

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

## Industrial Possibilities of Texas

Talbot, agency manager for the Southland Life Insurance Company and the prime mover in the campaign for Texas Industries, in which he discusses the possibilities of Texas from an industrial standpoint, answering the question: "What manufacturers does Texas have and what can we profitably manufacture?" Some figures were released recently that show an economic waste in Texas on one of our largest industries. We have been many of our other industries. For instance a beef steer will average about 900 pounds, and for the year these figures were taken, sold at \$9.20 per hundredweight. Then, these steers were shipped to northern grazing fields where

Now, mind you, our stock man spent 2 to 21/2 years in bringing the steer to the 900 pounds and months in bringing it from the

out. It means the Texas raiser the 3 months work. In other words, the northern man gets within \$4.50 of what the Texan made in one-tenth of the time. Multiply that \$78.36 by a million head of cattle and you Million Dollars Seventy-Eight more annually that would stay where you have a chance to get it back if we fatten the cattle ourselves.

In a great many cases our own cotton seed is shipped North to help fatten the cattle. Here are our western plains with a surplus of wheat. We could raise some fattening foods in other communities. An additional advantage would be the retained fertilizer if we fatten the steers and shipped direct to market, and two freight charges and two commission charges would be eliminated.
