OPENS TRINITY TO NAVIGATION.

Commodore B. M. Hatfield has landed at New Orleans after a perilous journey from Dallas down the Trinity, thence through intra-coastal canals. His idea was to demonstrate the feasibility of the Trinity river as a deep water stream suitable for navigation as far as Dallas up stream.

The flat boat used by the Commodore was covered with tarpaulin. Seven sturdy sons comprised the crew though he had but one left when he reached New Orleans. In reciting little incidents of his trip, the Commodore related how the crew used a block and tackle in navigating forty miles of Trinity where it had a 2-inch depth.

A mere sum of \$150 was the total cost of the trip not counting the labor of dragging the old tub in shallow water that amounted to practically the same thing as a field following an overflow. The Dallas Chamber of Commerce put up \$100 of the money and the organization has pictures to tell the cock-eyed world that Dallas has a port as well as an experienced Commodore.

ROUNDING UP THE CHISELERS.

There will be more, and there already has been a drop in the prices of a number of manufactured commodities. That is the next big job of the administration. During the next few days or weeks there will be announced reduced prices on practically every device of any consequence used in the home.

The administration is after the "controllers," too. Up to the present, a few men have controlled industry—manufactured and mining outputs in volume. Often in the past a dozen men sitting around a counsel table in a big city office could bring famine if they wished.

Apparently at this time the new day is breaking. The New Deal is becoming more involved. It is striking at the seat of our national woes.

Texas Man Returns From Maytag Convention

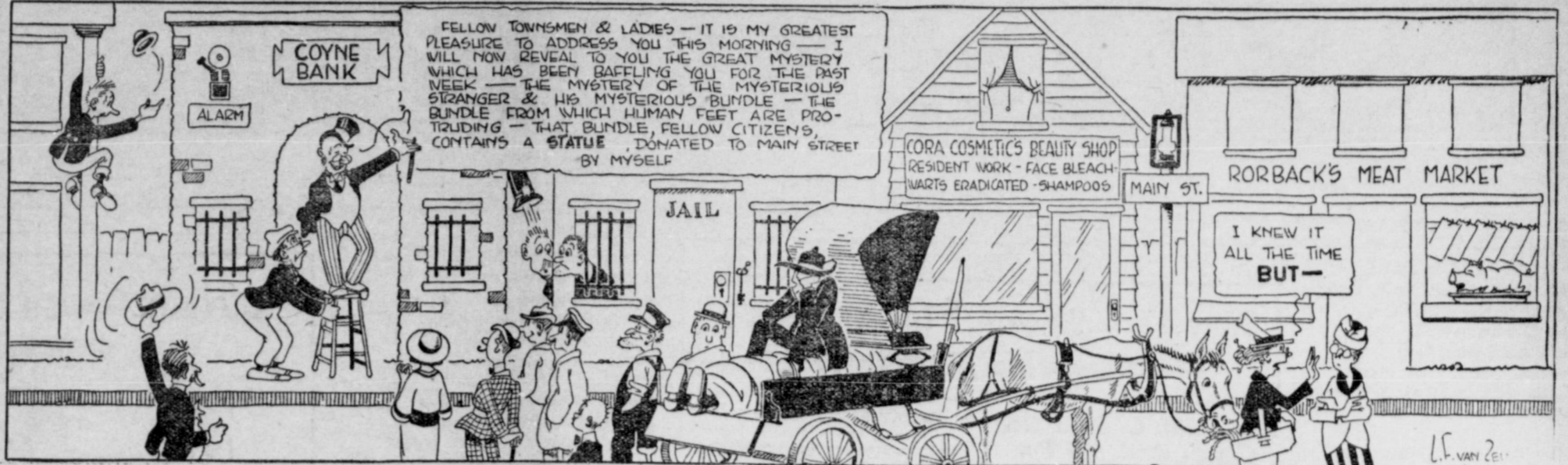

During the recess for cotton picking the pupils have been unable to give much thought to school affairs, but people have had a fairly



to expect in the way of returns from every dollar expended in feed. Research files of Purina Mills Experiment Farm yield the interesting chart here reproduced. Three groups of chicks tested on three separate mashes, all having the same values according to old methods of analysis, but differing in the manner in which the ingredients were proportioned, show a wide range of costs.

The difference between paying a feed cost of forty cents for ten pounds of chick growth and paying seventy-one cents is obviously so great that no poultry raiser can afford not to take warning. He should examine carefully his methods and his cost sheets. The feed consumed as against the weight developed by the chicks in a given period of time will soon tell him where his profits have gone.

City Buyers Test Selected Eggs in Many Ways

Methods of determining quality are constantly adding to the many troubles of the poultry raiser. Hotel chefs and dis-
