As known to all, the school has carried on for the past three years, and has had the full nine months school each year, but to do this it has been necessary to reduce the teachers' salaries approximately forty per cent, and the Board has eliminated every cent of expense that it was possible to eliminate, and yet, after making all these reductions and eliminating entire departments from the curriculum. there was a deficiency as of January 1, 1934, of \$19,348.40. and in addition to that there is \$3,000.00 of bonds, the principal of which has been defaulted, and same has been due since April and July, respectively, of last year.

The Board thinks that it is unwise to continue increasing this deficit, and further thinks that unless there is a substantial tax payment made before the 1st day of February, it will, in all probability, be necessary to close the schools at the end of February or sometime during the month of March, 1934. This it would regret very much, as it would deprive the children of the best part of the school year, and would cause the school to lose its affiliation, and hurt the community generally.

This is an appeal from the School Board to the taxpayers and patrons of the district to co-operate with it in keeping the school open for another nine months term, by paying all school taxes, but if any taxpayer is unable to pay all of his school taxes, then pay the same in installments, and if every

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





A certain man decided to test the merchants of a town and he gave each of his employees a five dollar bill. They were instructed to go to local stores and make a small purchase, tendering the \$5 bill in payment. If the clerk did not suggest the purchase of some other item, only the first item was to be bought.

Although each employee had been instructed to spend the entire \$5 in making purchases, if suggestions were made by the clerks, the five employees returned with \$21.40 of the \$25 given to them to spend!

This interesting experiment tells a truthful story that may well be turned into profit. There is a lesson there that every merchant in this community might well learn. There are too many of us who have drifted into a legarthy of believing that there is no business to be had. "People haven't any money" is a specious plea. They may not have

All too often merchants are like a certain garage man. A customer had an old car which he had decided to trade in for a new one. He went to the dealer intending to talk trade. The dealer killed his own sale by extolling the virtues of his service department and his voluntary suggestion that the old car could be made "good as new" for \$28. Not once did it occur to the dealer that his customer was a prospect for a new car.

For goodness sake Mr. Merchant let's give the people a chance to buy before we say they WON'T buy. Try making additional suggestions for sales. Set a goal of increasing sales ten percent by instructing clerks to offer suggestions. With prices advancing due to inflation there is ample reason for making suggestions that will prove profitable.

Along with this suggestion may we add that this newspaper provides a medium of increasing sales and an hour spent in preparing an advertisement for its columns will pay much bigger dividends than discussing the hard times.


