With the trend of state politics, those who oppose Jim Ferguson's political interests find much solace in the fact that the state democratic convention is to meet soon at Galveston. Ferguson was elected a member of the state committee to succeed Jed Adams, resigned, some months ago, but never confirmed by the national committee. Ferguson will not have many backers at the state meet. In fact it is said that the big majority will be highly in favor of burrying "Fergusonism" forever and ever.

Allred's first acts will be to secure the passage of a strict lobby law to prevent members of the state law-making bodies from working the state while at the same time "working for" some one else without being forced to tell the public about it.

Relief measures will come in for a big share of attention with an equitable distribution of help to all parts of the state. Many other imperative measures of protection will be looked after.

When Jimmie Allred takes office as governor of Texas next January 7th, he will be the youngest governor the state ever had with the exception of Dan Moody, who was 32 when he assumed those duties in 1926.

VICTIMS OF PROFITEERING.

Big business is fully aware that the fangs of the antitrust laws have been extracted by the NRA. Instance the \$17,000,000 oil suit instituted by Attorney General Allred. Suits that are pending a final decision during the month of September in the higher court.

The industrial barons are now out in the open and do not want to see the Blue Eagle jump. It has certain important attributes that they are extremely eager to have retained. What they are after is the elimination of government control of monopoly that they may fleece the buying public as a great many are doing right now.

Industrial barons now set the price on the greater part of what the farmer produces, and to a great extent set the price on everything that the consumer has to buy.

JIMMIE ALLRED'S FIRST STATEMENT.

When victory seemed assured, the first statement from Jimmie Allred carried volumes of humility, appreciation, emotion and dedication to the welfare of the people of Texas in the following words:

"To me, this is an hour of great emotion and it is difficult to express in words the tumult of appreciation, of humility and of consecration to the welfare of Texas - - - -I shall dedicate myself to the tasks ahead. I approach these problems fully realizing my inability to successfully deal with them without the whole-hearted co-operation of the Legislature and all the people. I crave their confidence and help.

"I want to be a good winner. I hold no ill will against those who opposed me in the past or in this campaign. I hope that, as the nominee of the party, and, I trust, the next Governor of Texas, I shall have their help and cooperation at all times."

PAYING PUBLIC SERVANTS.

Texas has far too many public servants. They are both underworked and underpaid. Especially does this condition apply to the two legislative bodies. Some states have gotten along very well with one "house" of lawmakers. Texas has two-the house of representatives and the senate. Members of a state law-making body should be paid enough to remove them from the employ of other interests while they are serving the state. In order to pay them more, the number should be cut down. This plan has worked in Nebraska and number of other states, and will in Texas if given a trial.

Our governor never did get his just dues in the matter of salary. It costs too much to be elected to the office in comparison with the salary paid. If we may expect better men for the job, we must pay more. Better salaries generally attract better men. Only in a few instances do we have men or women willing to make a personal sacrifice in the interests of the people.

THAT WHITE ELEPHANT AGAIN.

Ever so often we have a dreamer bob up. Some times it is worth while. The latest idea to receive birth at the hands of the 'brain trusters' is for the government to own and operate all the transportation companies. That would include rail, water, truck, bus and airplane lines.

The government operated the railroads during the World War. Millions were wasted and the experiment cost Uncle Sam's taxpayers billions of dollars to get loose from

Only recently we saw another example of government control in the air mail service. It took only about two weeks for us to see twenty-three men killed in trying to perform a service for which they were supposed to have been trained in army service. The air mail plan was a miserable failure except for the fact that an army weakness was exposed.

As we view it, we need more business in government, and less government in business. We need an equitable governmental regulation of transportation only.

Texas Centennial Will Honor Memory

World is Asked to Celebrate Century of Romance Where Patriotism Never Dies

Corsicana, Texas, August 15 .-Although he had a vision of an empire in Texas, Stephen F. Austin, the great colonizer, could not mirror the Texas that is today.

Although his compatriots of the same era of the early 1830's, Green DeWitt, Edwards, and others predicted great things for the undeveloped empire they were founding, they could not forsee the mighty commonwealth of a cent-

With dogged perseverance Stephen F. Austin, "Father of Texas", stood by his purpose, including time in prisons, long sojourns among a strange people in a strange country, distinguished service in civil life, finally to fall a victim of pneumonia just a short time after he had been made Secretary of State in the Texas Republic by Sam Houston.

For three days he had labored in the quaint capitol building at Columbia on the Brazos River. The weather was cold, there was no heat and the fatal disease took hold. His last act was for Texas. His last hours were spent in framing documents for presentation to the United States government which eventually was to result in the annexation of the Republic of Texas.

He lay in State at the capitol for two days and was buried on the estate of a sister near Velasco. It is a far cry from the Texas of the days of Stephen F. Austin and the Texas of today.

It is this century of progress that the State will celebrate with its great Centennial exposition in

That century of advancement is one of the outstanding events of all history

Then schools were few, the buildings were of log. The childrer tracked an unmarked wilderness in some cases for miles to reach the little building where one teacher for a period of three and four months taught the rudiments of an education to a mixed assembly of children and of grades.

Then most of the settlers were along the rivers, because there was no method of transportation, save by water, ox wagon or on

Then no oil fields, no gas fields, no coal mines, no mighty manufacturing plants dotted the landscape over the broad expanse of the State.

One of Austin's colonists, in a letter which has been preserved, even writes that a Bible could not e found in the settlement.

From the oppression of a despotic government the colonists rebelled.

They were commanded by the former Governor of Tennessee, the bosom friend of Andrew Jackson, General Sam Houston won the sixteenth decisive battle of world history, this on April 21, of 1836.

But prior to that on March 2 at old Washington-on-the-Brazos a band of Texans had solemnly declared that State to be a free and independent Republic. They realized in the making of that Declaration they were inviting and most certainly would endure a sanguinary conflict with the

In the conflict intervening bloody battles were fought.

As a result Texas has its sacred shrine of the Alamo. It has its Lexington-Gonzales. It has its Goliad. It has its ancient mission and fortress of Refugio. It has the thrilling events centering around Nacogdoches.

Texans of today have a century of romance, a century marked by valiant deeds of men and women century registering the most phenomenal progress ever recorded by a people to celebrate in

It is in the commemoration of this past, which shall be the outstanding feature of the celebration, that Texas will hold its Centennial of 1936.

While it is paying due and proper homage to the founders of our present civilization, it shall also, this Centennial, accurately portray the progress of the century along material, spiritual, cultural, educational, social and business lines.
