

## State Highway Men To Visit Clarendon Friday

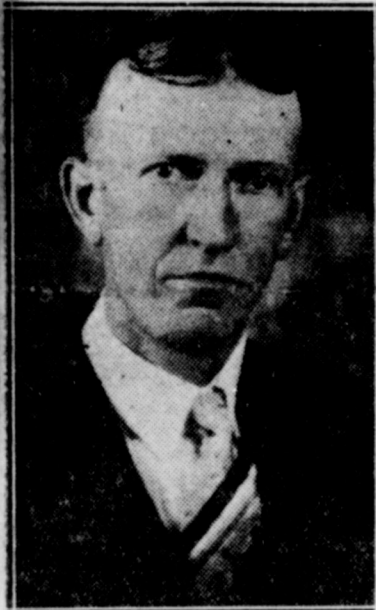
Judge Robert Lee Bobbitt, chairman of the state highway commission and Harry Hines, commission member, will be in Clarendon for a hearing and dinner tomorrow night, it was confirmed in a telephone conversation this morning.

John Wood, also of the commission, may not attend.

The hearing will concern paving Highway 88 from Pampa to Clarendon with an extension south to Turkey. It is the hope of highway enthusiasts to eventually consolidate highway 88, 18 and 30 to form a north-south highway to the Gulf.

The dinner will be at the First Christian Church at 8 o'clock. Judge Bobbitt will be principal speaker and W. H. Patrick toastmaster.

Letters from Pampa, Spur, Turkey, Miami, Perryton and other members of the 88-18 North-South highway organization, indicate a large attendance. The group was formed, recently, of towns along the proposed route, to endeavor to enlist state aid for the project. Odos Caraway, Clarendon, was elected president.

## Water Conservation Measure Signed By Governor Tuesday

Governor Alford, Tuesday, signed the Panhandle water conservation bill which will create a 32 county district to combat soil erosion.

The district will consist of Donley, Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Gray, Hall, Hale, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Liscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Farmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, Wheeler, Childress, Motley, Lamb and Bailey.

In the House, the bill had the solid backing of Gene Worley of Shamrock, Max Boyer of Dalhart, Bob Little of Amarillo, each of whom did yeoman service in behalf of the Panhandle.

The bill was introduced in the Senate by Clint Small and was passed by the House Saturday. A \$3,000 appropriation was contained in the measure.

The conservation bill provides a legal setup whereby the Panhandle districts, as agencies of the state, may cooperate with the federal government in soil and water conservation programs.

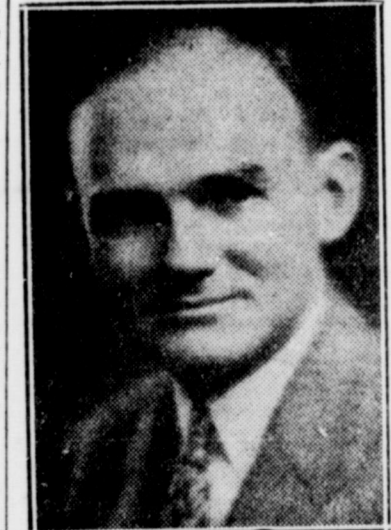
### City to Stage Clean-Up Week Here May 10-16

**RARITY OF CHRISTIAN CHARITY.**

The Latins throughout all history have been a more or less bloodthirsty bunch. They delight in human suffering. They brought to America the foulest forms of cruelty and practiced it upon the unsuspecting, harmless Indian.

Today, airplanes swoop down within a few hundred feet of defenseless women and children in cities of Spain and shower helpless humanity with machine gun bullets as they flee from their burning homes. The attackers have no other object except to terrorize helpless victims of a condition over which most of them had no control whatever.

Other nations must sit supinely by and see the slaughter progress simply because the greed of commercialism for the few must be considered before safety of the masses.

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**LOCKNEY BEACON BOOSTS.**

The 48 page Irrigation Issue of the Lockney Beacon under date of April 30th is the most comprehensive and accurate promotion issue by far ever before issued in West Texas.

Lockney is located in Floyd county where irrigation is made possible with pumping plants, some of them delivering as much as 1,000 gallons of pure water per minute by means of a centrifugal pump. That section overlays an underground river said to have been traced from Canada to the Gulf some years ago by a crew working under the U. S. Geodetic Survey. Power is obtained from Deisel engines, or electricity from a "high line" out of Plainview. Water costs from 25 cents to a dollar per acre.

Each well affords water for 200 acres of land. The depth of the wells vary from 135 feet upwards, but averages about 200 feet, we learn from this Beacon publication that sheds light on the irrigation possibilities to the world. The water lift is only 75 to 90 feet, we are told which gives the reader some idea of that underground river supply.

Land watered from two to four times produce a bale of cotton to the acre, 25 to 35 bushels of wheat, and other products in proportion.

The entire issue of this creditable publication is chock full of information not known to even adjoining counties to Floyd.

The publisher modestly gives all the credit to two young ladies for gathering the valuable information in this issue. They are Miss Jeane Suits, daughter of the publisher, and Miss Margaret Hage. Publisher J. L. Suits incidently did something toward the big issue by working almost 24 hours a day through the siege of getting it off the press. Congratulations, hats off to you all, and no doubt it "suits" every one. It certainly aught to.

**NEIGHBORLY SWAPS AT LONG RANGE**

From a South Dakota exchange we learn that the "Roaring Jim" river up there is out of her (or should we say his?) banks. This river was featured at times from 1928 to 1937 in national magazines as the one river without water and wells were dug in the stream bed. But now she (or he) is slopping over the banks threatening to inundate the alfalfa fields behind the dykes. WPA flood dams are being washed down stream. In 1897 an attempt was made to make of this a navigation stream. Farmers of that section are wondering if the "dry earth" has broken, as they mound up earth to save their hay crops from being washed away. All of which is some encouragement in old Donley county because we have been getting some "powerful" dusters from the Dakotas the past few years.—Donley County, (Texas) Leader.

Dear Mr. Estlack:  
 Your editorial "Longer Official Terms" which I have just read inspires this letter to you. Each of the different factions interested in this measure attempted to have it submitted as he or they thought best. There was a group, unfortunately in the minority, who were of the opinion we should not vote to continue ourselves in office for an additional two years and tried to amend the resolution accordingly. Every attempt failed by barely a few votes. I was also of the opinion that the other officers should not be perpetuated for another two years simply because the people did not vote for them for a four year term but for a two year term. I sent up an amendment providing for a recall of all officials affected under the terms of the resolution, but the previous question was put on and again we were in the minority and did not have an opportunity to have a vote on the recall measure. I agree with you in all your observations expressed in the editorial. The Senate will probably not act on it, but as a precaution I am submitting my recall provision to Small asking him to have it included if possible in the event the Senate should submit this resolution. The whole resolution is a mess as now written—in my opinion.

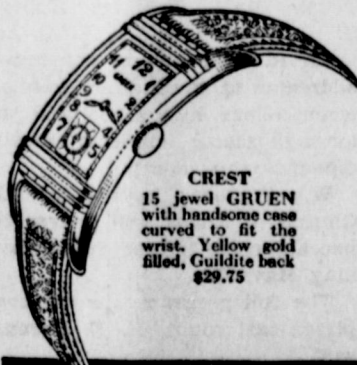

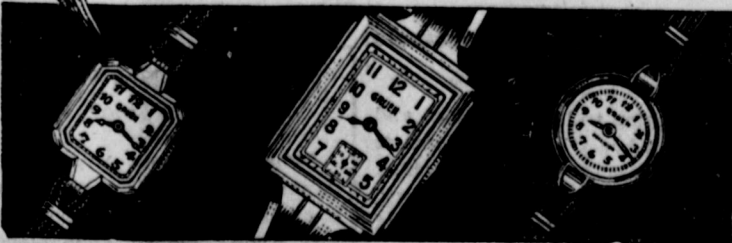

## MOUND BUILDERS NOW THOUGHT FORBEARS OF MODERN INDIANS

Poking back 2000 years into the Indian past of Illinois, University of Chicago archaeologists have found fresh evidence that the mound builders were not the mysterious race which local legend has sought to make them, but ancestors of known Indian tribes.

Two new mound builder "cultures" or periods of development were identified by the Chicago diggers, report leaders of their expeditions, Fay-Cooper Cole and Thorne Deuel, in a book "Rediscovering Illinois," just published.

Since 1925 student anthropologists at the university here have been working on Illinois archaeology, and intensive field studies were made of the mounds for three years. The finds are now classified and interpreted.

The oldest culture identified is called by the authors of this book the "Black Sand" age. Mound builders of this period, they state, were long-headed with Eskimoid characteristics, and were closely related to the older types of man found in the Southwest. They made coarse stone implements and simple pottery.

The next culture was truly Indian and is called by these archaeologists the "Red Ochre," because the mound builders of that time used red ochre in their burial mounds.

Most Mounds Looted  
Getting mounds that had not been previously looted was one of the problems of the expedition. Mounds are so common in Illinois that little care was taken of them in the past, and anybody who wanted to mine them was allowed to do so. In one county the Chicago survey found that of 655 mounds, more than 600 had been dug without yielding any information about the culture of their builders.

Fortunately, two private owners in Fulton county, near Peoria, kept the mounds on their property intact and made them available to the University of Chicago expedition. Joy Morton and Chester

Whitnah, the owners, set an example which was followed by other possessors of mounds, who likewise permitted digging by the Chicago group. But the most important finds were made in the Morton and Whitnah property.

Their sites were in a county bordering the Illinois river, ideal for Indians because of the woods and fields of wild rice known to abound there. Historic tribes of Indians never made any permanent settlement there, for some reason not clear, but the pre-historic tribes apparently did, because some 900 mounds were found there by the survey party. This provided a fruitful digging ground for the expedition. Their finds are described in detail with many photographs in the new publication of the University of Chicago Press.

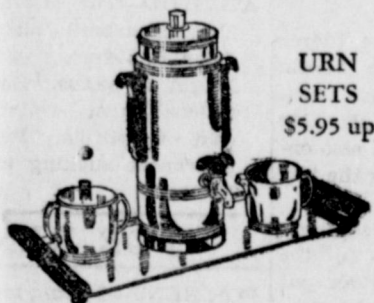

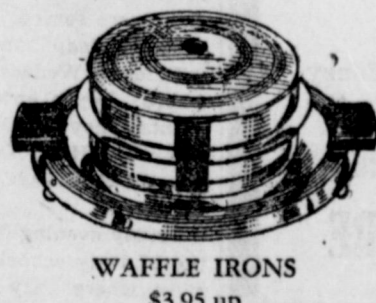

**Panhandle Game Fishing Season Opens June 1st**

Residents of the north 24 Panhandle counties who like to fish had to sigh and bear it Saturday morning when the season opened in all other portions of the state or they had to drive more than 100 miles to do some angling.

Private lakes in the Panhandle have been open to fishing and will remain open, according to accepted interpretations of the law.

Open season for game fish (bass and others) or to use artificial bait will not be until June 1 in the north Panhandle. Fishing in other parts of the state opened Saturday morning.

Counties closed by state law until June 1 are:

Dallam, Sherman, Ochiltree, Hansford, Hartley, Lipscomb, Roberts, Moore, Hutchinson, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Farmer, Bristcoe, Swisher, and Hall.

Reason for the difference in the opening date is that Panhandle sportsmen two years ago sent representatives to the State Legislature and asked that the season be closed in these counties during April and May instead of March and April. These sportsmen pointed out that the spawning season in this part of the state is much later than in other parts and the reproduction of fish was retarded by the disturbing of parent fish too early in the season.

So, residents of the above 24 counties could only sigh Saturday and get ready for another month of waiting before they can legally take game fish or use artificial bait.

**"PUTTING GOD FIRST"**
