Here's Who Can Vote In Saturday Primary

Persons who have moved to Texas from another state since January 1, 1933, but who have lived in the state at least a year forthcoming Democratic primary, Donley County officials said yesterday.

Such voters may go to the polls on election day and make affidavit that they have lived in the state at least a year, but that they were not here by January 1. 1933.

These persons and others who come within the following requirements may cast their ballots in the primary, officials said:

1. Persons who paid their poll who present their poll tax receip that they have paid the tax.

2. Persons who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1933 (not 1934) and who claim their any time prior to the day of the

3. Those persons who have become 60 years of age since January 1, 1933 (not 1934) and who claim their exemption at the polls or at the tax collector's office.

4. MORE IMPORTANT THAN GOVERNOR.

As a rule, very little attention is paid to the record of the candidate for lieutenant-governor, and yet, from an actual legislation point of view, he is of more importance than the governor. The lieutenant-governor by appointing free conference committees of the senate in which legislation is largely shaped, and whose action often determines the fate of bills, wields enormous power.

There are six candidates for this office. One is without any legislative experience. One is a member of the Legislature and the other four are members of the Senate.

Senator Walter Woodul of Houston, attorney for a number of large corporations of which he boasts, has a record in the senate of having favored his clients with his votes on bills affecting them. To elect him, would place a corporation attorney at the head of the senate where he would have an opportunity of serving them more faithfully. Senator Joe Moore, another candidate for the same office, is pretty much along the same line after having favored corporations more times than he has those who elected him to office. He is a Hunt county man.

Two men in this race, John W. Hornsby of Austin and Ben F. Berkeley of Alpine near Elpaso, are also members of the Senate. Both of these men voted for the lobby bill that would have required senators to make affidavit as to whom they were serving while serving the public at the same time. Berkeley has an excellent record in the senate for having worked in the interests of all the state as well as his own west Texas section. He is a retired physician now engaged in banking and ranching.

GULLING THE GULLIBLE.

This editor is in receipt of an invitation from the president of the State A & M College at College Station asking him to attend a press conference during the Short Course the fore part of August. The president hastens to assure the writer that he will learn better how to serve the College as a free publicity agent.

We don't doubt it. There are many things to be learned, chiefly among them is how to live while giving away space free to a state institution that is plenty able to pay for it. They pay every other employee except the publicity agent who is supposed to help them put over their deal by telling the folks what great things have been accomplished down

"We extend you a most cordial invitation to be present during the Short Course and believe that you will enjoy your contacts," president Walton writes. We don't doubt it a bit. But who is going to pay our expenses while being trained to give the College better service. The county agents and others will be paid and none of them are going to get very far without some publicity, but the publisher who donates the free publicity is not going to get very far donating his expenses, time and space either.

Government head employees and others should learn that newspapers that carry the message to the public are entitled to some compensation for services just the same as any other government employee.

SPECIAL INTERESTS GET BUSY.

A new law passed by the last session of congress has injected a new issue into Texas politics, an issue that is being guarded by the large unscrupulous corporations more than

Until the passage of this law above referred to, corporations resorted to the hidden mysteries of the federal court for relief when challenged by the individual, or the public. This was especially the case when, for instance, any attempt was made to reduce phone rates.

The first relief from this one-sided questionable practice that was legally right but morally wrong, is the new law that requires the big corporations to seek their legal remedy in the district courts the same as an individual or smaller

This being the case, every effort is now being made to cure the election of men favorable to corporations. Men who will favor them in the passage of laws, the interpretation of laws and the enforcement of laws.

The governor, lieutenant-governor, senators, legislators, trict attorney candidates will have corporate attention in the elections this year. They will be hand-picked with ut-

As a concrete example as to how this would work out in the higher offices, suppose that Clint Small should by some chance be elected governor, and Walter Woodul lieuant-governor. Both are corporation lawyers. Both are ing backed in their races by money alleged to have been

This is one of the many reasons why we should have a strong lobby law as advocated by Jimmie Allred. No wonder some of the other candidates have lost sight of their own merits, if they have any, and have trained their guns on Allred in a tirade of lies and villification of the noble reputation of a man who cannot be bribed.



An average of two burglaries each week would make over 100 offenses within a year's time. Compare this with the record at Clarendon A Clarendon officer only three burglary cases reported during the past year.

one year is an unusual record; so is two or three every week.

Something new in the way of handling such cases has been reported here. Several persons who were robbed have been reported dealing directly with the offenders rather than through the local police, paying in cash for the return of their stolen property. Such action will only tend to increase the epidemic of robberies.

The situation is a difficult one to deal with, apparently. Police facilities will not allow a net of watchman throughout the city each night. However, the situation might be relieved by a careful check-up of questionable characters appearing on the streets at late hours, apparently for no good purpose.




