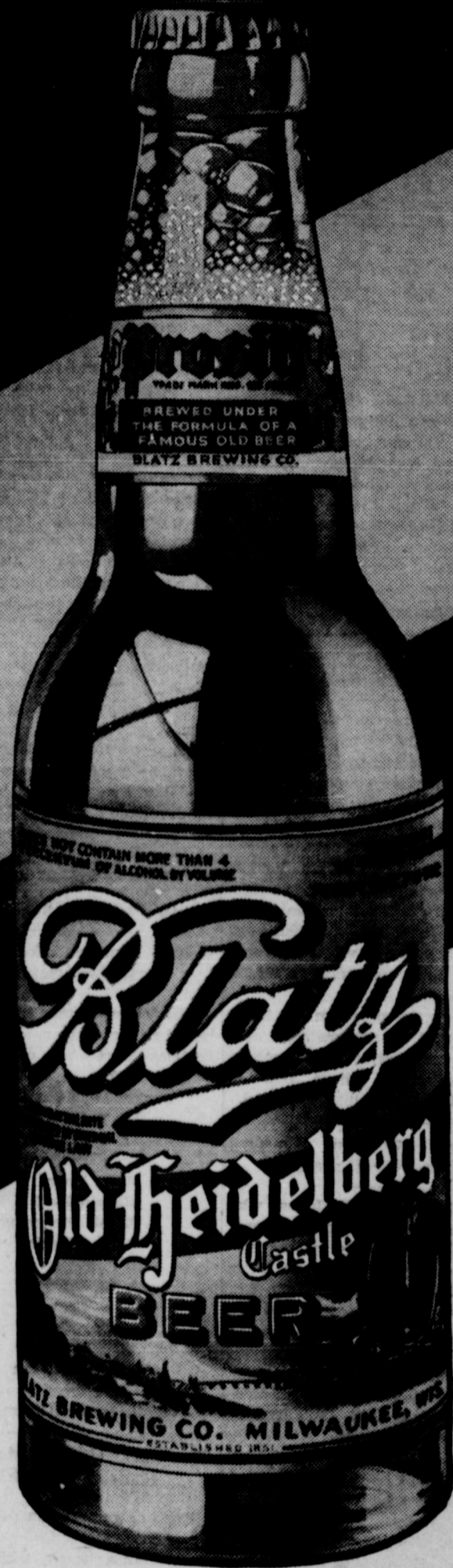

Living is cheaper in some respects. People used to pay \$1.50 for an opera ticket to see girls dressed as they are now.

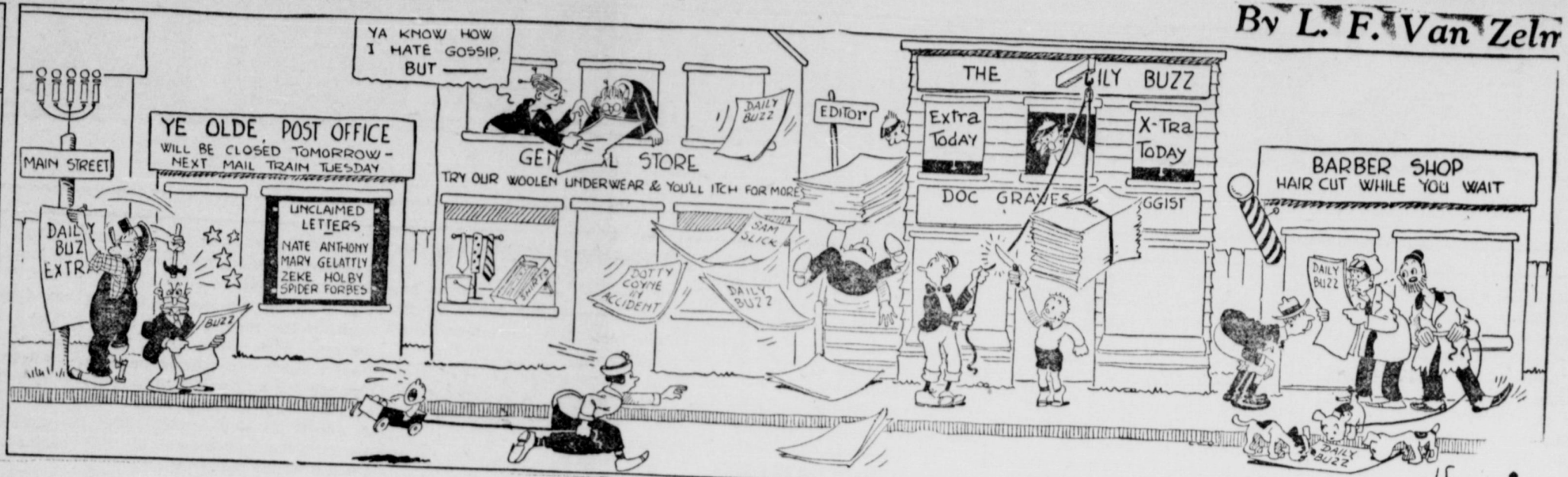
