for the table. His product is "battery" fed. That means the bird from a chick to market size never sees the sur in fact very little light at all since the windows are shaded and painted. The bird is a royal product, eating and sleeping and drinking at will all hours of the day and night.

Battery fed chicks do not 'roost' as we commonly understand the roosting proposition. They don't know how because they are grown in coop-like affairs. They become used to the artificial light and eat and drink any hour, inside a poultry house made for the business. These royal birds are produced







Identity of the N. T. Church Article X

DOCTRINE and PRACTICE-The corruption of the government of the Church naturally led to the corruption of everything connected with Christianity. Of the doctrine and practices a few of the outstanding practices with the approximate dates, of their formal adoption in this apostasy; Holy Water, 120 A. D., Penance, 157; Latin Mass, 394; The substitution of infant baptism for that of believers also originated in the third century. It was contended that baptism was regeneration in the sense of washing away original sin that infants were depraved by original sin, and could not be saved without this washing away of that sin, and therefore they baptized infants that they might be saved. It might be wise to call attention here to the fact that the Church of Christ oday is often accused of teaching baptismal regeneration; but the accusation is false. While we stand with Christ and the Apostles that baptism is essential to salvation, and that withou it no man can be saved, (Mk.16:16) (Acts 2:38; 22:16) (I Pet. 3:21) yet baptism in its essential form, is the intelligent act of a penitent believer. But we notice other doctrinal innovations. Extreme Unction came in 588; Purgatory, 593; Instrumental Music in the worship, 66; Transubstantiation, 1000; C libacy, 1015; Indulgences, 1190; Auricular Confession, 1215; Sprink ling, for Baptism, 1311. By the latter date Catholicism was practically grown. Its practices did not spring into existance in a day, or even in a year, but they were usually widespread and popular before being formally incorporated as, a part of the ritual or practice. For example, sprinkling has been used in emergencies since the year 251 A. D., but was not formally sanctioned until nearly 1110 years later. The apostasy was gradual, and Catholicism slowly grew into being and took form-no certain place or date marks its beginning as she

under the most rigid sanitary conditions. They walk on a close mesh of net wire. All droppings fall away from the bird. His home is cleaned daily.

The water is scientifically treated to avoid contamination. The temperature is kept just right by artificial heat. Under such conditions, it is possible to produce a healthy bird. The meat has a very fine grain and a much better flavor than the bird grown under ordinary conditions. For this reason, there is a big demand for battery grown poultry.

Mr. Simpson produces a battery grown bird weighing two pounds to two and three-quarters within two months. He has about 1,600 birds now ranging in age from mere chicks to three pounders. As they become of a marketable weight, these are sold and more are added to keep the capacity of his excellently arranged plant go-
