Brownwood had an opportunity this week to observe first hand an interesting experiment in education - and one that gives promise of proving very popular. Some forty students of geography from Traveling the North Texas State Teachers College, Denton, stopped in Schoolrooms Brownwood overnight as a part of a tour of the western part of the state, during which they

had the opportunity to study geography at the source. The students, enrolled in the Summer School of the teachers college, were themselves teachers of geography in various Texas schools. The tour was arranged with the thought that, since there are no adequate text books on Texas geography, greater knowledge of the subject best could be obtained through a visit to various points of interest in the state. From knowledge obtained on the trip, the teachers are to prepare their own notebooks from which they plan to teach geography to Texas school children during the coming year.

Brownwood is fortunate that this city was included in the initial itinerary for the class, and it is to be hoped that a favorable impression of the city and county was gained by the student-teachers. For during the coming year, they plan to tell their pupils, located in some forty different sections of the state, something about this section of the country. If the information they thus dispense is favorable, so much the better - but it is worth something that they at least will be talking about Brownwood.

Taken as an experiment in practical teaching, the trip was an interesting one. Miss Cowling, member of the Teachers College faculty who originated the plan and was in charge of the group on the trip, is to be congratulated upon devising an interesting and practical method of bringing the pupil directly to the subject to be studied, and in providing for the teachers a combination vacation trip and

Those who favored a continuation of pari-mutuel race betting earlier in the year when efforts were being made to outlaw the pastime, said many times and loudly

that to outlaw betting would Betting On The mean stopping horse racing in Texas. The sport could not be Ponies continued, it was pointed out, unless people were allowed to bet on the races. Without

this, no one would go to the races. Largely because of this argument, and because no one wanted those who had invested in race tracks to lose their money, the legislation which would have outlawed betting was not passed by the Texas Legislature.

The argument was weakened considerably last week at Brady, where the horse races incident to the annual July Jubilee were held without the accompanying pari-mutuel betting. Last year the pari-mutuel machines took a rather heavy toll at the Brady races, but the Jubilee officials did not approve of their use, and they were barred this year. The result was that the largest crowd in the history of the Brady Jubilee attended the races each day they were held. On at least one day, something like 2,000 people failed to gain admission to the tracks, according to reports reaching Brownwood, while on each of the three days of racing, the stands, which seat 4,000, were packed to capacity.

It seems that outlawing betting does not tend to keep people away from the tracks. And if there are any good benefits from horse racing - which undoubtedly there could and should be - they can be secured without the terrific expense of maintaining the pari-mutuels and the other forms of gambling that these machines breed.

Those who are lukewarm about the Lake Brownwood Regatta to be held early in August, should consider the unusual success the July Jubilee in Brady this year. According to estimates of those The who should know, the average daily attendance at the Jubilee Regatta during its three-day life was 8,-

000 people. On July 4th, considerably more than this number were in attendance. Considering the fact that many of these attended the

races, at 75 cents each, it is safe to estimate that the visitors to Brady spent an average of \$2 each per day. That would make a total of some \$48,000 spent in Brady during the days of the Jubilee, or, considered another way, approximately \$10 spent in Brady for every inhabitant of the city, man, woman or child. Release of that much money in any community can-

not but be a good thing, and certainly no one begrudges Brady the success they are enjoying, and which has been built up through years of hard and intelligent work. Everyone in this section takes a pride in the Jubilee, and over in Brownwood we consider it almost as one of our own

But the Lake Brownwood Regatta offers an opportunity to hold an entertainment feature here, entirely distinct in nature, but which should within a very few years, enjoy a popularity similar to that of the Brady Jubilee. The boat races are something unique in this section of the State-something never before held anywhere near Brownwood, and which cannot be duplicated by other communities. Properly handled, they can mean much to Brownwood during the coming years.

Hesitant support of the Regatta will make it more difficult for the committee in charge of the event. Enthusiastic support will assure its success this year, and launch it as an annual event.

CONGRESSMAN DIES PREDICTS (Dallas News)

It is a pity that the huge assembly of farmers and captains of the complicated AAA set-up in Texas, which featured the first day's hearing of the Texas Legislature's cotton investigating committee in Dallas, did not remain to hear Congressman Martin Dies' frank prediction that, in the not distant future, both AAA and the Bankhead law will be held to be unconstitutional by the Supreme Court. It might have done that group some good to hear another side of the cotton problem and to think in terms of restored foreign markets, without having to sacrifice their present benefits accruing under

Congressman Dies with telling strokes painted a picture of foreign cotton encroachment, using Chester C. Davis' own annual report to Secretary Wallace as authority for his increased cotton production figures. This came not long after Cully A. Cobb himself, in that same hall before a capacity audience, had assured his hearers that the United States had little or nothing to fear from foreign expansion. The Dies domestic allotment plan which has the support of Commissioner of Agriculture J. E. McDonald, would continue the present or similar benefit payment to American cotton farmers for that part of their crop to be sold domestically, but the doors would be left open for the export of the balance of the crop so as to recapture and hold foreign outlets for cotton.

It would be logical, therefore, to accept the Dies program as correcting the present deficiencies of the AAA program, which hampers cotton exports to the danger point as far as Texas' vast cotton concentration and exporting industry is concerned. It requires little imagination to envision the plight of Texas farmers should they lose both the benefits of AAA under an adverse Supreme Court decision and their foreign markets for their chief product.

The threat of Brazil, Argentina and some other nations is much more real than the enthusiastic supporters of AAA at first supposed. It is time that something be done about restoring lost cotton markets for Texas. Mr. Dies appears to be on the right track.

#### **NEARLY 3000 PUPILS ENROLLED IN COUNTY** SCHOOLS LAST YEAR

here were 2,186 elementary and 738 high school students, a total of 2,924, enrolled in Brown county schools according to statistics given in the term report for rural schools of the county made by County Superintendent F. D. Pierce, Mrs. Louise Coffey assisted Mr. Pierce in compiling the report, which gives detailed infor-

mation on all school matters. The following statistics are given in the report:

County Superintendent F. D. Pierce receives an annual salary of \$2,200. There are 38 men teachers and 71 women teachers in the county who draw a total of \$87,906 annual salary. Seventy-three teachers hold bachelor degrees, 25 have had three years of college work. nine have two years, and two have one year college work.

Two teachers have permanent nation, one has a permanent certificate by examination; 12 have upon degrees and one on normal school work.

Twelve teachers have one year HOMESTEAD TAXES experience, five have two years; 10 have three; eight have four; 11 have five years: 44 have six to 10 years; 17 have 11 to 20 years and two have more than 20 years experience. There are 29 replacements in the county and three additions; 15 have served two years in the county; 18 have served three years; 13 four years; 13 have served five years; 18 have served six to ten years in the county.

There are 1.037 male students and 961 female students in the elementary grades. In the high school grades there are 332 male and 339 female students for a total of 1,369 male and 1,300 female students attending school.

#### **GEOGRAPHY STUDENTS** OF DENTON COLLEGE **VISIT BROWN COUNTY**

Prownwood had the privilege of entertaining forty students of the North Texas State Teachers College Sunday evening and Monday morning and thereby became acquainted with a unique experiment in practical education. The young men and women who made up the party are teachers who will have places in public schools throughout Texas during the coming school year.

North Texas State Teachers College is located at Denton and its curriculum is designed specifically for teachers. It has a faculty of 101 men and women. The enrollment in the regular session last year was 1703 and for the summer session 3504.

Miss Mary Jo Cowling, the faculty member charged with the responsibility of teaching geography, has long been impressed with the idea that too little stress was given to that subject in our public chools, particularly the geography of Texas. Some time ago Miss Cowling conceived the idea of preparing teachers to teach the geegraphy of Texas by giving them first hand information, so she organized what, for want of a better term, may be called a traveling geography class.

These forty teachers under Miss Cowling's direction left Denton on July 2nd and traveling by way of Breckenridge and Abilene went as far as El Paso returning by way of Alpine, Fort Stockton, San Angelo, Paint Rock and Coleman to Brownwood, thence to Cisco, Eastland and Ranger to Fort Worth and back to Denton.

As they traveled over the coun try each teacher made copious notes about the geography of ev ery locality, including a descrip tion of the soils and natural resources and statistics regarding the industrial development and livestock and agricultural indus-

The average cost of instruction for elementary students was \$23 each and for high average of \$32 per student.


