

For the expiration date of an operator's license, add two years to this date, one year for commercial operator's and chauffeur's.

Any person who permits his license to expire, regardless of the type license, or the circumstances, will be required to pass the standard examination for renewal.

## Kerosene Users Urged To Save Fuel

Kerosene users-including everybody who uses kerosene for heating ,lighting, or cooking-are urged to be as saving of their fuel as possible. There is a shortage of kerosene which is likely to become acute with the approach of the heating season.

It is equally important that users of kerosene, or any other fuel oil, order their supplies now, although they may not be delivered for some time. Next winter there will be a shortage of delivery trucks and truck drivers. If customers will place their orders now, dealers can schedule deliveries throughout the summer months. By ordering early, the

when the first cold spell comes. In homes where kerosene is used for heating as well as lighting, fuel oil can be conserved by making sure that the house is properly heat-sealed and that facturer's original package with heating equipment is in good

Heat loss can be prevented by simple home improvements-insulation, storm windows, weather stripping, and calking. Unused rooms can be closed off and temperatures kept low during the night and while away from the house. It has been estimated that in an average home heated by oil, with a fuel cost of \$160 for the heating season, if the temperature each night is lowered 10 degrees for 8 hours, a saving of about 10 percent, or \$16.00 will result.

The postal service says to send durable articles which will stand up six months or more in shipping and they recommend that one of the five pounds allowable be used solely for wrappings. The postal service cautions that "the hold of a ship may reach 130 degrees and a ton of weight may rest on your Christmas parcel." Addresses should be printed if possible with a substance that will not mar, smudge, or other-



We know that rationing cannot be 100 per cent equitable; we know that some applications have been denied which, if all the circumstances had been known, would have been granted, while others have been granted which would have been denied. However, you must remember that your board cannot investigate every application thoroughly, and even if they could, they would make some mistakes. However, they are doing the best they can to carry out fairly and equitably this very unpleasant but necessary service to our community for the benefit of the war effort and the community as a whole.

All that far too many people have done so far toward keeping their automobiles and trucks running has been to plead with the rationing board for more tires. Too many have not had their tires recapped at the proper time, too many have not reduced their speed, too many have not reduce their miles of driving; too many of these people have been getting tires to which they are not really entitled under the present situa-

If we are to keep our essential cars and trucks running for the next several months, the drivers must cut their mileage to the minimum and must follow every rule known for the conservation of tires. We realize that most everyone in this area is in a business essential to the war effort, but there are just so many tires in the country and industry can just build so many tires; this combined number is not sufficient to keep all essential automobiles and trucks running, and it is up to every person who needs his car or truck to do everything possible to conserve his present tires.

As stated above, your tire and gasoline panels are doing the very best they can; they are giving time and effort and taking the abuse, hard feelings, pressure being put them, in a sincere effort to keep the industry of the country from breaking down. I beg you to be considerate and understanding. Please do not call them at their places of business or their homes, as they have to make a living and get their rest the same as you. They do not want to deny any application of merit, but under the present circumstances there is nothing else they can do. So do not make it embarrassing for them or make them feel worse by having to explain to you personally or deny you personally at their business or home. Instead, carry your applications or mail them to the board with all information possible. Donley County War Price
