### THOSE PROVERBIAL CHICKENS.

Nations as well as individuals some times find the "chickens coming home to roost." France has had her credit torpedoed in America because she would not pay. Revolution is threatening in France. Her well-being over which she gloated for many years following the war ,has gone 'flooey.' Her leaders claim to be "deeply hurt" because her credit has been even questioned. Thousands of Americans are deeply hurt because of relatives having been killed and died of wounds and disease in saving a nation of "frogs" void of any sense of appreciation or feeling for common humanity.

#### GIVE THE "LAW" A CHANCE.

Many are now inclined to think that Texas is sorely in need of a Ranger force. A squad of men going in twos in a modern car "loaded for bear." A clumsy motorcycle is a poor vehicle with which to combat murderous outlaws. A highway cop can easily be shot to pieces while parking his machine.

Texas does need an efficient Ranger force modernly equipped. Canadian mounted police "get their man" as a time honored custom. States like New Jersey have autopolice who operate over the state with plenty of arms and amunition and authority to put a stop to intra-state outlaws. Texas needs to change her tactics to cope with a 1934 model outlaw as they coped with cattle rustlers of the long ago.

County, town and city law enforcement officials cannot cope with the situation because of the small number so authorized, and the limited equipment. They are doing their best in the main, but it simply cannot be done as it should be

### JONES SCORES ANOTHER VICTORY.

It was Marvin Jones, congressman from this district who first advanced the idea that beef and dairy producers should share in the emoluments of governmental financial paternal-

The bills providing for two hundred million dollars to help the cattle industry were sent from Washington to Miami, Florida by airplane where the President signed them. A plane carried the bills back to Washington. Senator Connally helped to secure approval in the Senate. This production adjustment measure provides for a set-up of four governmental departments.

Congressman Marvin Jones has been chairman of the powerful House Agriculture Committee of twenty-seven members for some years. Much of the assistance rendered the farmers the past year is directly due to his unceasing labors.

Are the girls to take charge of the outlaw situation in the southwest? That is the question uppermost in the minds of the "laws" right now since two basketball girls refused to be highjacked at Seminole, Oklahoma Saturday night of their new auto and personal valuables.

The bold bad man flourished a revolver and announced that he was "Pretty Boy" Floyd. Mildred knocked the gun skyward as two shots were fired. Both girls did battle grounding their victim and were stamping his worthless carcass when two men arrived to turn the would-be highjacker over to the law.

The next question is, is this an outburst of Americanism or simply a boost for athletics, or both? Does it mean that outlawry must continue in the southwest until such time as the girls-not women-shall take the law into their own hands and protect the officers from further danger?




