### COTTON IS ORPHAN IN TARIFF FAMILY.

Immediately upon his return from his goodwill trip to South America recently, President Roosevelt was asked to lend assistance in protecting cotton industries. As the matter now stands, every bushel of wheat entering our nation must pay a tariff duty of 42 cents per bushel; 25 cents per bushel on corn; 14 cents per pound on butter; 7 cents per pound on cheese. There is no tariff protecting the cotton grower or the manufacturer of cotton products against the invasion of cotton products produced by labor willing to work far below the American standards of living.

The next congress will be asked to pass laws assuring a reasonable protection of cotton grown in the United States and articles made therefrom against the competition of foreign growers of cotton, and cotton substitutes.

Principal low-priced competition in the cotton growing industry today comes from India, Egypt, China, Turkey and Russia, named in the order of their importance.

#### \* \* \* WHEN HOPES BECOME REALITY.

Our Panhandle citizens have been sustained on hope, backed by sheer determination, for the past five years. We never lose hope though promises may be broken.

Today, we continue to hope to see a closing of highway gaps as was promised during the past year. The Governor and Chairman Hines each promised faithfully to help us. But when the matter was boiled down, both were powerless without the help of two members of the State Highway Commission, Hines being only the chairman.

On February 15th next, Martin's term on the Commission expires. The Governor states that he will appoint a man in his stead who will cooperate with Mr. Hines. Until that time arrives, we may not expect any just consideration in highway building in the Panhandle other than the partially finished products that were built in our section the past several months. Our portion of the state asks only a fair consideration. We would not know how to ask a special favor since nothing of the kind has ever been discovered in the Panhandle of Texas. We've never for a moment lost faith in either the Governor or Mr. Hines.
