HANDBOOK OF TEXAS TO BE PUBLISHED

Texans are proud of Texas, and they want the world to know it. More than 10,000 topics have been catalogued for an omnibus two-volume Handbook of Texas which is being compiled at the University of Texas for the Texas State Historical Association.

A great bulk of these topics have been suggested by the people of Texas, whose advice has been sought by compilers of the work. But the handbook staff, under the supervision of Dr. H. B. Carroll, acting director of Texas his-

tory, is digging into all possible

sources for additional topics.

They have already combed eight Texas history books, a dictionary of American history, and handbook of North American Indians. Physical and political maps of Texas have been studied and outlined. This summer staff members are cataloguing items from the state library, and facts

from old land grants. The Handbook of Texas is to be published in 1945, to commemorate the centennial of Texas state-



> Immunization against diphtheria is also highly desirable. Dr. Cox believes. This disease, which causes serious illness and deaths among young children, can be prevented with toxoid. The child who has never been protected should be given this safeguard against a dreaded disease. Even though he may have been immunized as a baby, doctors and health officers usually recommend an additional dose of toxoid to strengthen immunity before entrance into school.

"In addition, before you send your child to school you are urged to take him to your physician or to the nearest clinic for a complete physical examination," Dr. Cox adds. "You will want to know that he is in good physical condition and can compete with the other children on equal terms. If the check-up reveals any weakness or defect there will be time to build up his general health and correct defects before September. Don't let your child start his school life with any avoidable handicap."
