### Health Notes

AUSTIN—The danger of crippling and death from poliomyelitis is very real and should not be minimized, but according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, a knowledge of the facts about this disease will help fight the fear of it, and aid in preventing the panic that is usually associated with the appearance of polio.

The facts about polio are these: It attacks so few people that 20 cases per 100,000 population is considered an epidemic. Half of those who get the disease recover without crippling; another fourth, with good care, recover with only slight crippling. Deformities can be prevented and crippling lessened in many cases, by prompt, complete and sometimes prolonged medical care.

Even though these encouraging facts have been established, still with polio as with any other disease prevention is better than cure. Summer is the chief danger period, and to avoid the risk of contracting this disease, it is well to observe the following health suggestions, especially with regard to children: practice absolute cleanliness in personal, home and community life; try not to mingle with crowds; don't get over-tired since extreme fatigue lowers resistance; avoid chilling by swimming overlong in cold water; consult your doctor at once if a member of your family has fever, headache, nausea, a cold, upset

stomach, muscle soreness or stiffness.

Following these suggestions will help to prevent the spread of polio, but if you do have a case in your family, remember that the majority of patients with good care recover without crippling. Your fear or panic will only make it harder for you and your child.

# Veterans' News

Most of the 45,000 World War II veterans taking institutional on-farm training under federal veterans' training programs in Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi may qualify for increased subsistence benefits due to changes in ceilings, rates and number of dependents, the Veterans Administration reported.

The increases were authorized by Public Law 512, signed May 4, 1948, by President Truman. The law raises pay ceilings, establishes new criteria for computing income from productive labor, and provides for partial increases in subsistence allowances for part-

time school training and for combination school and job training programs such as institutional on-farm training.

Under the new ceilings for GI Bill farm trainees, earned income plus subsistence may not exceed \$210 a month for a veteran without dependents, \$270 for a veteran with one dependent, and \$290 for a veteran with more than one dependent. Previous limits were \$175 for a veteran without dependents and \$200 for a veteran with one or more dependents.

Another provision of the new law gives additional increases to veterans training as employees on other persons' farms. Only wages for the standard work week, exclusive of overtime pay, are considered earned income in computing subsistence under the raised ceilings. Previously, veterans included pay for all regularly scheduled overtime work in reporting their earned incomes.

### Southwestern Associated Telephone System Installs 1,000,000th Telephone

Its millionth telephone was installed recently, May 20, 1948, by General Telephone System of which Southwestern Associated Telephone Company is a part. The System, headed by General Telephone Corporation, comprises the largest group of operating telephone companies in the United States outside the Bell System.

Mr. Roy L. Brewer, District Manager of the Memphis Exchange, announced that the millionth installation had been made in Wisconsin by Commonwealth Telephone Company, also a part of General Telephone System. The instrument was installed in the home of Mr. Jack Pierick, living in the farming community of Richland Center which is the same area where the General Telephone System started. Mr. Pierick served with the U. S. Army in the European theater during the last war.

General Telephone System traces its history back to 1920 when there were about 1,554 telephones in service in five small Wisconsin communities. Today General Telephone operates 1,022 exchanges in 19 states. Southwestern Associated Telephone Company operates 191 exchanges, serving 64,053 customers. It became part of the General Telephone System in 1926.

The System's five-hundred-thousandth telephone was installed late in December 1939. During the intervening eight years and four months the number of System-owned telephones in service has doubled and total assets have increased from \$108,755,000 to \$195,000,000. This growth can be accounted for in part by acquisitions but more particularly by additions of telephones to existing exchanges.

In all there are about 6,000 non-Bell System telephone companies in the United States, serving 6,293,000 telephones through more than 11,000 exchanges. The Bell System serves 28,507,000 telephones through more than 6,000 exchanges.

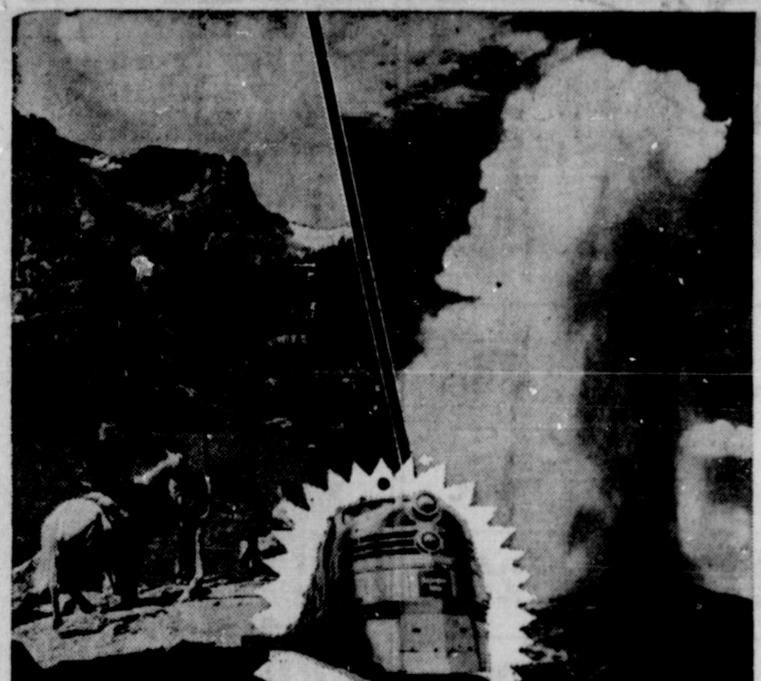

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**COMMUNITY "F" IN AAA PROGRAM**

This is the sixth in a series of eight articles for the purpose of letting the public know what is going on in their county to conserve their soil. This week your attention is called to the smallest community in Donley County—Community "F". This community is not the smallest in number of farms but in land area it only has 27,468 acres. This acreage is divided into 85 farms of varying sizes. Community "F" is located

in the east part of the County south of the river in the McKnight district.

In spite of the fact that Community "F" is small the farmers have done a very good job of carrying out soil conserving practices. These farmers have planted more winter legumes than the farmers in any other community. Winter legumes paid for under the 1948 AAA program are Hairy Vetch and Austrian Winter Peas. The farmers of community "F" planted a total of 24076 pounds of

either one or both of these legumes. The farmers participating in this practice are Royce Hall, W. G. Johnson, Simon Dishman, Robert Couch, Frank Davis, Charlie Minnick, J. M. Tidwell, Winfred Doherty, Bill Cooke Jr., and Elmer Dishman. The farmers have had a little bad luck with this practice this year because of dry weather and high winds, but they have recognized the value of winter legumes in this county. Charlie Minnick is the only farmer who used superphosphate along with his winter legumes. Mr. Minnick applied 5000 pounds of superphosphate to his Austrian Winter Peas.

Elmer Dishman is one of the few farmers in this county to complete the deep plowing practice. Several farmers tried this practice but the rules set up by the State office require that the land be plowed to a depth of at least 12 inches. There are not many farmers in Donley County who have the equipment to do this type of work, although most of you agree that it is good for the soil to get the heavier soil to the top.

There have been several terraces and drainage ditches built by the farmers in community "F" this year. S. I. Beattie has a drainage ditch of 3240 cubic yards. And L. D. Messer has built 1775 cubic yards of diversion terraces. George Wilkinson, Frank Finch and Rufus Bonner have constructed 27,300 feet of large ridge terraces. There are many farmers who would like to build more terraces but the limited funds for the AAA program in 1948 have made it impossible for all the farmers to build as they would like to.

As protection against wind erosion Lee Usrey, Tom Tate, and

V. C. Waddell Jr. plan to strip crop 250 acres of their farm land. This practice was shown to be very important this last spring when the wind was causing so much damage to land and crops. It is also good protection during the growing season to prevent washing and wind erosion.

Lester Messer, Fred Thompson, Winfred Doherty, and Bill Cooke Jr. are seeding 418 pounds of various kinds of grasses in Community "F" under the 1948 program. The farmers are showing more interest each year in improving their pasture grass and turning cultivated land back to pasture.

The money used by the AAA Conservation Program belongs to each and every citizen who pays taxes of any kind. In order that your money is not spent unnecessarily there are three men in community "F" who check the practices that are completed and see that they are used to the best advantages. These men protect and advise the spending of your money, as well as give help and advice to the farmers. They work for a salary smaller than one they would pay the men working for them and get no more thanks than the ordinary hired man. The men elected by the farmers in community "F" for this job are Tommy Bain, Frank Davis, and Leamon Messer. Farmers, get acquainted with your community committeemen—there are times when they can be of help to you.

And then I realized the truth for the first time—Little Joey is our responsibility now.

Perhaps, in the next case, the mother might be more to blame, or it might be hard to tell who was to blame, and after all it is not important who is to blame, because there is little we can do about it. But we might be able to help Little Joey—at least it is worth a try.
