





Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, noted pioneer woman suffrage leader, and herself no doubt one of the foremost women of the present generation in America, has selected the ten outstanding women of the Selecting The Nation in 1935. Her list contains such well known names as Big Shots Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt,

Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, Omelia Earhart Putnam and Mrs. Charles A. Lindberg, together with a group of those not so

well known in this part of the country.

We have no desire to question Mrs. Catt's authority to name the outstanding women of America, nor can we dispute the claim any of the ten named have to the recognition so accorded them. No doubt Mrs. Catt is as qualified as anyone else to select the outstanding members of her sex. We doubt, however, whether any one woman, or any set of women or men, could possibly know enough about all of the women of America to arbitrarily set down the names of the ten most outstanding.

It is interesting to note, for example, that none of the women lives West of Ohio or south of Washington, with the exception of Mrs. Owen, whose home is in Florida, but whose claim for notable achievement comes from service in Washington and Denmark. Does Mrs. Catt feel that it is necessary to live or perform service within earshot of New York City in order to achieve greatness? Or is it implied that in the vast three-fourths of the United States, including the Southwest, the Middle West and the West Coast, not one notable woman resides? This may be true, but we doubt it.

Very likely the name of the list should be changed from the Outstanding Women of the Nation, to the Outstanding Women with whom Mrs. Catt has come in con-

Much emphasis is being placed by Republican leaders upon the statement, accredited to President Roosevelt, that if the United States Constitution does not give recognition to the New Deal laws, that it Why Not should be changed. Mr. Roose-

velt did not make a direct state-

ment of this nature, to be sure, nor do his political opponents claim that he did. However, certain of his public statements can be so interpreted, and have been by those who now seem to feel that any change in the Constitution would be a grave error.

Change It?

While we do not see any great need for a Constitutional amendment at this time, we do not subscribe to the theory that it is treason to suggest any change that leaders might think would improve our government or our living conditions. The Constitution, great document that it is, was never intended to be infallible. The men who wrote it wisely made provision for its amendment to meet changing needs of a growing Nation, and a score of times since its adoption have the states voted to incorporate into it proposed changes. In fact, the Constitution was only a few months old when a group of amendments were proposed by Thomas Jefferson and adopted.

It is possible that unwarranted attempts to amend the Constitution will be made at the coming session of Congress. But no session has been complete in recent years without numerous proposed amendments being introduced. Efforts to change it are made constantly. And if such changes are considered, by Congress and the required number of States, then it will be no disgrace to attach to the noble document one more qualifying amendment.

Pathfinder, an interesting weekly published in Washington, prints this week a chart compiled by the Cleveland Trust Company, showing the five worst depressions in United States history, translated Increasing into terms of business activity. The depressions of 1825, 1839, Prosperity 1873, 1893 and 1929 are graphically shown in the chart, which indicates the business activity, above or below normal during the period over which the depression extended.

It is hopeful to note that most of them extended for a period of approximately six years, and that the present depression now is in its sixth year. The 1929 depression however, is by far the worst and longest in the business history of the United States. Whereas in other depressions, business dropped only some 20 points below normal, business in 1932 and 1933 was nearly 50 points below the normal mark. The diagram, too, shows that we are still far below par, and that business remains something more than 20 points below the normal mark.

There are many indications, however, that conditions are gradually getting better throughout the country.

The nation is beginning to realize the horror of automobile deaths that reached a total of 35,000 last year. Not so well realized, but perhaps even more horrible, is the situation of those who were involv-"Better Off ed in automobile crashes, were Dead" not killed--but would be better off if they had been.

Their ghastly plight has been described in a new booklet by J. C. Furnas, author of the famed "--And Sudden Death," entitled "Better Off Dead." Here is an excerpt:

"They weren't doing more than 45 around a slight curve. But centrifugal pull had dragged them a couple of feet the wrong side of the white line-one of those semihead-on- angling crashes . . . Two passengers, bleeding, unconscious, were loaded into the ambulance. They were on the point of driving away when the policeman discovered the third.

"He was doubled up like a broken stick and thrust halfway through the narrow back window of the wreck, his head between his knees. They didn't dare try to unbend him till they reached the hospital. He was still alive and conscious. He had proved that by stealing the policeman's gun and trying to shoot himself.

"The spine was snapped clean, bent at an acute angle, and the bare end protruded from a rent in the skin like the stump of a horrible, bony tail.

"Thanks to the doctors that man is stil alive. He has been operated on 25 times. He is always in acute pain and paralyzed from the waist down."

Too horrible, too nauseating for print? Perhaps it is -but it's the truth. And it doesn't describe an isolated example. Thousands of people have emerged from automobile accidents to become helpless, pain-ridden cripples all their lives. They live on to remind us of the awful price we pay for speed, for recklessness, for incompetence at the wheel. Yet their agonies will not be extirely in vain if they teach the lesson that will save us from becoming bers of that tragic legion who would be "Better Off

THE FAR-VIEW

Perspective is getting the right slant on things whether they be pictures or circumstances. Any work of art or situation in life is not clear if out of perspective. To an artist perspective is the key to success-without it he is no artist. So with us, in this art of living, if we lose perspective, we lose the true purpose of life.

The far-view, or perspective, is a good habit to cultivate every day. When looking out of the window of a fast moving train, the near view causes the fence posts and corn stalks to dance by in one dizzy whirl which coases when we take the far-view to the calm hills and peaceful horizon. Just so, with our petty problems and worries, which will be gone in a week from now.


For the want of the far-view many persons of our own day have lost their perspective in money matters. I remember as a child my father telling of a miserly old man -a veritable Silas Marner - who got his dollars so close to his eyes he shut out the sunlight. Even yet do I mentally see two silver dollars where his spectacles were. Poor old man-he lost his perspective.

Some husiness men are working harder and faster as the years roll on, hoping to accumulate enough to "lay off" sometime in large luxuriant homes and say within themselves, "my soul, take thine ease." What happens? About that time health breaks and their savings go largely to the hospital.

From a Chicago office on the twenty-fifth floor, the view of Lake Michigan was superb. A rising young editor sat with his back to the view, facing day in and day out, a flat tan-painted wall. "Look what's behind you," I said to him one day, looking out of the window, "I haven't time," he said gruffly. "You've lost your perspective at far too young an age." I remarked.

Many students come for counsel asking: "What course shall I pursue? Shall I take a job now, if offered, or finish my last year of university work?' My answer is: "Get the far-view. Do now what ten years from now you will wish you had done. Be willing to sacrifice any immediate end for the larger future good." Perhaps in our student days we too were mentally near-sighted, failing to fit each day's task into our life's plan, perhaps emphasizing credits rather than knowledge, and knowledge more than wisdom. In later years, perhaps spiritually near-sighted. we still forget the far-view of how we are daily growing old. Because of a too near view of this life many have missed the life eternal.

Processions of men can be seen in Holland on Christmas going through the streets behind leaders who carry a lighted star on a pole. All who follow chant melodiously "Gloria in excelsis."





mailed in unsealed envelopes require only 11/2 cents postage. The sender is allowed to sign his name to these cards without a change in rate, but no written message other lar greeting can be sent with the card at this rate. Cards in sealed regular 3 cents postage. Sealed cards sent to persons in the city require 2 cents postage.

Packages should be securely wrapped and tied before they are presented at the postoffice for mailing. Senders are asked not to seal a package unless they place on it a printed label saying, 'Fourth Class. May Be Opened for Postal Until the fourteenth century, Inspection.'
