Whether or not it is as impractical as The Dallas News would lead its readers to believe, the proposal of Representative Martin Dies to restrict immigration and make mandatory the deportation of 3,-The Dies 500,000 aliens illegally in this country, has done two things. Bill It has given the able Texan na-

tional recognition; and it has caused him to be mentioned as the foremost among the possible opponents of United States Senator Morris Sheppard at next year's elections. In addition, his efforts, and we believe them sincere,

have created a widespread demand that the ideas advocated in his bill be enacted into law. Hearst newspapers, for example, include the Dies bill in one of two that should be classed as "must" legislation in the present session.

The Dies bill would suspend all 'pioncer" immigration for the next 50 years-in itself a logical measure. And, in addition to deporting the 3,500,000 aliens illegally in this country, it would give 4,000,000 aliens here legally twelve months in which to take our naturalization papers or return to their native countries. The final provision which makes the measures appeal to those endeavoring to solve the unemployment problem specifies that aliens be barred from jobs that can be filled by American citizens.

The Dies plan is logical. If there are 3,500,000 aliens illegally in the United States, and there are 3,500,000 unemployed people that must be supported by taxpayers' money -whether these unemployed are illegal aliens or American citizens-wouldn't deportation of such aliens relieve the situation to a great extent? And if they are in this country without the sanction of law, is there any reason why they should remain here? It is no wonder that Mr. Dies has received more than 50,000 letters and telegrams in suport of his bill, and has behind it the suport of more than 150 loyalty organizations.

While it is unfortunate that the success of the measure should be tied up with Mr. Dies political fortunes, in that some support that otherwise would be secured for the bill will be withheld in the fear that it would make him a formidable contender for Mr. Sheppard's job, the peculiarities of American politics make no other result possible. Mr. Dies is a capable man, and even in politics, worthiness eventually makes itself felt.

A few years ago one of the bitterest political battles witnessed in Texas was that of James V. Allred and Robert L. Bobbitt for Attorney General. Bobbitt held the office by appointment, and Allred.

Political who narrowly missed having been elected a few years pre-Friends viously, felt that the appoint-

ment should have been his. He said so in no uncertain terms, and the scathing denunciation of the incumbent— the manner in which he hurled every ounce of his butter sarcasm at Bobbitt--left little to be desired by those who like their politics rough and raw.

It was an interesting campaign, and Allred won. A year ago found Bobbitt supporting Allred for Governor. And last week, when Presiding Justice Bickett of the San Antonio court of civil appeals resigned to re-enter private practice, Governor Allred appointed Mr. Bobbitt to a place on the bench. Incidentally, Mr. Bobbitt graciously declined appointment as chief justice, insisting that Justice Smith, veteran of the bench, be elevated to that position, and he take the minor assignment.

It seems that the old political maxim, "if you can't beat them, join them, 'is the best policy to follow, after all.

Central Texas lost a valuable friend and newspaperman, and Texas a worthy citizen when W. H. Carpenter, published of the Comanche Chief, died in Brownwood this

week. Mr. Carpenter was widely known throughout the state, Carpenter and especially in West Texas where his scope of activity had been largely confined during the past few years

Although primarily interested in his publishing and insurance businesses, both of which he had extended to practically all parts of the state, Mr. Carpenter found time for active participation in civic affairs. He had served both as secretary and as president of the Comanche Chamber of Commerce, and at the time of his death was a director in the organization. He was interested in the development of good roads in this section, and was president of the recently-organized Central Texas Highway Association, which was taking a lead in promoting construction of paved highways in Central Texas.

In the prime of life, Mr. Carpenter had reason to look forward to many years of usefulness to his family and his community. His death leaves a place that will be hard

Miller at present is serving a term in a federal prison at Atlanta, Géorgia. Upon completion of this term, he will be required to serve a two to seven year sentence in the Texas penitentiary. Nine reasons, all of them containing serious charges, are given for the revocation.

Miller is under six indictments, two of which have been returned since the pardon was issued, the Governor pointed out.

The case illustrates the ease with which unworthy persons may obtain pardons under the present system, and certainly indicates the pressing need for more stringent reg-

True Ghost Stories

"In my early barnstorming days of one-night stands, I landed in a small hotel in a New York hamlet. The room was dismal, but I felt fortunate that I could occupy it alone," related Edward G. Robinson, the bad man of the films.

"During the night a queer, cold tingling sensation pervaded my body. There were slight noises in the room, and I attuned my ears to catch what they were.

"This was not the sound of a person moving or breathing. It seemed at first that there were stifled groans, but these subsided and gave way to a sort of gurgling rattle which came intermittently. The hair at the back of my neck bristled and burned.

"About two minutes later this queer rattle ended with what sound ed like a gasp of breath and one louder rattle. It seemed to be right close to me, and yet from far away. The last rattle did not give me any better clue, but a new sound had appeared which immediately followed on the last

"It was a steady drip, drip, drip, like a faucet dripping into a pan of water.

"The continual drip, drip, drip persisted until I thought it would drive me out of my mind. It seemed louder than the other noises.



all flies; we have to open doors when we pass in or out. For the flies that get inside there should be an ever-ready mesh-wire fly swatter. Flypaper also is good, but a bit of a nuisance. There is a spiral kind, designed to hang from the ceiling, which doesn't get in the way and is quite effective in catching flies. There also are fly traps using poison.

We can't blame everything on the flies. The soap advertisements tel us, probably quite correctly, that 'steen kinds of diseases can be contracted from eating with unwashed hands. Farm sanitation, after all, consists of learning the usual sources of diseases and systematically guarding against them day and night. It is especially necessary to teach children to be clean-

ly in their food habits.

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To My Friends and Neighbors:

During the past few weeks there has been considerable newspaper and sidewalk discussion of the proposal to grant a franchise for another electric light and power plant in Brownwood. In view of the fact that those seeking the franchise have devoted all their efforts and energy to shouting careless statements about the Texas Power & Light Comapny, I feel it is my duty as a citizen and as manager of the Company to ask a few questions pertinent to the situation.

> 1. Instead of shouting "Power Trust," WHY HAVEN'T THE SEEKERS OF THE FRAN-CHISE TOLD THE PEOPLE WHAT KIND OF AN ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT THEY PRO-POSE TO BUILD?

> 2. Would the proposed plant be a real up-todate one, big enough to SERVE ALL THE PEO-PLE IN ALL PARTS OF THE CITY, OR WOULD IT BE THE ALLEGED SMALL PLANT INTENDED ONLY TO SERVE THE CONGESTED BUSINESS AREA? IF SO -AND THERE HAS NEVER BEEN ANY-THING SAID TO THE CONTRARY — HOW WOULD SUCH A PLANT BENEFIT ALL THE PEOPLE OF BROWNWOOD? After all, a public franchise carries with it the obligation to render adequate and dependable service to ALL THE PEOPLE within the city limits.

> 3. Exactly what kind of a plant is to be built? Will it be new and modern, or, will it be second-hand and obsolete? What kind of poles will be erected, short, long, sturdy, or just any kind of an old pole? What kind, size and quality of wire will be used?

> 4. What guarantee is offered that the people who might patronize this proposed plant could always depend on having enough service at all times, regardless of the size of their demands?

> Facts, affording correct answers to these questions undoubtedly would be brought out in the event the people had an opportunity to vote on the proposition. IF THE SEEKERS OF THE FRANCHISE ARE WILLING TO HAVE THESE FACTS KNOWN, why should there be any objection to the efforts of local citizens to have an election so that the voters could have an opportunity to judge the merits of the whole proposition at the ballot box?

For 22 years I have managed the affairs of the Texas Power & Light Company in Brownwood, I know that it is not a "wishing" matter to render the type of service you people need, want and must have. Years of training, constant alertness, investments of large sums of money in equipment, materials and man-power have made possible the organization which serves you today. It is not possible to duplicate these facilities without large expenditures of money.

I would be negligent in my duty as a neighbor and a friend if I did not call your attention to these unanswered questions.
