

## IRA MERCHANT REPEATS FOR CITY GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

### County Agent Warns That Grasshoppers Will Soon Menace Donley Farm Crops

It appears that the grass hopper situation this year is going to be one of the Donley County farmers chief problems. The best method to fight the grass hopper situation is to use poisoned bran. Poison bran can be prepared and used as follows:

Course wheat bran—25 lbs.  
Paris green or white arsenic—1 lb.  
High grade amyl acetate—1 oz.  
Cane or sorgum molasses (Avoid corn syrup)—2 qts.  
Water sufficient to make a moist mash as explained below:  
Mix the bran and poison together thoroughly. Dilute the amyl acetate and molasses in about two gallons of water. Pour this liquid over the mixture of poison and bran until every particle is moist. Then make further additions of water and mix thoroughly until a mash is obtained that is quite moist, yet so it will fall apart after being tightly squeezed, and so may readily be sown broadcast.

This quantity of mash should be broadcast so as to cover about five acres. A good practice is to mix at night and sow early in the morning before nine o'clock, since the hoppers do not actively feed until the dew dries up. If it is desired to kill hoppers in grass land, sow over the entire acreage to be protected. Where they are migrating from fence rows or pastures into cultivated crops, sow the fence row on a fairly broad margin of the pasture, and also a broad margin of the cultivated crop with the mixture.

Some of the main things to be careful about in handling the poison is:

Do not place the mash in piles. Do not use lead arsenate but use Paris green or white arsenic.

If everyone who is noticing grass hoppers in their fields will try mixing a little poison and start a campaign against the grass hoppers there will be no trouble in killing them. But if one or two use the poison and others depend on the neighbors, the grass hoppers will give trouble. I believe that if everyone will do their bit to help control the situation, there will be no trouble with grass hoppers this year. Now is the time to start poisoning.

### Nonagenarian Visits Friends In Clarendon

### Missed Roll Call Two Times During Civil War Fighting Under Col. Shelley And Lieut. Bird in Hills of Tennessee

Looking back through the vista of years, T. L. Lovelace, aged 99, has an interesting account of life's vicissitudes to relate. Born near Decatur, Tennessee in 1838, he has been a citizen of Texas since 1886, thirty years of that time has been spent in Donley county near and in Hedley.

He "broke into" the Civil War, as he expressed it, in 1862. Col. Shelly and Lt. Bird were his commanding officers. He suffered hardships for lack of food, but was not wounded, sick or imprisoned during the time he saw rigorous service, except for a bullet hole through his hat top.

Eleven children were born to his family, nine lived to be grown and six are yet living. He also reared two grandchildren. A pioneer "after the manner born," he wore homespun clothing, worked with contrivances and farm tools of his own making largely. Worked oxen and came through it all with colors flying at top mast.

"Young men of today don't know how to work," he said in recounting present day problems. "They lack grit," stated this man of 99 years last March who retains

### JONES IS PLEDGED LAKE WORK FUNDS

### Refused To Drop Fight Till \$10,000,000 Is Promised Dust Bowl

WASHINGTON, June 2—At the conclusion of consideration of the \$1,500,000,000 relief appropriation by the House of Representatives, Tuesday night, a \$10,000,000 program for small reservoirs and dams in the Great Plains drought area was virtually assured.

Although the House dropped the amendment sponsored by Rep. Marvin Jones of Amarillo requiring that not less than \$10,000,000 of the relief appropriation be used on the program, Jones and his colleagues were given definite assurance by Henry L. Hopkins, WPA administrator, and Rep. Sam Rayburn, House leader, that the program would go ahead.

The Texan refused to drop his fight for his amendment earmarking the relief bill until he was specifically promised that at least \$10,000,000 would be spent in the "dust bowl" for pond and reservoir construction.

BABIES, BULLETS AND WAR.

From 1914 to 1917 war munitions manufacturers of this nation did most every thing conceived by human mind to drag us into the world conflict then running full blast in Europe.

Our neutrality course permitted American babies and bullets to travel together on belligerent munitions-laden ships exposed to submarine attack.

The munitions makers do not relish the thought, but Congress is going to have to vote for or against the munitions makers very soon.

Senator Borah of the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate urged immediate action Monday, that America safeguard her neutrality and keep out of war.

America must decide between profits and peace. Half-way neutrality laws of today will not keep us out of war. Profits cannot be taken out of war, neither can the burdens of war be equalized for labor, drafted men and capital.

In conclusion, may we quote from the Congressional Record under date of April 9, 1937, and under the title head of: "How Many Know:"

That Lamont du Pont, president of the most powerful industrial combination in the United States, thought "it was not helpful" to the peace of the world to have munitions makers going around trying to bribe governmental officials?

That the former president of the Navy League wrote of his desire to connive with the British Navy League to get rid of the London Naval Pact?

That the munitions makers made the Navy "pay through the nose" (this means the taxpayers) for ships in 1933 simply because the Navy needed the ships?

That a high admiral of the Navy planned to use Navy Day to defeat candidates for Congress?

That an Army general preferred to permit American military secrets to be sold abroad rather than let the munitions companies go without profits?

That a prominent banker and munitioner thought increased armaments might bring on war rather than promote peace?

That the Munitions Committee suggested a referendum to be held in 1938 on whether men should ever be drafted for service outside continental America?

We can and will defend the homeland at any cost. Outside of that principle, we have but one question to solve. Shall we forego profits and keep out of war?

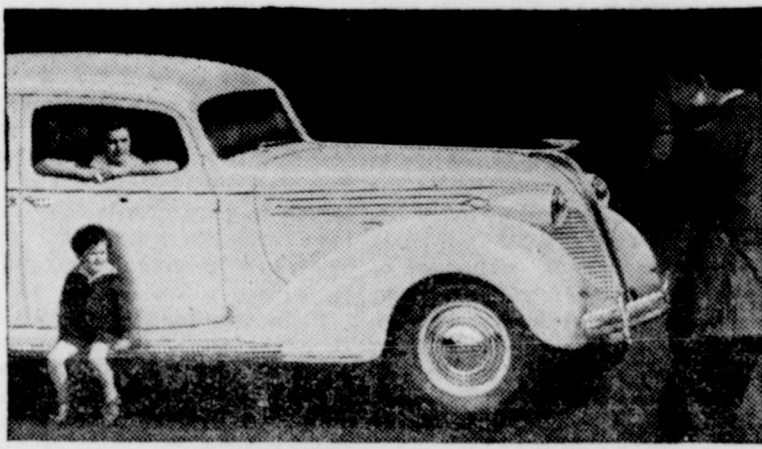

**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO STATE CONSTITUTION; AUGUST ELECTION**

**The State Pays For the Publication That Voters May Know What They Want to Do About the Matter. It is Now Up to the Voter**

**S. J. R. No. 9**  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Section 16, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas; providing that the Legislature shall authorize the incorporation of banking bodies and provide for the supervision and regulation of same; providing for all of the capital stock to be subscribed and paid for before charter issued; restricting foreign corporations from doing banking business; restricting corporate business to one place.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

**Section 1.** That Section 16, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The Legislature shall by general laws, authorize the incorporation of corporate bodies with banking and discounting privileges, and shall provide for a system of State supervision, regulation and control of such bodies which will adequately protect and secure the depositors and creditors thereof.

"No such corporate body shall be chartered until all of the authorized capital stock has been subscribed and paid for in full in cash. Such body corporate shall not be authorized to engage in business at more than one place which shall be designated in its charter.

"No foreign corporation, other than the national banks of the United States, shall be permitted to exercise banking or discounting privileges in this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937. At this election all voters favoring the proposed amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the following words:

"For the amendment of Section 16 to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the amount of the liability of stock-holders in State banks."

Those voters opposing said amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the following words:

"Against the amendment of Section 16 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the amount of the liability of stock-holders in State banks."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and to have same published as required by the Constitution and the amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such election.

**S. J. R. No. 16**  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 52d; providing that the Legislature may authorize by law, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, the adoption of a plan for the construction of paved roads and bridges or both in Harris County and in road districts therein; providing for the levy of a tax to pay for such construction; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication and election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

**Section 1.** That Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 52d, which shall read as follows:

"Section 52d: Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein so authorizing, a county or road district may collect an annual tax for a period

not exceeding five (5) years to create a fund for constructing lasting and permanent roads and bridges or both. No contract involving the expenditure of any of such fund shall be valid unless, when it is made, money shall be on hand in such fund.

"At such election, the Commissioners' Court shall submit for adoption a road plan and designate the amount of special tax to be levied; the number of years said tax is to be levied; the location, description, and character of the roads and bridges; and the estimated cost thereof. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters. Elections may be held from time to time to extend or discontinue said plan or to increase or diminish said tax. The Legislature shall enact laws prescribing the procedure hereunder.

"The provisions of this section shall apply only to Harris County and road districts therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds"; those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**H. J. R. No. 23**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 20 of Article VIII, providing that no property of any kind shall be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value; and giving the Legislature power to provide that the State and all governmental or political subdivisions or taxing districts may allow a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and providing that this Amendment shall become effective January 1, 1939; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of this Amendment; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and making an appropriation therefor; and prescribing the form of ballot.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
**Section 1.** That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to Article VIII to be known as Section 20 and to read as follows:  
"Section 20. No property of any kind in this State shall ever be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value nor shall any Board of Equalization of any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district within this State fix the value of any property for tax purposes at more than its fair cash market value; provided that in order to encourage the prompt payment of taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to provide that the taxpayer shall be allowed by the State and all governmental and political subdivisions and taxing districts of the State a three

per cent (3%) discount on ad valorem taxes due the State or due any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district of the State if such taxes are paid ninety (90) days before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a two per cent (2%) discount on said taxes if paid sixty (60) days before said taxes would become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a one per cent (1%) discount if said taxes are paid thirty (30) days before they would otherwise become delinquent. This amendment shall be effective January 1, 1939. The Legislature shall pass necessary laws for the proper administration of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 23rd day of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing, that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-c which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each, and providing for payment of such assistance or aid only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas and providing that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for assistance to such blind; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof and prescribing the form of ballot.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

**Section 1.** That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Article 51-c which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-c. The Legislature shall have the power by General Laws to provide, under such limitations and regulations and restrictions as may be deemed expedient, for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years,

and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person; such assistance or aid to be granted only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas; provided that no habitual criminal and no habitual drunkard and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided, further, that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for assistance to the needy blind as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein above provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Monday of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial aid for such payment."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial aid for such payment."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance to destitute children and for the payment of same not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) for one child or Twelve Dollars (\$12) for the children of any one family per month; further providing that the Legislature may impose such restrictions and regulations as to it may seem expedient; providing that the amount to be expended out of State funds in any one year for such assistance shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000); and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for assistance to destitute children; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof, and prescribing the form of ballot.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
**Section 1.** That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51d. Subject to the limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be provided by law, the Legislature shall have the power to provide for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years; such assistance shall not exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family; provided that the amount to be expended for such assistance out of State funds shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year. The Legislature may impose residential restrictions and such other restrictions, limitations, and regulations as to it may seem expedient.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial assistance for destitute children as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein above provided."

### Clarendon Man Sees Blue Ridge Section

#### Farming Done on Mountain Side at 45 Degree Angle Most Interesting

Naturally of a disposition to closely observe country and conditions, Roy L. Clayton saw many facts from a new angle on his first trip to the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina last week.

Mr. Clayton was a delegate to the national assembly of the Presbyterians at Montreat, N. C.

He took occasion to see some of the country by auto and bus while there, so different were the conditions one used to level West Texas. "Crops are no farther advanced there than here," he said, "but the fact that they farm on steep mountain sides among large rocks and actually produce good crops is a new item to any man's collection of mental storehouse."

He heard of a man who fell out of his field on to the highway and was forced to recuperate in a hospital. He had no doubt of it after seeing plows going just above a high cliff on a mountain side.

In the bottoms of the Savannah river he saw land producing 60 to 80 bushels of corn to the acre. Potash is used extensively for fertilizer, Mr. Clayton states. The mountains are not so high as those of our southwest, but the timber is greater and grows thicker and more luxuriant.

Mr. Clayton began the return trip by rail from Asheville, N. C., a school town amid a beautiful setting in the Blue Ridge mountains. He says he likes that section of country and may live there some time.
