




Murray, who was appointed by Governor Jester to fill his unexpired term, has been a railroad commissioner since January 1947 and is a candidate for the remaining two years of the unexpired term.

Texans who know Murray and his fine record as a public servant, are enthusiastically in favor of keeping him in his present office. The commission is seeking ways and means to expand new sources of the black gold as well as to conserve known reserves so that the demand for oil can be met without permanent injury to the State of Texas.

The Veterans Administration reminds veterans that July 31 is surance on a "comparative health" basis.

Before August 1, an eligible veteran may reinstate any amount of term insurance-from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500—regardless of the length of time it has been lapsed, and usually without a physical examination. He need only fill out a simple application form, in which he certifies that his health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two months.

The privilege of reinstating on this basis will be available after risk, VA said.







JAMES P. HART VISITS IN CLARENDON WEDNESDAY

James P. Hart, Associate Justice of the Texas Supreme Court, visited in Clarendon yesterday in the interest of his candidacy. Judge Hart, a native of Travis County, is seeking his first elective term on the Court. He was appointed last year to fill a vacancy.

It was reactivated in February, 1943 under Airborne Command and stationed at Camp Polk, La., participating in the Louisiana maneuvers in 1944 and finally going overseas as a unit to the Southwest Pacific in April 1944.

The Division went into action as ground troops on 18 November 1944, landing at Leyte; followed by an amphibious landing at Luzon, 60 miles from Manila, on 26 January 1945.
