





A WAR FOLLY STILL UNCORRECTED

Of all the war follies of the Wilson administration, the surrender to the rail labor element in the matter of wages, has probably vexed the country and cost the people more money than any other. The reason is that when all other wages and income has been on a decline for the past several years there has been no readjustment of the wage scale of rail workers and the whole people have been forced to pay higher freights than economic conditions justified. For the past several weeks the rail and labor executives

have been in conference looking to a pitiful ten percent re-duction in wages, and so far the labor leaders have stoutly resisted any such decline.

This is one of the greatest difficulties in the return of better business and the country will certainly suffer if public opinion doesn't force the rail workers to the same basis of other folks, labor and capital alike.

Such a folly has been a burden on the backs of the nation too long.

Lee, the 125th anniversary of whose birth will be celebrated on January with 19, was technically a prisoner of war at the time of his death in 1870, but such is the case, according to a writer in the Pathfinder. was After Lee's surrender to Grant at Appomattox on April 9, 1865, he was released on parole. President Johnson's amnesty proclamation issued the following month did not include Confederate officers above the rank of colonel, or any who had been educated at West Point or who had resigned from the United States army to join the Confederacy, so Lee was ineligible for amnesty on all three counts.


