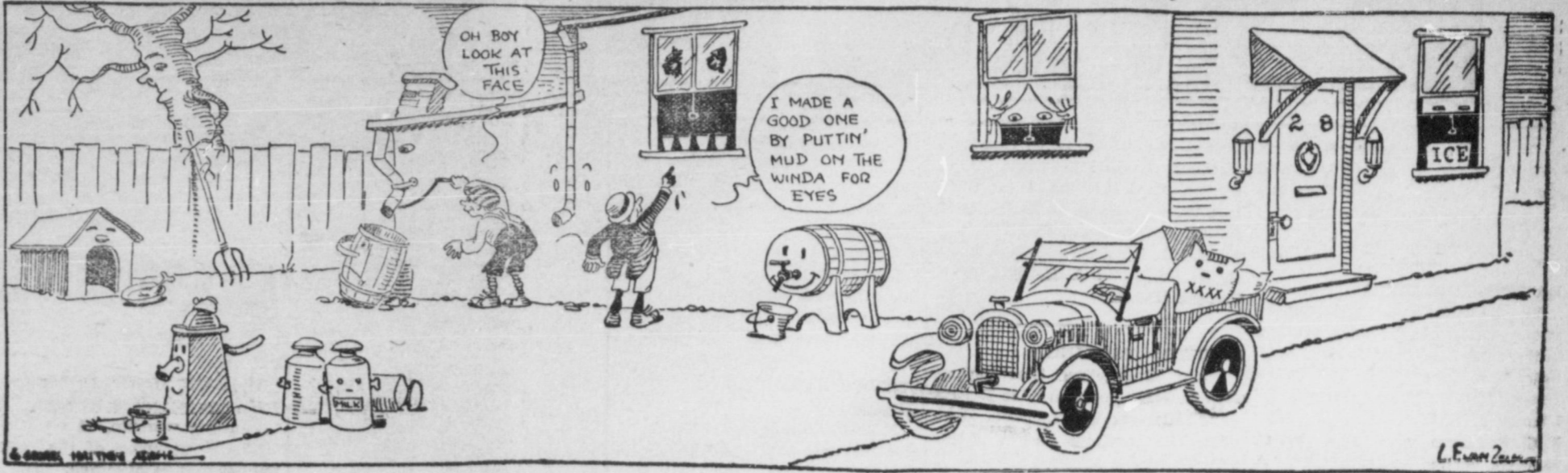

EARLIEST KNOWN MEN

In recent years discussions concerning the evolution of men have awakened an increased interest in our early ancestors. While the remains of several primitive specimens have been unearthed in comparatively recent years, the search for additional types is going forward in many parts of the world.

What is believed to be the oldest remains of a manlike being so far brought to like are those of the Java man, discovered in 1891. That creature was ape-like, but he had greater brain capacity and was of more human development than any known ape. He is known to scientists as Pithecanthropus Erectus and lived about 500,000 years ago. Next is the Heidelberg man,

whose jaw was ape-like, but with truly human teeth, found in Germany in 1907 under 79 feet of sand mingled with the remains of now extinct mammals of 250,000 or more years ago.

The third is the Piltdown man, found in Sussex, England in 1912, which also combines characteristics of both ape and man. This specimen probably lived 150,000 years ago.

Next in order is the Neanderthal race, represented by numerous remains including complete skeletons, discovered in various parts of Europe and Asia since 1856. These were more ape-like than any race of men existing today, but were nevertheless fairly passable human beings, and lived about 50,000 to 100,000 years ago.

Finally Finally, perhaps 50,000 or more years ago, there began to appear several races of true men, the Cro-Magnon, Grimaldi, Aurignacian and Brunns races, of whom many well preserved skeletons have been discovered during the last sixty years. The Cro-Magnons were perhaps the finest specimens who ever lived, the men ranging from five feet ten and a half inches to six feet four and a half inches in height.

There are few subjects more fascinating than that of primitive man, and any serious-minded person will be well repaid for the time spent in studying it.

LEGAL HIJACKING

It is interesting to view the earnings of various public officials. It shows what the fee system does for us. The governor's salary is \$4,000 per year; the sheriff of one county pulls down in salary and fees \$5,000. The attorney general's salary is \$4,000, while a justice of

the peace in one county gets in fees \$12,500. The state treasurer's salary is \$2,500, while a constable in another county collects \$7,500 in fees. These figures are true of all the large counties and in the smaller ones comparatively large.

The Waxahachie Light tells what the fee system did for a young boy who committed the heinous crime of riding a freight train. He was pulled off at Waxahachie and haled before his honor. Here is the result:

Fine for unlawfully riding train	\$1.00
Fee for constable for arrest	2.00
Fee for commitment	3.00
Fee for four witnesses	3.00
Fee for conveying defendant	3.00
Fee for bond	1.50
Fee to justice of peace	2.50
Fee for mileage	1.00
Fee for county attorney	5.00
Fee for release	1.00
Total	\$21.00

The boy pleaded guilty, there was no need for four witnesses, and the county attorney didn't even appear in the case. And this is not an isolated case. Such injustices are being perpetrated in practically every county in the state. It is nothing more nor less than legal hijacking—Marshall News.

WELL FED DON'T UNDERSTAND

"The well fed seem not to understand the viewpoint of the starving."

This was the comment of Governor "Alfalfa Bill" Murray on President Hoover's action in ordering the Federal troops to drive the bonus marchers from Washington. And to use an expression of the streets, "he spoke a mouthful."

It was interesting to note the reaction of Washingtonians to the plea of the bonus marchers. Here, fat government payrolls have kept the wheels of business turning. Government clerks get their pay twice a month, depression or not.

One of these clerks was heard to remark: "They should turn the machine guns on the bonus marchers." It so happened that this particular clerk who made this assertion is on the government payroll drawing a nice salary and also her husband gets a pay check each month from Uncle Sam. They have no children.

This government clerk who would turn machine guns on hard-pressed World War veterans has not felt the pinch of the depression. She knows not what it means to feel the pangs of hunger and see

loved ones suffer for the necessities of life. She has no conception of the want throughout the country and the conditions which drove the thousands of veterans to Washington to ask for their bonus.

As a government clerk she knows of the "swarms" of lobbyists who are in Washington at every Congress working for special legislative privileges. The most that can be charged against the bonus marchers is that they formed a lobby for a bill which would pay an obligation to them that has been acknowledged by congress. But who would suggest that machine guns be turned on hired lobbyists of favor seeking corporations. They should be driven from Capitol Hill we agree, but we would not use machine gun bullets, not even tear gas and bayonets.

HYDE, SIZED TO DEDICATE NEW LINCOLN STATUE

Notables to Attend Unveiling Ceremonies in Fort Wayne on September 16.

FORT WAYNE, IND.—Dedication of America's newest Lincoln shrine, a bronze statue of "Abraham Lincoln, the Hoosier Youth," created by Paulanship, noted sculptor, and erected here by the Lincoln National Life Foundation, will be dedicated with most colorful ceremonies Friday, September 16.

Lincoln scholars from all parts of the United States, the governors of Kentucky, Indiana and Illinois, surviving members of the Lincoln family, Civil War veterans who heard or saw Lincoln and scores of other distinguished men and women have been invited as special guests.

Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde will be the principal speaker and deliver the dedication address following the unveiling of the heroic bronze located on the plaza of the Lincoln National Life Insurance company building. Among the other speakers will be United States Senator James E. Watson and Dr. Joseph R. Sizoo, pastor of the New York Avenue Presbyterian church, at Washington, D. C. which Lincoln attended while president. A presidential salute of 21 guns by U. S. artillery will be fired following the unveiling; Lincoln's favorite hymn will be sung by Cyrena Van Gordon, famed grand opera star, and patriotic music suitable to the occasion will be played by the Fort Wayne American Legion band, one of the country's most famous bands.

To Broadcast Ceremonies. The ceremonies, which will start at 11:30 A. M., central standard time, will be broadcast over the National Broadcasting network on its National Farm and Home Hour with outlets in 47 of the principal cities of the country.

Following the dedication, a reception and luncheon will be held for the notable guests, presided over by Arthur F. Hall, president of the Lincoln National Life Insurance company. A history and description of the Manship bronze will be delivered by Franklin B. Mead, who conceived the idea of a statue of Lincoln as a Hoosier youth. Other speakers, most of them Lincoln authorities, are expected to include Judge Henry Horner, Ida Tarbell,
