Changes Are Made In Two County Offices

Last Minute Work on Part Of Supporters is Said to Have Made Changes

While there was little indication of a political upheaval on the surface, supporters of a number of candidates were quietly and diligently working the last three days of the campaign. These last minute efforts are credited with some change in the placid political waters.

A last minute drive was made against Allred, Douglass and at least two county officers, it is said by several since the polls closed.

Changes are to be made in the offices of county superintendent of schools and county treasurer, according to the will of the voters. G. W. Kavanaugh received 63 votes more than Sloan Baker, present incumbent.

Mrs. Lalar Wilkerson, third term candidate, was defeated by Mrs. Curtis E. Thompson by a wide margin. Mrs. Wilkerson, second up in the vote count, has announced that she will not enter a run-off campaign in August.

A tabulated form showing the county vote by box, as well as other voting, appears in this issue of the Leader. These tabulations are approximately correct. Late counting and reports by messenger made such reports inaccurate in some respects.

Those having no opponent are not shown in the final count as tabulated.

New Braunfels Lady Visits Daughter Here

Visiting Clarendon again after a lapse of eleven years, Mrs. E. C. Dickson of New Braunfels, Texas is here to spend the summer with her daughter, Mrs. C. W. Bennett. She arrived in Clarendon Friday.

Mrs. Dickson has spent 61 of her 84 years in Texas, her home being in Taylor from 1875 until recently. When Taylor celebrated her centennial, Mrs. Dickson was the oldest inhabitant in point of residence. She became the center of attraction seated on a float in the parade.

To Canvass Status Of Vote Saturday

Every Precinct is Expected To Send Delegate to Demo Meet Here Saturday

Returns of the first primary election held Saturday will be canvassed officially by the Donley county executive committee in the district court room here next Saturday, August 1, at 2 p. m. It was announced by county chairman W. P. Cagle Monday.

All ballot boxes and sealed reports are delivered to the county chairman according to the primary election laws of Texas.

The canvass will show approximately 2273 votes polled in Donley county. The next largest poll is said to have been in 1932 when Donley polled 2,233 votes.

Every precinct in the county is expected to have a delegate to assist in the canvassing of the returns here Saturday. This wish is expressed by Chairman Cagle.

SMALL WINS BY NEAR 2,000 VOTES

Douglass Leads in Carson, Gray, Hutchinson and Hall Counties

Tabulations on the state senatorial race late Tuesday totaled 49,057. Small was credited with 25,446 and Douglass 23,611.

Counties most favorable to Small were Randall, Moore, Hemphill and Lipscomb, and most favorable to Douglass were Carson, Hutchinson, Gray and Hall.

Judge Fires was running third until belated Donley county boxes reported Monday. These returns placed Judge Fires in second place.

The race between the three men was exceptionally close, and sets a precedent in this district. Judge Moss and Judge Fires have already entered actively into the campaign for the run-off vote August 22nd.

Gov. James V. Allred is elected to a second term without the necessity of a run-off, on the basis of returns compiled today by the Texas Election Bureau. The 37-year-old governor continues to pile up a majority over his four opponents, with Tom Hunter, his nearest opponent trailing by more than 235,000 votes.

Hunter received quite a bit of the Ferguson backers of former years. He has a number of diligent and prominent supporters in Donley who never stopped working for his interests.

Sanderford trailed Brooks, the low man over the state. The Donley county vote shows Allred 1,180; Brooks 116; Fischer 482; Hunter 426; Sanderford 69.

Leading his opponent in all four of the counties of the 122nd legislative district, Eugene Worley, young Shamrock attorney, was re-elected representative of Donley Collingsworth, Wheeler and Gray counties, defeating his opponent E. C. Puryear, more than 3 to 1.

Worley polled a total of 9,053 votes and Puryear, 2,784. Young Puryear is the son of John Puryear of Wellington, whom Worley defeated for the same office two years ago.

The votes by counties were: Donley—Worley 1,323, Puryear 576; Collingsworth—Worley 1,506, Puryear 463; Wheeler—Worley 2,377, Puryear 760; Gray—Worley 3,847, Puryear 985.

Club boys will speak on the advantages of the 4-H club work.

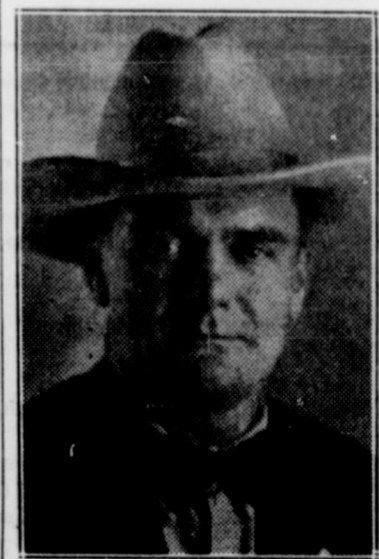
The program is being sponsored by county agent H. M. Breedlove.

Kemps Spend Week High In Mountains

Find Plenty of Ice on Top Pike's Peak, But Little Rain Signs Noted

Returning here Monday after spending a week in the Pikes Peak region, Mr. and Mrs. Kemp were really glad to get back home and in a section where crops looked more prosperous.

Some time was spent at Manitou, Cripple Creek and Colorado Springs and nearby sections. No rain was seen until the return trip was begun. A flood fell as they came over Raton Pass, and extended for forty miles east making that portion of the dirt highway almost impassable.

Tourists and others from many states in the drouth belt were in the mountains to escape the terrific heat, Mr. Kemp states. All of them told the same story of no crops. Cattle were being rushed to market.

The drouth had affected the irrigation projects, a water shortage being noted in most places. Even the irrigated belt had sorry crops, Mr. Kemp states, because of a lack of water, and no crops were seen between here and Raton. Grass has been displaced by weeds.

Various ones from the dry belt told Mr. Kemp of putting up weeds for hay for their winter feed. "We think we have the best country of them all right here in old Donley county," Mr. Kemp stated Wednesday.

Voters Write Choice J. P. On Their Ballots

A CHECK SHEET FOR MURDER TRIALS.

The spectacle of the modern murder trial when in the hands of expert criminal attorneys adds to the disgust of criminal procedure and of so-called "justice" in this country. The recent circus trial in California involving the trial of a man for killing his wife by causing a rattlesnake to bite her and then later drowning her was a case in point. It brought sharp rebuke from respectable legal circles.

The usual method of procedure in cold-blooded murder cases is for the criminal lawyer to set about getting the sympathy of an indifferent and morbid public. This is done in many ways, usually by sob statements and interviews given out by the prisoner and followed by underground rumors attacking the character of the dead person.

This is followed by weeks of careful preparation of testimony and witnesses during which time it seems to the public the prosecution does little or nothing to offset the effects of the defense efforts.

Finally comes the trial. The dead woman, and it usually is a woman, is to all intents and purposes the one put on trial. Her character is blackened and her memory disgraced. Then every possible person and every possible angle is thrown into the trial to add to the tangled mess to insure the miscarriage of justice.

The result is usually an acquittal or a short sentence for a cold-blooded murder who should have been given the chair or hanged by the neck until he was dead. If a conviction, this is followed by appeal after appeal until the case finally wears out in court and the public assumes an attitude of "Oh, well, what is the use!" or else waits expectantly for an insanity plea or some other foolish excuse for escaping justice. Of course the procedure varies with the amount of money available for defense.

There are few counties in the country that have a decent score on this matter of murder convictions. Check your memory against the records and see the net result.

File this editorial and refer to it on any murder trial in session in the Panhandle at any time in the future—or anywhere else in America for that matter—and see if it doesn't run pretty true to form. We refer to the most despicable and inexcusable type of murders such as tying a helpless woman, binding tape over her eyes and thrusting her foot into a box containing hissing rattlesnakes or some other brutal and sadistic type of cold-blooded killing. Killing in self-defense, by drunken driving, or for some supposed point of honor falls into a different category and requires different court tactics. It seems that it is the most cruel, inexcusable and cold-blooded type of murder that turns courts into circus rings with judges, juries, and officers dangling on the end of the whip that is cracked by that mighty ringmaster, the expert criminal attorney. When such is the case, the Goddess Justice is ravished and respect for law dies. Is it any wonder we kill so often?

Holy City Exhibit Shows Religious Relics

Dallas, Texas, July 15.—One of the largest as well as finest religious art exhibits ever shown in this country is assembled in the Holy City at the head of the Midway at the Texas Centennial Central Exposition. Included in the exhibit are more than 200 authentic shrines of the Holy Land. The master piece of the display, however, is the 8 foot mother of pearl, hand carved cross designed and assembled by Antonio Bartlio in the Holy City of Jerusalem in the eighteenth century. The crucifix, which displays the fourteen stations in the life of Christ is made up of more than 15,000 pieces of mother of pearl and took more than ten years to complete.

The Lord's Last Supper, another art treasure, also executed by Bartlio is the only one of its kind in the world. Made of colored mother of pearl it delineates the detail of the Leonardo d'Vinci painting in the most minute conception. This carving is over 200 years old and contains over 3000 separate pieces of mother of pearl. There is a series of over 200 water colors depicting the story of both the Old and the New Testaments. These were done on actual location in the Holy Land. More than a million people visit-

ted the Holy Land exhibit during its two years' showing at the Century of Progress Exposition in Chicago and the unanimous expression of its many appreciative admirers was, "It is the next best thing to a trip to the Holy Land itself."

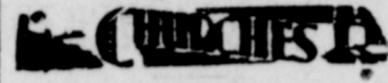

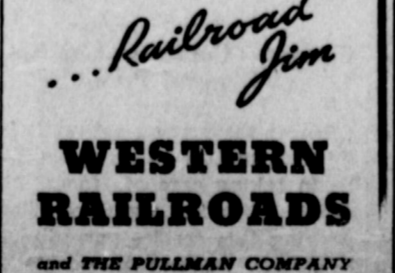

New Ford V-8 to Have Many Improvements

Important improvements in the interior treatment of Ford V-8 de luxe and standard body types including refinements in design of interior trim are now in production, it was announced today at the Ford Motor Company offices.

In addition to the interior changes, two new and attractive body finish colors are made available—armory green and light-fast maroon—which are standard in de luxe types.

The new treatment makes the Ford V-8 interiors substantially more attractive in the view of buyers who have inspected the new cars, and reflects a continuance of the Ford policy of adding such improvements whenever they become available, without waiting for year by model changes.

Important among the improvements is the addition of new accessories in the de luxe types. These include a new sport-type steering wheel with smart spring steel flexible spokes, a pull-wind 30-hour clock recessed in the rear vision mirror and a glove compartment lock. Chrome bands also have been added to the wheels.

The theme of the new interior trim of the de luxe body types is derived from a new walnut-grain finish for instrument panel and garnish moldings. The central section of the instrument panel is set off with chromium stripes. Knobs for the throttle, choke and instrument panel light switch and the

handle of the cigar lighter as well as the window lift and door handle escutcheons are finished to harmonize with the new finish, while the glove compartment and the windshield regulator handles are in chromium.

The interior upholstery also has been newly designed in piping and pillow effect, the fabrics used harmonizing with the new trim. A new style sidewall and door upholstery treatment also is used.

Improvements in the standard interiors include a new mahogany-grain finish on instrument panel and window moldings, new ash tray, new chrome-finish fittings, carpet, the new upholstery design, redesigned seat and back cushions and a choice of broadcloth or mohair upholstery.

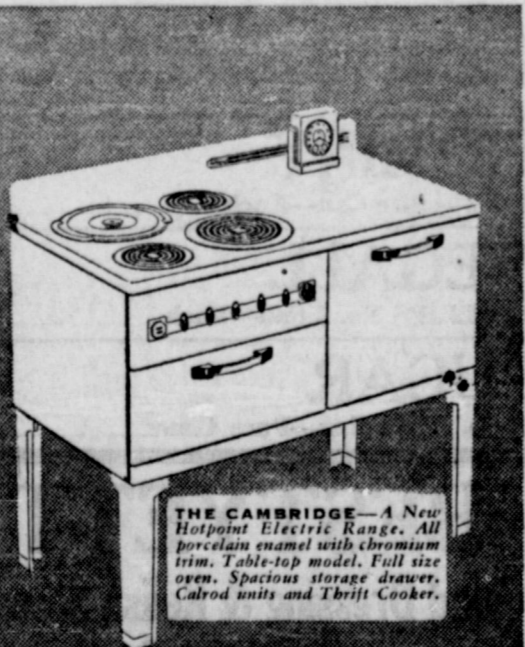

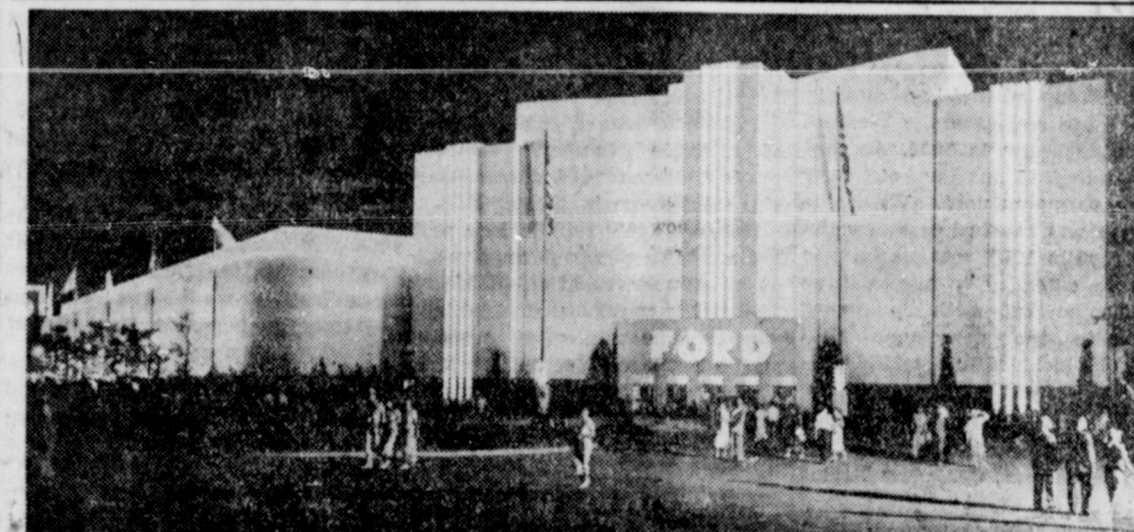

Sometimes it is, and yet wrecks continue as that one Monday night about 10:45 a mile west of Lelia Lake at the curve on the new roadbed on Highway 5.

A Dodge truck owned and driven by W. O. Rice who resides at 402 Adams street Amarillo was accompanied by Archie Gann.

A new V-8 driven by O. F. Dean of Dallas, and borrowed from a friend, figured in the side-swiping process. Dean was accompanied by two hitch-hikers, Vincent Coitrell and Edward Johnson.

Each driver blames the other. The truck driver stated that bright lights of the Ford blinded him, and he blinked for the dimmers.

The damaged vehicles indicated a side-swipe, sheriff Pierce stated. The Ford, after the impact, followed on the rim of the culvert, jumped the ditch, passed through a wire fence and rolled over only to right itself in the cotton patch some 150 yards from where it contacted the truck, the Sheriff stated.

The truck bed was scattered over the highway, but the machine left the scene under its own power.

The Ford left fenders were smashed to the bed. The rear portions smashed into a "wad" and glass splintered. About the only part of the Ford intact after the mishap was a tiny sign above the number plate which read, "drive carefully." The Ford was towed to Clarendon by a wrecker of the Palmer Motor Company, and Dean went to Dallas on a bus.

The truck driver lost his left arm in a car wreck last year near Amarillo. "I wouldn't be surprised if I don't get killed yet in a car wreck," he stated.

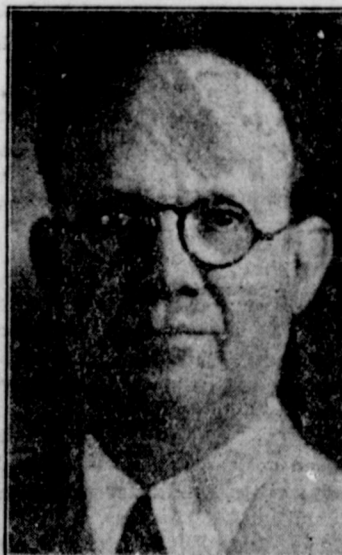

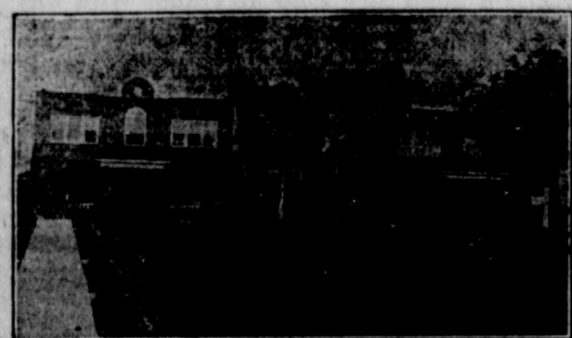

these human interest contacts was of inestimable value to him in public life while serving as a member of the Nebraska legislature and subsequently as Chairman of the State Railway Commission. His fairness in this latter capacity led to his appointment in Washington as manager of the Public Relations Car Service Division of the American Railway Association.

In December, 1932, he was selected by the western group of railroads to serve as their chairman and commissioner.

Concentrate in Newspapers
The group advertising activity on a large scale for the Western Railroads began in 1935. At that time a limited number of daily newspapers was used. When the decision was reached to renew the campaign in 1936, recognition was at once extended to the country weeklies so that both important phases in the newspaper field would be included in the 1936 program.

In discussing the progressive work of the western carriers for the current year, Chairman Taylor said:

"During the business depression railroads suffered as much as any industry, more than some. Consequently they were forced to curtail advertising expenditures and concentrate what budgets were available in the centers where most shipping and passenger traffic originates.

Action by Executives
"I know, however, that the railroad executives, individually, have been desirous of increasing the allotments for advertising in the weekly newspapers along their lines, realizing that these papers and the people who read them are the closest neighbors of the railroads.

"When the executives acting for the Association decided to advertise in newspapers again this year, they authorized us to include the weeklies. This is in addition to their individual line advertising.

"The decision to use the country weeklies is personally gratifying because of my former connection with that branch of the newspaper business."

A JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by striking out Section 20 thereof; providing for local option on the question of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes; providing that spirituous liquors, or liquors composed in whole or in part of the products of distillation shall not be sold for private profit, except to the State; providing that the Legislature shall pass laws relative to the sale, possession, transportation and manufacture of such spirituous liquors; providing for the establishment of State dispensaries; providing for the manufacture, sale, transportation, and possession of all liquors which are exclusively products of the fermentation process; providing that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold, bartered, or exchanged for beverage purposes in any county or political subdivision wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters of such county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and prescribing the form of ballot.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
 Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out Section 20 thereof and substituting in lieu thereof the following:
 "Article XVI. Section 20:

"(a) It is hereby declared to be the policy of this State that the open saloon shall not be reestablished. The sale of spirituous liquors, manufactured in whole or in part by means of the process of distillation and or liquors compounded and or composed in part of such spirituous distilled liquors, for private profit, is prohibited within this State except when such sale is made to the State. The State of Texas shall have the exclusive right to purchase at wholesale and to sell at retail such distilled spirituous liquors. Such sale shall be made only in unbroken packages and no such liquors shall be consumed on the premises where sold. The Legislature shall pass laws to prescribe regulations relative to the manufacture, sale, transportation, and possession of such spirituous liquors and relative to the establishment of State dispensaries; provided, however, the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the sale for private profit and possession of distilled liquors for medical, scientific and mechanical purposes.

"The manufacture, sale, transportation, and possession of all liquors, the alcoholic content of which is entirely and exclusively the result of the fermentation process is hereby authorized under such restrictions as may be authorized by law.
 "(b) The Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited or legalized within the prescribed limits; and such laws shall contain provisions for voting on the sale of intoxicating liquors of various types and various alcoholic content.
 "(c) In all counties, justice's precincts or incorporated towns or cities wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell, barter or exchange in any such county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication or any other intoxicants whatsoever, for beverage purposes, unless and until a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine such to be lawful; provided that this subsection shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties or political subdivisions thereof in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of

Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature."
 Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas, on the third day of November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment, shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for the establishment of a State Dispensary System having the exclusive sale of distilled liquors, and providing for local option."
 And those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for the establishment of a State Dispensary System having the exclusive sale of distilled liquors, and providing for local option."
 If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.
 Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.
 Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

 Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Section 48, a section to be known as Section 48a, and to read as follows:
 "Section 48a: In addition to the powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and or school districts, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty (\$180.00) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has not taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund of the moneys paid into the fund.
 All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, which is November 3rd, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:
 "For the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing Retirement and the creation of a Retirement fund for persons employed in

Public Schools and Colleges and Universities supported wholly or partly by the State."
 Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing Retirement and the creation of a Retirement fund for persons employed in Public Schools and in Colleges and Universities supported wholly or partly by the State."
 Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.
 Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

 "Sec. 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that the amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1937."
 Sec. 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:
 "Sec. 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."
