HEDLEY WOMAN COMMITS SUICIDE SUNDAY EVENING

One of the most deplorable and tragic cases ever to happen in Donley County was the death by suicide of Mrs. S. L. Dodson, mother of nine children, near Hedley last Sunday afternoon about 5 o'clock. The woman was approximately 40 years of age and had lived in the county for the past six years where she was well known in the Hedley Community.

Mental depression was said to have prompted the tragic act which caused her death after taking an overdose of strichnine. The youngest of the children was only three weeks of age.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Hedley with Rev. Hendrix, Pastor of the First Methodist Church of that city conducting the last rites. Interment was made in the Hedley Cemetery.

The sympathies of the entire community is extended to the bereaved family.

STIRRING MESSAGE IS SENT TO WOMEN BY NATIONAL HEAD

"The Business women of America are on the firing line. It is time for them to show their mettle," says Mrs. Geline MacDonold Bowman, of Richmond, Virginia, president of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs, in a Business Women's week message issued to the 60,000 members of the organization.

"Periods of emergency are the real test of quality. Many a soldier in the war swaggared when he was miles away only to turn craven within sound of the enemy's guns.

"Today none of us are facing the perils of gunfire, but spiritual perils just as grave assail us: The perils of doubt and loss of self-confidence; the deadly peril of fear.

"These are the perils that wrap and twist our characters; and build spite and pittingness and envy. As women, how shall we meet them: with shaken faith or serene assurance?

"The answer depends in large measure, I believe, on how we have builded our business lives. Have we bulwarked ourselves with the steadfast knowledge that we are qualified for our daily tasks? Have we learned to adjust ourselves to others so that we can work without inharmony and friction? Have we the spirit of fair play?

"Above all, have we learned the value of solidarity? Do we believe in other women? Are we ready to make common cause with them when they are discriminated against?

"In other words, have the difficult experiences of the past few months quickened our sympathies and clarified our spiritual vision? "Those who can answer in the affirmative have learned to wrest triumph even from adversity. Up on them rests the responsibility of holding up the torch to their fellows. For America today needs spiritual leadership. The women of America need quickened courage and faith. And leadership comes only from those who have first conquered themselves."

"UNCLE BILLY" SMITH IS BURIED THIS AFTERNOON

Clarendon and Donley County lost another of its most beloved citizens Wednesday morning when W. H. Smith answered the call of his Divine Creator and was taken home to his well earned reward. Affectionately known to his hundreds of friends as "Uncle Billy", his place will be left vacant as never was there a more lovable and upright character than he.

W. H. Smith was born in Alabama on November 8th, 1858 and moved to Texas in 1872. On May 8, 1879 he was married to Miss Sallie Lawrence and to this happy union was born five children, three of whom survive their father at the present time.

He united with the Methodist church at the age of 14, and since that time has been a faithful servant of that faith unto death.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at the First Methodist Church with the Rev. E. B. Bowen in charge of the last rites assisted by Revs. M. M. Bevers and L. A. Reavis. A large crowd of friends and acquaintances were in attendance as a mark of the esteem with which the departed friend was held.

Friends of W. T. Hughes were shocked and grieved last Saturday when the news of his sudden death in Amarillo was received here. He apparently was in good health, and had recovered sufficiently from a slight attack of the flu to be up and about the house.

Mr. Hughes was born in Memphis, Tenn., 1858, later moving to Rockwall County, Texas, where he met and married Miss Jane Miller in 1877. To this union was born four sons and four daughters, six of who survive their father. The family has lived in Donley and Hall County for a number of years. Mr. Hughes has been living in Amarillo for the last year and was there at the time of his passing.

Mrs. Hughes, wife of the deceased, predeceased her husband in death some sixteen years ago and is buried in Rockwall County.

The body was brought to Clarendon Sunday and funeral services were conducted at the Church of Christ at 3 o'clock with Elder Hukel and Rev. B. N. Shepherd in charge of the last rites. Interment was made in the Citizen's Cemetery.

Mr. Hughes was affiliated with the Church of Christ, having joined that faith at an early age. He was also a member of W. O. W. organization.

WHY IT IS CALLED THE "WHITE HOUSE"

The name goes back to the War of 1812, when a British admiral set fire to the building, leaving it a mass of blackened ruins.
