Western Railroads this week are observing "Railroad Week," and calling upon people in this section west of the Mississippi river to consider, during the week of June 10 to 15, the importance the rail-

Railroad roads play in the daily life of the communities they serve. It Week is proper that Brownwood is paying a fine tribute to the railroads this week, for the railroads have been an important factor in the life and development of the city for more than a generation,

But, in spite of the claim they have for patronage on the score of their own importance, the railroads do not make their bid for business on this basis. They ask patronage on the more important basis of service offered.

It is noteworthy that the railroads have taken important steps toward improving that service during the past two years. Streamlined and air conditioned trains bespeak increased speed and comfort in travel; decreased fares hold forth the lure of greater economy. Faster and more economical service in handling freight shipments makes it more profitable for shippers to use the rails.

The significant fact is that these improvements have been made in the face of mounting deficits on the part of the railroads. In spite of the fact that freight traffic increased 7.9 per cent in 1934 over 1933, and passenger traffic increased 10.4 per cent, increased expenses of operation caused an increase in the annual deficit of American railroads from \$6,000,000 in 1933 to \$32,000,000 in 1934.

In "Railroad Week" the railroad men seemed to have cast off their pessimistic view of their situation, have caught something of the pioneering spirit of the railroad builders of another generation, have marshalled their forces for a drive to returned prosperity that is an inspiration to all. Enthusiasticaly and emphatically we congratulte them, and wish them well.

With the NRA temporarily patched up so that its "liquidation" can be accomplished during the coming months, while plans for repairing the permanent structure can be studied, new troubles beset the

More New Deal New Deal. Most recent to feel the ire of a mounting tide Troubles against what generally is feared is a declining cause, is the Tennessee Valley Authoritythe famed TVA.

It seems, from reports of a committee hearing on the administration of the TVA, that gross irregularities have taken place in this most important of governmental utility projects. Interesting were some of the facts brought out in the investigation: that without authority, headquarters had been moved from Muscle Shoals (designated by Congress) to Knoxville, where \$36,000 a year is paid in rent; that hired passenger cars cost the government \$8,000 a month, although TVA owns 223 automobiles; that \$950 was paid for a dairy cow (part of a \$10,000 herd) that previously had been offered for \$200; and other items hard to explain.

Power committee are jubilant at the results of the hearing, pointing out the inevitable failure of municipal or governmental operation of power companies. But the New Deal is not without its defenders. Vociferous Maury Maverick, San Antonio congressman, termed the attack on TVA, according to the magazine Time, as "rotten and disgraceful." "If I weren't in Congress and it would not be undignified to say so, I would say it's lousy," Mr. Maver-



According to Extension Dairyman E. R. Eudaly, the value of Sudan grass is reduced about half if it is allowed to form seed. He says it should be cut for hay just as it heads. If it is being grazed, but not kept down, mow half of it and two weeks later the other half. That way grazing will not be interfered with.

The substitution of Staniey Baldwin for Ramsay MacDonald is a logical sequence of events. The basis for the change was laid when the coalition cabinet of Mac-Donald was set up several years ago. It appeared inevitable even that far back that the next move would be the restoration of the conservatives to nower.

Though he was severely criticized for his course at the time, it now appears that the most important decision MacDonald ever made in his political career was that of breaking away from the Labor party and forming a coalition government, thus bringing into cooperative action the leaders of the three

major parties in Britain-Conserv-


