LOCAL ARTIST DOES EXCELLENT PAINTING OF MANY WESTERN SCENES

A painting by Harold Bugbee, a typical round up scene, now adorns the walls of the Donley County picture, one recognizes the rider in the scene as that of that pioneer Bank. Immediately on looking at the cattleman, Frank Collinson.

The scene is wonderfully true to the days of the West when the cattleman was king. The red bluff stands out prominent in the background, while in the immediate foreground hundreds of head of longhorns are held in a bunch. The rider comes charging forward on his horse, swinging his quirt in the air as he drives two steers hurrying away from the herd. Realism is added to the scene by a clump of sage brush here and there.

The highlights are wonderful; one can look at the steers as they come rushing forward, and almost see them straining every muscle to get away from the trained cattle horse.

The regalia of the cow boy is accurately portrayed, boots, spurs, sombrero, all blend in harmonious manner that bespeaks understanding on the part of the artist.

Mr. Bugbee, although a very young artist, has shown unusual talent in this painting, and he is specializing on western scenes. He has studied in the East under Charles Cummings, the famous artist, and has spent considerable time at Taos New Mexico where many artists from over the entire United States gather from time to time. Though he is a young artist, Mr. Bugbee's fine work presages a great career for him in the field of art.

REV. WHITE TO RE-ENTER EVANGELISTIC WORK

RESIGNS PASTORATE OF THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH HERE TO TAKE EFFECT JANUARY 15TH. WILL FIRST GO TO FLORIDA IN NEW FIELD.

Rev. Sam J. White, pastor of the Christian Church in this city for more than a year, resigned last Sunday to take effect the 15th day of January, 1922, as pastor here. Rev. White will return to his old field, giving full time to the evangelistic work. He will first go to Florida where his services will be engaged for three months in that work if not longer.

Rev. White has been very successful as pastor here. The church has been finished up, and there has been a splendid growth in membership. He was unanimously called for the second year, on which he was serving at the time of his resignation.

Rev. White was formerly the state evangelist of his church in Florida, having held that position for ten years. Since coming here to be pastor, he has had dozens of calls each year to come and assist in evangelistic work. He has for some time contemplated this return to the work, but his resignation came as a surprise to the congregation of the Christian Church Sunday.

After his return to the evangelistic work, Rev. White will probably make his headquarters in Ft. Worth. It is with genuine regret that his congregation loses him as pastor, but they and his many friends in the other churches will wish him much success in the field to which he goes.

GOOD DONATION TO ORPHANS' WORK FOLLOWING PAGEANT AT CHURCH FRIDAY EVENING

The contribution to the work of the Methodist Orphans' Home was a large one following a stately pageant at the church Friday evening. The pageant and the cause for which the offering was taken had subjects of the same nature. The slogan for the Orphans' work is "There is no room in the Inn," and the title of the pageant was "At the Door of the Inn." The pageant, more properly a pantomime, was under the direction of Mrs. J. A. Shawver.

The scene opened in front of the little khan where Joseph and Mary afterwards asked admission. "O Little Town of Bethlehem" was softly played on the organ. A Jewess crossed the stage carrying a jar of water; a boy strolled across the stage; then followed the Roman soldier who was in that country for collecting taxes. The inn door opened and the innkeeper bowed extravagantly to the soldier. Two little girls were then received as guests at the inn. Other guests representing riches, power, and even poverty strolled across the yard and were received into the inn. A poor beggar, denied entrance, made his abode the stones in the yard. Then came Joseph and Mary; the innkeeper said that he was unable to receive them; the guests were called forth, but everyone asked to keep his place; and the innkeeper bade them to go. The beggar then offered to escort Joseph and Mary to the caves on the hillside where the cattle were fed. They accepted this as the last chance to find protection from the chill of the night. Ere long the beggar returned, but he was dumfounded to see a bright star that began to show in the sky. He called to the occupants of the inn. Then entered the shepherds seeking the place above which the star shown. Then was heard the song "There's a Song in the Air." As soon as this ceased there began "Silent Night" followed immediately by "Angels from the Realms of Glory." Then was heard the song of the returning shepherds as they sang "Hark the Herald Angels." But there was no more stately music than the "March of the Magi" played by Miss Betts on the organ. The lodgers in the inn hurried forth to see the star that was showing in the sky. Scarcely had they returned to the inn when the three Wise men entered; rather than accepting of the invitation of the innkeeper to enter, they went forth in the direction of the star as the beggar offered to escort them. A little girl then sought entrance, but there was the same story, no room at the inn.

Rev. Griswold then made an appeal to help the work for the orphans. A good offering was made. The fine stage setting added much to the pageant, and the electrical effects secured by R. M. Chunn added much. The whole affair was very impressive.

CHURCH DEBATE AT TRACTS ATTENTION

SOME IN ACCURACIES IN RECENT HISTORY OF NEWS

Those who read the history of the Clarendon News as outlined in the recent Home Hown Edition will recall that the story started with the statement that in attempting to give history covering a period of forty years where only the memory of man was to be depended upon inaccuracies were sure to creep in. Our attention has been called by a former resident to several inaccuracies. Whether by mere memory or not, he gives the following as something like the story of the paper from 1899 until 1909. Albert Erwin bought the Banner from Bob Edgell in the summer of 1899. On November 1, 1899, Edgell sold half interest in the paper to John E. Cooke, and they immediately changed the name of the publication to the "Banner-Stockman," featuring stock news. This was soon made the official organ of the Panhandle Stockmen's Association, continuing in that capacity for about five years. In 1904 when Cooke took in Mr. Kelly as partner, the plant was materially enlarged, and Mr. Cook bought the Clarendon News from Mr. Beville. About a year later Mr. Cooke became sole owner of this paper while Mr. Blake continued his publication of the Industrial West, about this time changing the name of the paper to the "Chronicle." In January 1909 R. C. Dial bought the Banner-Stockman from Mr. Cooke. The history of the paper after that time we shall presume fairly correct unless corrected by some other. We are glad to receive this correction to the story as this enables us a little more nearly to get to the truth, and that is our ambition.

HEAVY DOCKET FOR WINTER TERM COURT

DISTRICT COURT FOR WINTER TERM WILL COMMENCE MONDAY JANUARY 9TH. PETIT JURORS NOT SUMMONED UNTIL TUESDAY.

The winter term of the District Court for this county will meet the second Monday in January, which is the ninth of that month. The docket although the time for filing suits has not expired, is already a heavy one, and it is highly probable that several more suits will be filed for this term. The Grand Jury will meet on Monday, while the petit jury for the first week will not meet until Tuesday. Judge Henry Bishop will preside, and Hon. Alex. Mood will prosecute the interests of the state.

On the civil docket as it stands today, there are sixteen cases carried over from the last term, and new cases have been filed. There are eleven cases on the criminal docket, every case a felony, and there will probably be about four more of like grade. The complete docket, which, at this time, is necessarily incomplete due to the fact that another day remains in which to file suits, will be given in full in next week's issue of the News.

The last month has seen a general remodeling of the district court room, and the judge's desk is now in the north part of the room. This gives better use of the rooms at the sides, and the meeting place of the Grand Jury will be upstairs in the old office of the county demonstration agents. Another feature that will be of the greatest interest to the jurors who must be here during the cold weather is the fact that the court house is heated throughout with steam.
