He will be accompanied on the auto trip to Alabama and Florida by his son E. F. Bryan of Amarillo. Both men are expecting to leave soon and their many friends here wish them a happy journey and a safe return. Perhaps the elder Mr. Bryan will tell the public what he saw and what he thinks about it when he gets back to grand old Donley county.

Oklahoma Labor Holiday Postponed In Oil Field

Pending conciliation conferences between representatives of certain major oil companies and their employees in the Seminole district, a 48-hour labor "holiday" scheduled for today has been postponed indefinitely.

This announcement was made by Dr. George Stocking of the National Petroleum Labor Policy Board, who is arranging negotiations between the oil companies and officials of the oil workers' local of more than 5,000 men.

Memphis Boy Killed Sunday Near Corsicana

Everette Dodson, aged 17, was instantly killed Sunday afternoon on Highway 75 at a point six miles north of Corsicana when his car was struck by one containing six negroes.

Dodson is said to have driven off the main highway almost into the harrow pit in an effort to escape the swerving car as it came sweeping down the wide highway. The negroes were jailed at Corsicana on a charge of negligent homicide.
