farther than merely testing the animals to be displayed, but includes all animels in the herd of the exhibitor.
This will be expensive to the association, but the work can be done at less expense by it than by the individuals. It is often the case that the small breeder or the in-
dividual farmer with a few head of good danty cattle is not convenient to a veterinarian who is qualified to give the test. By grouping the breeders a circuit can be arranged for the veterinarian and the expense greatly reduces.
